

## APPLICATION CHECKLIST

**First-time Freshmen:** Students who have never attended college post high school graduation or students who took college courses during the summer immediately following high school graduation. Students who have taken post-secondary (college) courses while enrolled in high school are considered first-time freshmen.

- Application for admission
- \$40 admission application fee
- Official high school transcript or official GED diploma and scores
- Official transcripts from all colleges/universities attended
- Official ACT or SAT scores, including one writing section score  
(scores on official high school transcript are acceptable)

For maximum admission scholarship consideration, first-time freshman students must have their application materials post-marked by Jan. 5, 2012.

**Transfer Students:** Students with college credit taken fall semester of the year they graduated from high school or later. Students who took college courses during high school or the summer immediately following graduation are considered first-time freshmen.

**Note:** For maximum admission scholarship consideration, students who have fewer than 15 semester (22 quarter) hours should also submit official high school transcripts/GED scores and ACT/SAT scores.

\* Rates are proposed for the 2011-12 academic year and may not be the same for subsequent years. Tuition and general fees are for 12-16 semester hours. This does not include additional costs such as books, lab/college/program fees, parking and insurance premiums. Room and board rates are based on the Parks Tower/Academic House rates and the Premier 19 Meals plan. Fees are subject to change at any time.

**Note about Selective Services:** All male students, 18 years or older, are required by Ohio law to register with the U.S. Selective Services and to provide proof to the University of their selective service registration. Failure to provide proof requires the University to consider the student an out-of-state resident.

### In-state Tuition Requirements

Residents of Ohio or Monroe County, Mich., for the 12 months immediately preceding enrollment are eligible to pay in-state tuition. The following situations would also qualify a student for in-state tuition; however, special documentation is required and should be sent with the application. All references to Ohio are interchangeable with Monroe County, Mich.

**1. Spouse of someone, or the dependent of a parent or legal guardian, who has resided in Ohio for the past 12 months. Documentation required:**

- Original signed letter on company letterhead from the employer stating that the parent or spouse is currently employed, the employment effective date, and that Ohio taxes are being withheld.
- Copy of a lease agreement or the first page of an official document showing the spouse or parent owns a home in Ohio.
- Copy of spouse's or parent's federal and Ohio tax returns.
- Copy of spouse's or parent's Ohio driver's license or state of Ohio I.D.

**2. Spouse of someone, or the dependent of a parent or legal guardian, who accepted full-time employment in Ohio and established domicile in Ohio as of the first day of the semester. Documentation required:**

- Original signed letter on company letterhead from the employer stating that the parent or spouse is currently employed **full time** in Ohio, the employment effective date, the base salary amount, and that Ohio taxes are being withheld.
  - Copy of a lease agreement or the first page of an official document showing the spouse or parent owns a home in Ohio.
  - For dependent students, copy of parent's federal and Ohio tax returns to confirm student's dependent status.
- 3. A person who is full- or part-time employed in Ohio and is self-supporting on Ohio taxable funds from employment (not including additional aid or source of income that may be received) and will be attending on a part-time basis through the 12-month period. Documentation required:**
- Original signed letter on company letterhead from the employer stating employment effective date, that he/she is currently employed, number of hours worked per week, base salary amount (annual or weekly), and that Ohio taxes are being withheld.
  - Copy of a lease agreement or the first page of an official document showing that he/she owns a home in Ohio.
  - Most recent pay stub showing Ohio taxable earnings year-to-date.
- 4. A person who enters and remains on active duty status in the U.S. military service while a resident of Ohio for all other legal purposes and his/her dependents and spouse shall be considered Ohio residents, as long as Ohio remains the state of such person's domicile. Documentation required:**
- A copy of his/her current military orders, if on active duty, or discharge papers indicating that Ohio is the state of record or a copy of a current LES (Leave and Earnings Statement) showing that Ohio taxes are being withheld.

5. **A person who is on active duty status in the U.S. military service and is stationed and resides in Ohio and his/her dependents and spouse shall be considered residents of Ohio. Documentation required:**

- A copy of his or her current military orders showing that the person is stationed in Ohio or that Ohio is the state of record, or a copy of a current LES (Leave & Earnings Statement) showing that Ohio taxes are being withheld.

6. **Effective April 2009, the Ohio GI Promise allows qualified veterans to be considered Ohio residents for the purpose of in-state tuition rates. The GI Promise covers the veteran, veteran's spouse and any dependent(s) of the veteran, when the following conditions are met:**

- The veteran has been honorably discharged or medically separated from service with at least one year of service. Veteran dependents also are eligible if the veteran was killed (KIA), declared missing in action (MIA) or a prisoner of war (POW).
  - Eligibility should be documented by form DD-214.
- The veteran has established domicile in Ohio as of the first day of enrollment. In cases where the veteran was KIA, MIA or POW, only the dependents need be domiciled in Ohio. The following documentation is needed:
  - A copy of a lease under which the veteran is the lessee and occupant of the rented residential property in the state;
  - A copy of the closing statement on residential real property located in Ohio of which the veteran is the owner and occupant; or
  - If the veteran is not the lessee or owner of the residence in which he or she has established domicile, a sworn affidavit from the owner of the residence stating the date the veteran began residing at that residence.



## HOUSING POLICY

University policy requires all first-time freshmen who are not living with a parent or legal guardian within a 50-mile radius of UT to live in a University residence hall and participate in the meal plan program. ## HONORS COLLEGE

First-time freshmen and transfer students are encouraged to apply. Students must be admitted to one of the other baccalaureate colleges in order to be considered for the Honors College. We review applications individually, and we consider the following:

- 3.5 high school or transfer GPA
- 25 ACT/1150 SAT combined Reading and Mathematics (for first-time freshmen only)
- Honors essay
- Resume of activities
- Involvement in your community

## ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS FOR FIRST-TIME FRESHMEN

**First-time Freshmen:** Students who have never attended college post high school graduation or students who took college courses during the summer immediately following high school graduation. Students who have taken post-secondary (college) courses while enrolled in high school are considered first-time freshmen.

### Out-of-State Residents

The open admission policy applies to students who are residents of Monroe County, Mich. All other out-of-state students must have a minimum high school cumulative GPA of 2.0 on a 4.0 scale and a 21 ACT composite score (990 SAT combined reading and math score), and one writing section score for admission. Qualified students who do not meet test score requirements will be reviewed on an individual basis.

### Academic Core Requirements

For unconditional admission, UT requires completion of specific college preparatory curriculum course work. The minimum academic core requirements are:

- 4 years/units of English
- 3 years/units of natural science
- 3 years/units of social science
- 3 years/units of math (including algebra I and II and geometry or equivalent)

### ACT/SAT and Placement Test Scores

For admission, students must submit either an ACT or SAT score including one writing section score. Based upon a student's major and the ACT or SAT score, students may be required to take placement tests. Results from these assessment tools will assist in placing students in courses.

### GED Scores/Diploma

Students utilizing the GED must submit an official copy of their GED (General Education Development) diploma and scores. You can obtain a copy of your GED from the Department of Education in the state where you took the GED test.

## High School Transcripts

A first-time freshman must send an official high school transcript, complete with a stamped graduation date, to the Office of Undergraduate Admission. This is in addition to the official partial transcript sent with the application. Final acceptance and college/program placement will be offered based upon the submission of an official high school transcript (eighth semester) with a stamped graduation date.



## COLLEGE/PROGRAM ADMISSION STANDARDS

UT colleges and programs have specific admission criteria that must be met. Programs may have additional criteria not listed here; please check the program's Web site for the most complete information. Admitted students who do not meet the specific college/program requirements will be offered admission to other programs, such as the UT Learning Collaborative Gateway Program, which will assist students in gaining admission. In the following chart, GPA requirements are based on final cumulative (eighth semester) GPA, not semester GPA; the ACT score refers to a composite score; and the SAT score is a combined reading and math score.

- 2.0 GPA or GED or 19 ACT/910 SAT, and
- 25 years old or older or military/veteran status

### College of Business and Innovation

#### Bachelor of Business Administration programs

#### Information Technology program

- 2.5 GPA or GED average score of 480, and
- 21 ACT/990 SAT

*Students not meeting these requirements will be admitted into an associate's degree in the College of Business and Innovation. Upon meeting a 2.4 UT college GPA, students are permitted to transfer into the programs of their choice.*

*Please note that students admitted into programs other than their first choice due to admission criteria may still complete course work toward their intended program.*

#### Applied Organizational Technology Associate Degree programs

- 2.0 GPA or 18 ACT/870 SAT or passing GED average score

*Students not meeting these requirements will be admitted to the Gateway Program in the UT Learning Collaborative.*

### College of Engineering

#### Engineering Science programs

- 3.0 GPA or GED average score of 510, and
- 22 ACT/1030 SAT
- 4 years of high school math (fourth-year emphasis on trigonometry or pre-calculus) and high school chemistry; high school physics is strongly recommended

*Students not meeting these requirements will be reviewed for the Engineering Technology programs.*

#### Bioengineering B.S./M.D. program

*GED holders and students not meeting these requirements will be admitted to the Gateway Program in the UT Learning Collaborative*

### College of Nursing

- 19 ACT/910 SAT

Upon completion of the pre-nursing curriculum, there is a competitive admission process for the professional sequence.

*GED holders and students not meeting these requirements will be admitted to the Gateway Program in the UT Learning Collaborative.*

### College of Pharmacy and Pharmaceutical Sciences

All students admitted into the preprofessional program with:

- 2.5 GPA or GED or 20 ACT/950 SAT

*Students not meeting these requirements will be admitted to the Gateway Program in the UT Learning Collaborative.*

Contingent admission to the Professional Division is available on a competitive basis. To be considered, the following must be completed in the year preceding fall admission:

- Achieve and report by December 1, 2011, a 29 ACT/1300 SAT
- 3.75 GPA in a college preparatory high school curriculum
- Application postmarked by December 1, 2011

Additional materials will be requested. Final notification of contingent admission status will occur in mid-March.

## ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS FOR TRANSFER STUDENTS

**Transfer students:** Students with college credit taken fall semester of the year they graduated from high school or later. Students who took college courses during high school or the summer immediately following graduation are considered first-time freshmen.

Transfer students with a minimum higher education GPA of 2.0, for all college work taken, who do not meet college/program admission requirements below will be admitted to the UT Learning Collaborative Transition Program. Students with a GPA below 2.0 may be admitted to the UT Learning Collaborative Gateway Program. A completed application along with all official transcripts must be received 10 days prior to the start of the term.

### Placement tests

Based upon a student's major, students may be required to take placement tests.

*Students are encouraged to apply for fall semester. Application materials must be received no later than May 1, 2012, for consideration for summer or fall 2012.*
