COURSE/CATALOG DESCRIPTION

Design, execution, analysis and reporting of research in psychology. Lecture and laboratory. This
course provides a basic understanding of the research methods used most commonly by social
scientists. Topics to be covered include descriptive, correlational and experimental research design,
validity, reliability and the scientific method. The course will also allow you to understand research
reports in social science publications and in the press. It will also help you as you design your own
research.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- Develop your understanding of the research process
- Prepare you to conduct research
- Help you to judge the quality of research
- Prepare you to write APA style reports
- Introduce you to the wonderful world of statistics!
- Learn about psychology and critical thinking not only from the readings and from the instructor, but also through interactions with your colleagues.

TECHNOLOGY REQUIREMENTS

• This course uses Blackboard for assignments and exams and it uses the Connect website for online text, supplementary materials, study aids, practice quizzes, writing assignments, and homework. You will need a fast internet connection and access to a computer. Most of the materials are also compatible with iPads and smartphones.



TEACHING STRATEGIES

• This is a course that meets twice per week for discussion of concepts presented in the textbook and online materials. Read the chapter at least once and do any assignments before the class meets to discuss that chapter. As for any 3-hour course that lasts a full





15 weeks, expect to spend about 9-12 hours per week reading the textbook, going through the online materials (paying special attention to those that are specifically assigned), gaining confidence with the practice quizzes, and studying on your own if you want to get the highest grade of which you are capable.

- You should be seated and ready to begin listening and discussing at 10 AM when the class begins. If you are late, just enter the back of the room quietly and be seated. Activities at the beginning of the class will not be repeated for late comers. Turn off cell phones during class. If you must engage in activities during class that might distract either the instructor or other students, leave the room to do so. Communication with the instructor is most reliable by email. Most questions can be answered quickly in email but you can also stop by to visit in my office during office hours. As your instructor, I am here to help and will respond to email within 24 hours. You should check your university email frequently for messages about the course. You should also log in to Blackboard/Connect every day to put in a little study time and to check for announcements. If you are having difficulty with the course concepts, please let me know so that I can review those topics in class or provide individual explanations.
- Learning Activities rely heavily on students reading the assigned chapter before the class meets in order to be able to participate in the discussion.

GRADING

- Connect Quizzes <u>Using Connect access you will complete chapter quizzes</u>. Full completion of the quiz will result in receiving full credit. These quizzes will be due at the start of class when a new chapter is assigned. Quizzes will consist of 15-20 questions on average.
- Weekly in Class Quizzes There are no exams in this course. However, you will have short quizzes each week. Quizzes will cover material covered in lecture during that week and previous weeks. Weekly quizzes require you to know facts covered in the chapters, understand the ideas presented, and be able to apply them to potential situations.
- Homework. You will be given and expected to complete a number of assignments throughout the semester. These assignments are intended to "exercise" some of the skills that I think are important for you to learn. Some weeks we may have time to complete these assignments in class. However, many of these assignments will be take-home.
- APA Style Research Paper and Oral Presentation. You will conduct a research project during this course and will be expected to write up the results in an APA style report. During the last week of classes or finals week, you will also do an oral presentation with your group to present your experiment. You will work in groups to complete this project. Be present! Your group will have the chance to evaluate your contribution. If these evaluations reveal that you did not pull your weight, this will negatively impact your grade.
- APA Style Research Poster As a researcher, psychologists consistently present their research through poster presentations at conferences. As a group, you will design and complete an APA style poster using guidelines provided in class.
- Plagiarism Tutorial

- 2. If you do want clarification, however, you are required first to submit something in writing, explaining your question. If you think your answer was correct, you must document your belief with evidence from the text.
- 3. After receiving your written questions, the instructor will review your documentation and decide if a grade change is warranted, and then return your test and some written comments. If you still have a concern, please set up an appointment with the instructor.
