TO COMPLETE THE APPLICATION FOR ADMISSION PROCESS, YOU NEED TO:

Note: All documents must be in English. Certified English translations must accompany documents not available in English.

- Completed and signed application for admission
- \$40 U.S.D. non-refundable application fee (Do not send cash. Please use International money orders or checks from a bank that is chartered with a U.S. bank only, made payable to The University of Toledo.)
- Official transcripts for all course work
- Official letter from your sponsor's bank verifying sufficient funding
- Official International TOEFL (UT's school code is 1845) / IELTS Score Report (if taken) If you have taken the international TOEFL or the IELTS you must have your official score report forwarded to The University of Toledo.

Your admission application also serves as an application for undergraduate international student awards.

APPLICATION FEE

The fee is \$40 U.S.D. It is non-refundable and is required of all applicants. Do not send cash. The acceptable methods for paying the application fee are either an international money order or a check from a bank in your country that is chartered with a U.S. bank. To make sure that your bank is chartered with a U.S. bank, call the international division of your bank.

DEFINITION OF STUDENTS

New International Students – Students who have never attended a college/university after secondary/high school graduation. Students who have taken post-secondary (college) courses while enrolled in high school are considered first-time freshmen.

Transfer International Students – Students with post-secondary credit taken after they graduated from secondary high school.

ACADEMIC RECORDS

New international student: You must submit official transcripts (from each year) from all secondary/high schools attended. If you have attended a post-secondary college or university while in secondary/high school, you must also provide these official transcripts.

Transfer international student: You must submit official transcripts from all post-secondary colleges/universities you have attended. Please submit course syllabi and/or course descriptions of all coursework attempted for the evaluation of transfer credit.

Original transcripts or certified true copies of transcripts are considered official. If the official transcripts are not in English, you must submit both the original and an official English translation. U.S. Embassies and U.S. Consulates are sometimes able to certify translations.

If you have attended any post-secondary colleges or universities, please submit course syllabi and/or course descriptions for the evaluation of transfer credit.

YOUR NAME ON DOCUMENTS

Materials for applicants are filed alphabetically under the family name (surname) as indicated by the applicant on the application form. It is important that you use the same name and spelling on all forms, documents and correspondence. Your name must appear the same on your documents as on your passport. Any changes or variations in names on academic records need to be carefully explained by a cover letter and accompanied by a copy of the identification page of your passport.

TOEFL/IELTS

The University of Toledo offers conditional undergraduate admission pending English language proficiency to students who have not met The University of Toledo's TOEFL/ IELTS requirement. A minimum international TOEFL score of 500 on the paper-based test, a 173 on the computer-based test, or a 61 on the Internet-based test, or a minimum score of 5.5 on the IELTS is required for full time undergraduate registration. Students who have been conditionally admitted will take The University of Toledo's institutional TOEFL (paper-based test) upon arrival. Students not earning a 500 on the institutional TOEFL will be automatically admitted to the American Language Institute for intensive English language instruction. Students are responsible for having their official score reports submitted to UT by the testing agency.

FINANCIAL DOCUMENTATION

Applicants are required to provide supporting documentation to verify adequate funding to pursue studies at UT. Undergraduate applicants must complete Section 3: Financial Information portion of the application. Your sponsor must verify that the minimum amount necessary for tuition, fees and living expenses will be available to you. The estimated amount necessary for one academic year appears in the Financial Information section of the application form.

GENERAL ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS FOR NEW INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

The average cumulative grade point average (GPA) for first-year students enrolling in the fall 2008 semester was 3.13. Although this average should not be construed as a minimum requirement for admission, it provides an academic benchmark of our currently enrolled student population.

PROGRAM ADMISSION STANDARDS

UT colleges and programs have specific admission criteria that must be met in order to be admitted to that college. For example, students who do not meet these requirements will be admitted as specified below. Students admitted as premajors participate in the Academic Skills Enhancement (ASE) program, which provides intensive instruction, tutoring, advising and other support services.

GPA requirements are based on a cumulative GPA, not semester GPA score.

- 2.25 GPA or 20 ACT/950 SAT

Students not meeting these requirements will be reviewed for the Applied Organizational Technology Associate Degree programs.

Applied Organizational Technology Associate Degree programs

Information Technology program

- 2.25 GPA and 21 ACT/990 SAT

Students who meet the ACT/SAT requirement with a 2.0 GPA will be reviewed for the Applied Organizational Technology Associate Degree programs. Students with a 2.0 GPA and less than a 21 ACT/990 SAT will be admitted to the UT Learning Collaborative.

Judith Herb College of Education

- 2.0 GPA or 19 ACT/910 SAT

Students not meeting these requirements will be admitted to the UT Learning Collaborative.

College of Engineering

Engineering Science programs

- 3.0 GPA and 22 ACT/1030 SAT
- 4 years of high school math (fourth-year emphasis on trigonometry or precalculus) and high school chemistry; high school physics is strongly recommended

Students not meeting these requirements will be reviewed for the Engineering Technology programs.

Bioengineering B.S./M.D. program

- Recommended 3.8 GPA and 29 ACT/1300 SAT. Contact the bioengineering adviser for details.

Engineering Technology programs

- 2.0 GPA and 21 ACT/990 SAT

Students who meet the GPA requirement with a 19-20 ACT (910-950 SAT) will be admitted to the UT Learning Collaborative. Students with less than a 2.0 GPA and less than a 19 ACT/910 SAT will be admitted to the UT Learning Collaborative.

Information Technology program

- 2.25 GPA and 21 ACT/990 SAT

Students who meet the ACT/SAT requirement with a 2.0 GPA will be reviewed for the Engineering Technology programs. Students with a 2.0 GPA and less than a 21 ACT/990 SAT will be admitted to the UT Learning Collaborative.

College of Health Science and Human Service

- Students must have an ACT/SAT score for admission directly into the college
- 2.0 GPA or 24 ACT/1110 SAT

Students not meeting these requirements will be admitted to UT Learning Collaborative. Students can transfer into the college from UT Learning Collaborative with 12 hours of college credit work and a 2.0 college GPA.

Cardiovascular Technology and Respiratory Care programs

- 2.5 GPA
- Successful completion of three years of high school math, biology and chemistry with a "C" or better
- Once admitted, students must file a separate application with the college's admissions committee to participate in the competitive admission process

College of Nursing

All students admitted into the prenursing curriculum with:

- 2.5 GPA
- Successful completion of high school chemistry with a "C" or better
- Upon completion of the prenursing curriculum there is a competitive admission process for the professional sequence

Students not meeting these requirements will be admitted to UT Learning Collaborative.

College of Pharmacy

All students admitted into the preprofessional program with:

- 2.0 GPA or 19 ACT/910 SAT
- Although not required, a 3.0 GPA, 22 ACT/1030 SAT, and high school chemistry and precalculus are strongly recommended

Students not meeting these requirements will be admitted to the UT Learning Collaborative.

Contingent admission to the Professional Division is available on a competitive basis. To be considered, the following must be completed in the year preceding fall admission:

- Achieve and report by Dec. 1, 2008, a 29 ACT/1300 SAT
- 3.75 GPA in a college preparatory high school curriculum
- Application postmarked by Dec. 1, 2008

Additional materials may be requested. Final notification of contingent admission status will occur in mid-March.

Transfer students cannot be automatically admitted into the professional division, regardless of credits earned at other institutions. Only second-year prepharmacy students currently enrolled at UT are considered for the professional division.

Students who are not Ohio residents and/or have completed course work at a non-Ohio institution will be considered on an individual basis. Such applicants with a GPA below 3.0 are rarely considered.

Students are encouraged to apply for fall semester — application materials must be received no later than May 1, 2009, for consideration for summer or fall 2009.

HOUSING

University policy requires all first-year students who are not living with parents or a legal guardian to live in a University residence hall and participate in the meal plan program. There are 12 on-campus residence halls. The Horton International House is home to domestic and international men and women. Located in the center of UT’s campus, this seven-level, air-conditioned structure features a cafeteria, glass-enclosed lounge areas, a computer lab, laundry facilities, a multi-purpose room and several areas for cultural displays. A ritual wash room is also provided for students with specific religious practices.

Residents of the east wing are not required to participate in the campus meal plan. Instead, they can create their own meals in a kitchen located on their floor. Each kitchen has an adjacent dining room. Students in the east wing also have the option of a 12-month rental contract or may choose the traditional 9-month contract during the academic year. Applications for on-campus housing are mailed to admitted students along with their letter of acceptance.

On-campus housing assignments are made on a first-come, first-served basis. To apply for on-campus housing, submit a housing application and a \$40 application fee. A \$200 prepayment is due by June 1, 2009 to hold your spot. If you decide to cancel your on-campus housing assignment, the \$200 housing prepayment is refundable according to the following table:

The Office of International Student Services will assist eligible students interested in living off campus in finding housing upon arrival. However, they cannot make any arrangements prior to students' arrival. At present, apartment rents range from \$300 to over \$600 per month; utilities (gas and electric) are generally not included.

The University operates a free shuttle bus service to the major apartment complexes for use by students. Although there is public bus transportation in Toledo, both the number of bus routes and the hours of service are limited. Although some students buy used automobiles, this is an expensive option. Bicycles are a more common mode of transport for international students.

IMPORTANT DATES AND DEADLINES

Application Priority Deadline

Undergraduate applicants are advised to apply at least three months prior to the anticipated semester of enrollment. This allows time to make all the arrangements necessary prior to departure, such as obtaining the necessary visas and making travel arrangements. International admission will accept complete applications up to the following priority dates.

SCHOLARSHIPS AND FINANCIAL AID

Federal and state funds are not available to international students.

The University of Toledo offers four admission awards to qualified international students. You will automatically be considered for all of these awards by submitting a completed admission application. A completed admission application includes the application for admission (pages 7-8), all official academic transcripts, the official letter from your sponsor's bank verifying sufficient funding, your international TOEFL score report (UT's school code is 1845) or IELTS score report (if taken) and the \$40 U.S.D. application fee.

Sister Cities Award

The Sister Cities Award is guaranteed to new undergraduate students enrolled for a minimum of 15 credit hours per semester whose permanent address is within one of the Toledo Sister Cities/Regions at the same time as application, including:

- Toledo, Spain
- Londrina, Brazil
- Qinhuangdao, China
- Szeged, Hungary
- Csongrad, Hungary
- Bekaa Valley, Lebanon
- Poznan, Poland
- Toyohashi, Japan
- Tanga, Tanzania

This award will cover 100 percent of the out-of-state tuition surcharge, valued at \$8,812 U.S.D. for the 08-09 academic year.

To be eligible for this award, students must be admissible* to the University. Renewal criteria requires maintaining academic eligibility** to attend UT and the successful completion of 30 credit hours each academic year. Students are eligible for this award until they earn an undergraduate degree, but must do so within 15 semesters over a maximum of five consecutive years.

Legacy Award

The Legacy Award is guaranteed to new undergraduate students enrolled for a minimum of 15 credit hours per semester whose mother, father or legal guardian is a graduate of The University of Toledo. This award will cover 100 percent of the out-of-state tuition surcharge, valued at \$8,812 U.S.D. for the 08-09 academic year.

To be eligible for this award, students must be admissible to the University. Renewal criteria requires maintaining academic eligibility to attend UT and the successful completion of 30 credit hours each academic year. Students are eligible for this award until they earn an undergraduate degree, but must do so within 15 semesters over a maximum of five consecutive years.

International Rocket Scholarship

The International Rocket Scholarship is offered to new undergraduate international students who are entering the university as an adult, transfer or directly from high school who have a minimum grade point average of 3.0 on a 4.0 scale. The scholarship covers the out of state surcharge, valued at \$8,812 U.S.D. for the 08-09 academic year. Students whose native language is not English must have a minimum international TOEFL score of 500 paper based, 173 computer based, or 61 internet based test or a minimum IELTS score of 5.5 and be academically admissible to receive this award. This scholarship is limited to full-time, non-immigrant F1 visa holders. The scholarship is renewable and requires the student to maintain a 3.0 GPA and the successful completion of 30 credit hours each academic year. Students are eligible for this award until they earn an undergraduate degree, but must do so within 15 semesters over a maximum of five consecutive years. A completed international undergraduate application for admission, all required transcripts, \$40 application fee, and official passing TOEFL or IELTS report must be postmarked by the application priority deadline for the term of application.* Students who apply directly to the American Language Institute (ALI) at The University of Toledo and students who meet the academic requirement but are referred to the ALI will be eligible for this award upon the successful completion of the ALI program. This scholarship will not be applied to the out of state fees associated with the ALI. This scholarship can not be combined with other awards offered from the Office of Undergraduate Admission.

Students who are selected for the International Rocket Scholarship will be given the opportunity to compete for a limited number of scholarships. Students will be invited to write an essay on a topic selected by the International Scholarship Committee.

AMERICAN LANGUAGE INSTITUTE

The American Language Institute (ALI), a unit of the Office of International Student Services, offers intensive language training for students in English as a second language. The curriculum consists of 20 hours of instruction each week, plus 2-3 hours of supervised laboratory instruction. All full-time instructors hold advanced degrees in teaching English as a second language or related fields. Classes average 10 students per section.

PREPARATION FOR TRAVEL

Passports and Visas – All international students should obtain a passport from their government. Students accepted by UT usually enter the United States on a Student Visa (F-1) or Exchange Visitor Visa (J-1). Information regarding the U.S. Visa application process is located at www.unitedstatesvisas.gov.

UT sends most students a Certificate of Eligibility, Form I-20, to be used in obtaining the F-1 Student Visa. At the request of a student, the University can also issue the Form DS-2019 to be used in obtaining the J-1 Exchange Visitor Visa. You should take the Form I-20 or the Form DS-2019 to the nearest U.S. Embassy or Consulate to apply for a student visa. The U.S. Embassy or Consulate will require that you document financial support.

We recommend requesting your I-20 be sent by express mail (DHL). If admitted, we will send you an I-20 by courier. Cost for this service is \$50 U.S.D. (subject to change). If you choose this option, please fill out Section 6 on the application and submit a separate check or money order for \$50 U.S.D. made payable to The University of Toledo. This is in addition to the \$40 U.S.D. application fee.

If we are unable to issue you an I-20, we will correspond through regular mail and hold your payment until we are able to send your I-20, or return your payment to you if an I-20 cannot be issued.

Immunizations – Most countries require travelers to have immunizations. You should ask an officer at the U.S. Embassy or Consulate which immunizations are required. Remember that some immunizations take several weeks to complete.

SEVIS Fee – All international students who apply for an F-1 or J-1 visa must pay the SEVIS (Student & Exchange Visitor Information System) fee prior to the visa application process. Information regarding the payment process will be sent to students at the time their I-20 or DS-2019 is issued..

Academic Year Expenses – Some government agencies or banks may require a statement concerning the cost of a student's education in the U.S. You may present your I-20 to any authority needing such information.
