Professional Development Program

MAY 8, 2020 - The last day to submit PDP activities on the "2019-2020 Professional Development Program (PDP)"

Professional Development Program

Student Instructions

The College of Law designed the Professional Development Program to help you build your professional identity and network throughout your legal education career. Each year you will be required to complete certain mandatory activities. Additionally, throughout law school you will be required to attend networking and skills events, complete pro bono awareness tasks, and participate in career exploration activities. Inside your designated class folder will include the activity categories and numbers of activities required for each class year. This Professional Development Program is a floor, not a ceiling; OPD encourages you participate in as many of the activities as your schedule allows.

How it works:

Mandatory Activities: Mandatory activities include class level specific programming required by the Office of Professional Development. These meetings will be announced in the OPD newsletter and/or via emails sent by OPD staff. Some activities may be "on-demand" or web-based. Additionally, these activities will likely require pre- or post-work such as filling out a professional identity assessment or updating your application documents.

Networking and Skills Events: These are events sponsored, or co-sponsored by OPD, and generally involve participation by Toledo Law alumni or friends of the law school. OPD staff will publicize notice of events that qualify under this category in the OPD newsletter and/or by email.

Pro Bono Awareness Tasks: Ohio, along with many other states, encourages pro bono work as part of a lawyer's professional duties to the public and justice system. Therefore, these tasks are not only a resume builder, but they will help kick-start a commitment to your professional duty as lawyers. The Ohio Supreme court states in the Preamble to the Ohio Rules of Professional Conduct: "...[A]ll lawyers should devote professional time and resources and use civic influence to ensure equal access to our system of justice for those who because of economic or social barrier cannot afford or secure legal counsel." It is your responsibility to find pro bono clinics and volunteer to help, or find an attorney to work with or shadow. OPD is happy to help in your search but will not be responsible for placement in these opportunities. OPD may advertise pro bono projects and other opportunities via the newsletter or emails.

Professional Exploration: Professional exploration tasks will aid in determining your professional identity and long-term career path. Exploring the profession can be done on a large scale, by attending a legal conference, for example. Or on a smaller scale, such as a one-on-one informational interview. It is your responsibility to find outside events related to your areas of interest, set up informational interviews, or arrange observation of a legal proceeding. OPD is happy to help in your search.

Tracking: This webcourse should be used tracking your completed activities. You are responsible for reporting the activities that you completed. The Office of Professional Development will track attendance at all mandatory *in-person* activities. Note, if you complete a mandatory activity on-demand, you are responsible for tracking it in the "2019-2020 Professional Development Program (PDP)" webcourse.

Turn-in: You are required to report each Networking and Skills, Pro Bono Awareness, and Professional Exploration activity by end of the semester in which you complete the number of credits for each class level. This is your "reporting period." Reporting is done via the "2019-2020 Professional Development Program (PDP)" webcourse, and should be done in the appropriate drop-box or questionnaire for each activity.

For example, if you are a full-time 1L student who started in August 2019 and completed 30 hours by the end of Spring 2020, you would report your 1L activities by the end of the Spring 2020 semester for the "1L reporting period." If you are a part-time 1L student who started in August 2019 and completed 30 hours by the end of Spring 2021, you would report your activities by the end of the Spring 2021 semester.

2-year JD students will only complete the first and second reporting periods.

2020 LOYOLA PATENT LAW INTERVIEW PROGRAM

Loyola University Chicago School of Law is hosting the 2020 Patent Law Interview Program on **Thursday and Friday**, **July 23-24 in Chicago**, **Illinois**. This nationwide interview program targets patent law employers and rising 2L and 3L students.

Last year roughly 150 employers, 190 law schools, and 1,100 law students from across the country participated in the program. The program is entirely preselected, which means that students submit application materials to apply to interviews with the employers they are interested in, and employers then review their materials and select the student they wish to interview at the program. Last year, approximately half of the participating students were selected for interviews.

Students with undergraduate or graduate degrees in engineering or a technical science should consider registering for the program. You do not need to be patent bar eligible to register, although the vast majority of employers participating in the program are seeking patent bar eligible students. Chief Justice Thomas J. Moyer Fellowship Program Description and Conditions for Participation

Dear Fellowship Applicant:

The Ohio State Bar Association Chief Justice Thomas J. Moyer Legacy Committee, with the support of the State Bar Foundation, has created an annual fellowship to be awarded to two exceptional first- or seconstudents enrolled in an Ohio law school. The fellowship is funded by the Chief Justice Thomas J. Moyer L Fund at the Ohio State Bar Foundation (OSBF), honoring his commitment to the legal profession and his s interest in Ohio's law students.

The fellowship award will be for \$5,000 (\$4,000 from the Moyer Legacy Fund of the OSBF and we have req \$1,000 in matching funds from your law school) to fund a summer opportunity advancing one of Chief J Moyer's primary initiatives. These include:

- providing citizens with improved access to the courts, alternative dispute resolution, and adv technology;
- advancing the tenets for which he stood: civility, ethics, judicial independence and the rule of law;
- working with national and international organizations to promote the principles of judicial independent and the rule of law within the United States and throughout the world; and
- promoting or sustaining civic education.

The award requires that the student devote a minimum of 320 hours over the course of the summer to emplor or supervised independent research. In evaluating Moyer Fellowship applications, the selection committegive priority to projects and activities that involve original research and scholarship, consistent with the purpose of the Fellowship Program and legacy of Chief Justice Moyer.

The fellowship grant process is competitive and law students must submit a:

- Law Student Application, including a comprehensive description of the proposed summer emplo or independent as outlined in the attached application materials,
- Current Resume, and
- Supervisor Agreement.

Please review the instructions carefully before beginning the application and allow yourself, and your super ample time to complete the required information.

Mike Eidson Scholarship

The American Association for Justice (AAJ) promotes justice and fairness for injured persons, safeguards victims' rights—particularly the right to trial by jury—and strengthens the civil justice system through education and disclosure of information critical to public health and safety. RULES FOR THE 2020 BROWN AWARD OF \$10,000 FOR EXCELLENCE IN LEGAL WRITING

The Judge John R. Brown Scholarship Foundation is pleased to announce the twenty-seventh annual Brown Award. The Award honors excellence in legal writing in American law schools. Any law student currently enrolled in an accredited law school in the United States seeking a J.D. or LL.B degree is eligible to submit a paper for the Award. The amounts awarded for 2020 will be as follows:

\$10,000 First Place, \$5,000 Second Place, \$3,000 Third Place, \$1,000 Finalist, \$1,000 Finalist, and

\$5,000 to the Scholarship Fund selected by the Dean of the law school in which the First Place candidate is enrolled.

In order to be considered, two copies of a current legal writing must be submitted to the Foundation c/o Kenneth G. Engerrand, Brown Sims, P.C., Tenth Floor, 1177 West Loop South, Houston, Texas 77027-9007. The article must be accompanied by a letter of recommendation from a law school faculty member or legal professional other than the author of the paper. Only one paper may be submitted on behalf of any student, and only one paper may be sponsored by any faculty member or legal professional. The submission must be postmarked no later than May 29, 2020. The submission must contain a separate sheet containing the title of the paper; the name, physical address, telephone number, and email address of the student; and the name, title, physical address, and email address of the student's sponsor. There is no page limitation or restriction on the topic except that the writing must be on a legal subject. Papers that have been submitted to a law review for publication are eligible, but the submission must be of the paper in its form before it was edited by anyone other than the author.

The Foundation will appoint a final judging panel consisting of a law school dean, a federal judge, and a law school professor. The Foundation will not return any material submitted to the Foundation. The 2020 recipient of the Brown Award will be notified by December 4, 2020, and listed with the other finalists at the website

PLEASE NOTE - MPRE Test Changes:

- The MPRE is no longer administered during a single two-hour period on Saturday. Instead, students will select one of several two-hour appointment times on one of the two weekday test dates. There will also be weekday administrations for the August and October MPRE administrations.
- The test will be administered on a computer at a Pearson VUE testing center. This is a new location compared to past administrations. Students will select a testing center when they schedule their test appointment.
- There is no late registration deadline. The earlier students register with NCBE and schedule their appointment with Pearson VUE, the more likely they will be to get an appointment with their desired location, date, and test time.
- If students plan to test in March and will be seeking accommodations under the ADA, they should apply for accommodations as soon as possible to allow us time to review their application. Those applying for accommodations should check their NCBE File Cabinets frequently for updates on their accommodations applications.
