HIST 2650: MODERN RUSSIA Fall 2022-ONLINE

DR. BARRY JACKISCH


Russia's brutal invasion of its neighboring country of Ukraine brought renewed world attention to his region. This course will provide students with an historical background to Russia's rise as a modern imperial power, its revolutionary upheaval and development as the world's first and largest communist state, and ultimately its transformation into a troubled world power under Vladimir Putin into the 21st century.



HIST 3250: African American History to 1865

DR. SHIRLEY GREEN MW 12:55- 2:15 IN PERSON

This course surveys the history of people of African descent in the United States, focusing on social, political, and cultural issues pertinent to the African American experience from its African background to 1865. It traces two of the four great migrations of African Americans: the transatlantic passage and the interior migration of African Americans after the abolition of the transatlantic slave trade. It begins with a study of West Africa and ends at the conclusion of the Civil War.



HIST 3310: Ethnic America

Dr. Chelsea Griffis

Face-to-Face Course

The United States has been considered a melting pot, an amalgamation of people from different nations and cultures who, together, become "American." This means that the US had (and has) a diverse ethnic population, including Native Americans, European colonists and imperialists, enslaved Africans who were brought by force, and a wide range of immigrants from Europe, Latin and South America, Asia, and the Middle East. The history of Ethnic America is the story of how these groups of people interacted and experienced life in the land we now call the United States.

This course is a survey of United States ethnic history with a focus on the processes of migration, group interactions, and the construction of cultural identities. A broad chronological scope considers ethnic and racial diversity from the colonial era up to recent decades. A study of individuals and groups is combined with an examination of topics such as U.S. identity and Americanization, migration legislation, and nativism. The main class theme focuses on the question: What does it mean to be an "American" and how has that changed over time? Students are encouraged to think about how historical forces have influenced those changes.



HIST 3530: 20TH CENTURY GERMANY Fall 2022

DR. BARRY JACKISCH M/W 4-5:20

This course tracks the tumultuous history of Germany in the modern era. We will focus on the country's emergence as a unified nation, its role and experience in two world wars, decades of division into two sperate states after 1945, and the country's reunification and place in the 21st century world. We will also consider Germany's many sharp contrasts as a country of substantial economic and cultural influence, but also a state that has unleashed terrible suffering on Europe and the world. This course seeks to understand this paradox more fully.

The Past Among Us

The United States, 1900-1945







In this course we will explore crucial events and turning points in the first half of the 20th century that contributed to the making of the modern world. These include conflicts over race, gender, immigration and citizenship during the 1920s culture wars; U.S. involvement in the world through armed conflict; transformations in U.S. political economy, including the rise of the New Deal and unions; and struggles for full social and political equality among women, African Americans, and others.

HIST 4270-001: 20th Century U.S. to 1945

Are you tired of reading history in a boring old textbook? Do you wish you could learn history in a visual way? Now you can!

HIST 4980-001 HISTORY THROUGH GRAPHIC COMICS



Explore world history through the graphic medium! Students will read a wide variety of graphic texts, including *Wake: The Hidden History of Women-Led Slave Revolts, Abina and the Important Men, The Middle Ages: A Graphic History, Maus, Persepolis*, and more.* In-class discussion will focus on the pros and cons of sharing history through graphic comics and how graphic comics compare with traditional historical narratives. For their final project, students will plan and research a graphic history of their own and then create five pages of the planned project.

HIST 4940: Public History Internship

Do you love museums? Do you enjoy a quiet afternoon in an archive looking through historical documents? Do you want to be the person who helps others learn and become passionate about history? If so, then an internship coordinated through the Department of History is for you!

History interns have worked in places like:

- The Canaday Center archive here at UT
- The River Raisin Battlefield
- The National Museum of the Great Lakes
- The Blissfield Historical Society in MI
- The Toledo Police Museum
- The Henry Ford Museum

Students who successfully complete their internship work 120 hours throughout the course of one semester on an individualized plan with their on-site mentor. This could include writing history essays for the public, helping assembly museum displays, processing archival records, and giving public presentations.

If you're a history major or minor, HIST 4940 fulfills part of your 4000-level class requirements! It also looks great on your resume or CV. Employers want to hire people who can write, think critically, and efficiently analyze information—all skills that you hone during your internship.

Requirements for the Undergraduate Major in History

The major of 33 hours in history must be distributed as follows:

- A. HIST 2000 (4 hours)
- B. Of the remaining 29 hours (or ten courses), four courses must be at the 4000 level. Three of the ten courses must be in the field of United States history, and three of the ten courses must be in fields of non-United States history.
- C. The requirement of 18 hours in related courses is to be met with courses chosen from at least three of the following areas: economics, political science, English and American literature, foreign language, geography, philosophy, sociology, psychology, women's' and gender studies, art history, music history or theatre history. At least 12 of the hours in related courses must be in courses at the 3000 and 4000 levels. The related courses requirement may be met with completion of a minor in another discipline or a second major.

Students may not take P/NC for the minimum requirements for the major, but may opt for P/NC in all related courses.

Requirements for the Undergraduate Minor in History

The minor of 21 hours in history must be distributed as follows:

- A. HIST 2000 (4 hours)
- B. Of the remaining 17 hours (or 6 courses), 3 of the 6 courses must be at the 4000 level.
