Mary Van Nostrand-Titus Letters, 1803-1818

Biographical Sketch

Mary Van Nostrand (1782-1818) was an upper middleclass woman living in New York in the early 19th century. Her parents, John Van Nostrand and Helena Lefferts, were from prominent families in Brooklyn and Long Island with roots dating back to the 17th century Dutch settlements. Mary Van Nostrand married Walter Titus in 1801, and the couple had eleven children.

Scope and Content Note

The collection consists of a single bound volume of letters, dated 1803-1818 and arranged chronologically. Mary Van Nostrand writes to her husband, Walter Titus, while he is away from home. Topics covered in the letters include their children and other family members, health, travel, and other daily concerns of middle class American women at the time.

The letters were handed down from Mary Van Nostrand to her granddaughter, Sophie Laura Hall Peckham, and then given by Peckham to her daughter Louise.
