Time Commitment for this Course:

As with any 3-hour course, you should expect to spend about 12 hours per week (9 outside of class) working on this course during a standard 15-week semester if you want to earn the highest grade of which you are capable.

Exams:

Exams will be given only on the dates listed in the course calendar unless other arrangements are made. Exams will be taken online on the days assigned, in University Hall 5000.

No textbooks may be used on the exam. However, you may bring *only one handwritten* page of notes with you to each exam. Notes must have your name written on them & will be collected at the end of your exam. There will be *NO* sharing of notes. Failure to follow the rules for the allowed notes will result in you losing notes privileges. If it continues to be an issue, all notes privileges for the entire class will be revoked.

Exam procedure is as follows:

- ✓ Sign in with lab monitor at University Hall 5000.
- ✓ Log in to computer and Blackboard.
- ✓ Locate this course and the current exam.
- ✓ Politely signal lab monitor to enter exam password.
- ✓ Once finished with the exam, sign out of Blackboard and the computer.
- ✓ Hand notes to the lab monitor before you leave

If you miss an exam, you may make it up but there is a penalty of 2 points for every day that it is late. If you must take an exam late because of an unexpected death in your family or your own illness, you must show proof to avoid the penalty.

Quizzes:

Quizzes will be unannounced and can only be made up with a written excuse for missing class. There will be a total of 10 unannounced quizzes throughout the semester. Each quiz will be worth 5 points for a total of 50 possible points.

Extra Credit:

Each student has the opportunity to earn up to 15 extra credit points throughout the semester. You may complete any of the following options no later than the posted due dates. Please see me if you have questions or need clarification.

* Design a developmental research study based on the information provided in the text and in class (January 10). Each study should (at minimum) include a research question, rationale for the study, independent and dependent variables, participant pool, expected outcomes, etc.

Submit by January 17.

* Write a reaction paper to *one* of the following topics discussed in class (5 points):

Child Maltreatment

Indictment (the movie)

Forensic Developmental Psychology

Papers should include a short summary of the topic discussed and your reactions to it. Papers should be no longer than 2 pages, typed and double-spaced.

Submit by February 26.

* Choose only *one* of the following:

Adolescent Interview (5 points):

Interview an individual between the ages of 12-20 about adolescent issues (discussed in Chapters 10 & 11 in the text). Record their responses to your questions and write a reaction paper based on their responses. Be sure to relate the material in the text to your interview and reaction paper. Paper should be no longer than 2 pages, typed and double spaced.

Submit by March 28.

Adolescent Movie (5 points):

Watch a movie that focuses on adolescent experiences (main character or one of the main characters must be between 12-20 years old). Write a paper that summarizes the movie and relates the issues in the movie to the issues discussed in Chapters 10 & 11 of the text. Your paper should be no longer than 2 pages, typed and double-spaced. Papers must include the following:

- 1. *Movie Summary*: Provide a summary of the plot of the movie, including a description of the main character(s) and issues to be resolved or conflict(s)/challenge(s) that the main character(s) face. (1 page)
- 2. Movie Critique: From a developmental perspective describe the influences affecting the character(s) [e.g. dealing with pubertal changes, changes in identity, emotions, moral attitudes, or in social relationships either with peers and/or adults]. Conclude this section with your critique and/or recommendations [e.g. did you think the movie accurately or realistically depicted adolescent experiences? Why or why not?]. (1 page)

Submit by March 28.

* Share a personal story, an article, a television show, etc. with the class. Summarize the item, relate it to the material discussed in class, and provide your reactions to it (5 points). Can be done at any time throughout the semester. Last day to present: April 25.
