In-state Tuition Requirements

Residents of Ohio or Monroe County, Mich., for the 12 months immediately preceding enrollment are eligible to pay in-state tuition. The following situations would also qualify a student for in-state tuition; however, special documentation is required and should be sent with the application. All references to Ohio are interchangeable with Monroe County, Mich.

1. Spouse of someone, or the dependent of a parent or legal guardian, who has resided in Ohio for the past 12 months. Documentation required:

- Original signed letter on company letterhead from the employer stating that the parent or spouse is currently employed, the employment effective date, and that Ohio taxes are being withheld.
- Copy of a lease agreement or the first page of an official document showing the spouse or parent owns a home in Ohio.
- Copy of spouse's or parent's federal and Ohio tax returns.
- Copy of spouse's or parent's Ohio driver's license or state of Ohio I.D.

2. Spouse of someone, or the dependent of a parent or legal guardian, who accepted full-time employment in Ohio and established domicile in Ohio as of the first day of the semester. Documentation required:

- Original signed letter on company letterhead from the employer stating that the parent or spouse is currently employed **full time** in Ohio, the employment effective date, the base salary amount, and that Ohio taxes are being withheld.

- Copy of a lease agreement or the first page of an official document showing the spouse or parent owns a home in Ohio.
 - For dependent students, copy of parent's federal and Ohio tax returns to confirm student's dependent status.
- 3. A person who is full- or part-time employed in Ohio and is self-supporting on Ohio taxable funds from employment (not including additional aid or source of income that may be received) and will be attending on a part-time basis through the 12-month period. Documentation required:**
- Original signed letter on company letterhead from the employer stating employment effective date; that he/she is currently employed; number of hours worked per week; base salary amount (annual or weekly); and that Ohio taxes are being withheld.
 - Copy of a lease agreement or the first page of an official document showing that he/she owns a home in Ohio.
 - Most recent pay stub showing Ohio taxable earnings year-to-date.
- 4. A person who enters and remains on active duty status in the U.S. military service while a resident of Ohio for all other legal purposes and his/her dependents shall be considered Ohio residents, as long as Ohio remains the state of such person's domicile. Documentation required:**
- A copy of his/her current military orders, if on active duty, or discharge papers indicating that Ohio is the state of record or a copy of a current LES (Leave and Earnings Statement) showing that Ohio taxes are being withheld.

5. A person who is on active duty status in the U.S. military service and is stationed and resides in Ohio and his or her dependents shall be considered residents of Ohio.

Documentation required:

- A copy of his or her current military orders showing that the person is stationed in Ohio or that Ohio is the state of record; or a copy of a current LES (Leave & Earnings Statement) showing that Ohio taxes are being withheld.



HOUSING POLICY

University policy requires all traditional first-year students who are not living with parents or legal guardians, within a 50 mile radius, to live in a University residence hall and participate in the meal plan program. HONORS PROGRAM

University Honors Program – January 11, 2010 Priority Deadline

Although Honors students typically have a high school GPA of 3.75 or higher and an ACT composite score of 28 (1260 combined Reading and Mathematics SAT score) or higher, students with a 3.5 GPA and a 25 ACT composite (1150 combined SAT score) are also encouraged to apply. We review applications individually, and we consider your Honors essay, resume of activities, and involvement in the community in addition to your GPA and standardized test scores.

Transfer students with a 3.5 higher education GPA or higher are encouraged to apply for the program. Please contact the Honors Program for further details.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS FOR FIRST-TIME FRESHMEN

First-time Freshmen: Students who have never attended college post high school graduation or students who took college courses during the summer immediately following high school graduation. Students who have taken post-secondary (college) courses while enrolled in high school are considered first-time freshmen.

Out-of-State Residents

The open admission policy applies to students who are residents of Monroe County, Mich. All other out-of-state students must have a minimum high school cumulative GPA of 2.0 on a 4.0 scale and a 21 ACT composite score (990 SAT combined reading and math score, and one writing section score) for admission. Qualified students who do not meet test score requirements will be reviewed on an individual basis.

Academic Core Requirements

For unconditional admission, UT requires completion of specific college preparatory curriculum course work. The minimum academic core requirements are:

- 4 years/units of English
- 3 years/units of natural science
- 3 years/units of social science
- 3 years/units of math (including algebra I and II and geometry or equivalent)

ACT/SAT and Placement Test Scores

For unconditional admission, students must submit either an ACT or SAT score including one writing section score. Based upon a student's major and the ACT or SAT score, students may be required to take placement tests. Results from these assessment tools will assist in placing students in courses.

GED Scores/Diploma

Students utilizing the GED must submit an official copy of their GED (General Education Development) diploma and scores. You can obtain a copy of your GED from the Department of Education in the state where you took the GED test.

High School/College Transcripts

A first-time freshman must send an official high school transcript, complete with a stamped graduation date, to the Office of Undergraduate Admission. This is in addition to the official partial transcript sent with the application. Final acceptance and college/program placement will be offered based upon the submission of an official high school transcript (8th semester) with a stamped graduation date.

COLLEGE/PROGRAM ADMISSION STANDARDS

UT colleges and programs have specific admission criteria that must be met. Admitted students who do not meet the specific college/program requirements will be offered admission to other programs, such as the UT Learning Collaborative Gateway Program, which will assist students in gaining admission. In the following chart, GPA requirements are based on final cumulative (8th semester) GPA, not semester GPA; the ACT score refers to a composite score; and the SAT score is a combined reading and math score.



College of Arts and Sciences

- 2.25 GPA or 20 ACT/950 SAT

Students not meeting these requirements will be admitted to the UT Learning Collaborative Gateway Program.

Premedical, Predental and Preveterinary program

- 3.0 GPA or 25 ACT/1150 SAT
- Recommended 3.8 GPA and 29 ACT/1300 SAT for Bac/M.D. option. Contact the premed adviser for details.

Music program

- Audition required (call 419.530.2448 for an appointment)

College of Business Administration

Bachelor of Business Administration programs

- 2.8 GPA or 25 ACT/ 1150 SAT

Students not meeting these requirements will be reviewed for the Applied Organizational Technology Associate Degree programs.

Applied Organizational Technology Associate Degree programs

- 2.0 GPA or 18 ACT (870 SAT)

Information Technology program

- 2.25 GPA and 21 ACT/990 SAT

Students not meeting these requirements will be admitted to the UT Learning Collaborative Gateway Program.

Judith Herb College of Education

- 2.5 GPA or 20 ACT/950 SAT

Students not meeting these requirements will be admitted to the UT Learning Collaborative Gateway Program.

College of Engineering

Engineering Science programs

- 3.0 GPA and 22 ACT/1030 SAT
- 4 years of high school math (fourth-year emphasis on trigonometry or precalculus) and high school chemistry; high school physics is strongly recommended

Students not meeting these requirements will be reviewed for the Engineering Technology programs.

Bioengineering B.S./M.D. program

- Recommended 3.8 GPA and 29 ACT/1300 SAT. Contact the bioengineering adviser for details.

Engineering Technology programs

- 2.25 GPA and 21 ACT/990 SAT

Students not meeting these requirements will be admitted to the UT Learning Collaborative Gateway Program.

Information Technology program

- 2.25 GPA and 21 ACT/990 SAT

Students not meeting these requirements will be admitted to the UT Learning Collaborative Gateway Program.

College of Health Science and Human Service

- Students must have an ACT/SAT score for admission directly into the college
- 2.0 GPA or 24 ACT/1110 SAT

Students not meeting these requirements will be admitted to UT Learning Collaborative Gateway Program. Students can transfer into the college from UT Learning Collaborative Gateway Program with 12 hours of college credit work and a 2.0 college GPA.

Selective Admission Programs

- Students are admitted into the pre-professional programs.
- There is a competitive admissions process for the professional programs.

College of Nursing

All students admitted into the prenursing BSN curriculum with:

- 3.0 GPA, and
- 19 ACT / 910 SAT (either with writing score)
- Upon completion of the prenursing curriculum, there is a competitive admission process for the professional sequence.

Students not meeting these requirements will be admitted to the UT Learning Collaborative Gateway Program.

College of Pharmacy

All students admitted into the preprofessional program with:

- 2.0 GPA or 19 ACT/910 SAT
- Although not required, a 3.0 GPA, 22 ACT/1030 SAT, and high school chemistry and precalculus are strongly recommended.

Students not meeting these requirements will be admitted to the UT Learning Collaborative Gateway Program.

Contingent admission to the Professional Division is available on a competitive basis. To be considered, the following must be completed in the year preceding fall admission:

- Achieve and report by Dec. 1, 2009, a 29 ACT/1300 SAT
- 3.75 GPA in a college preparatory high school curriculum
- Application postmarked by Dec. 1, 2009

Additional materials may be requested. Final notification of contingent admission status will occur in mid-March.

Undecided/Exploratory Students

A student who has a specific college preference but is undecided on a major within that college may apply as undecided to that college. Students who are undecided about their college and major will be admitted into the QUEST program in the UT Learning Collaborative Gateway Program.

Students not meeting these requirements will be admitted to the UT Learning Collaborative Gateway Program.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS FOR TRANSFER STUDENTS

Transfer students: Students with college credit taken fall semester of the year they graduated from high school or later. Students who took college courses during high school or the summer immediately following graduation are considered first-time freshmen.

Transfer students with a minimum higher education GPA of 2.0 who do not meet college/program admission requirements below will be admitted to the UT Learning Collaborative Transition Program. Students with a GPA below 2.0 may be admitted to the UT Learning Collaborative Gateway Program.

A completed application along with all official transcripts must be received 10 days prior to the start of the term.

Placement tests

Based upon a student's major, students may be required to take placement tests.
