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## Embracing Changes: Message from the Dean

A happy and successful new year to all of our shareholders!

I have been interested in understanding and appreciating *The Book of Changes* or *The Classic of Changes (I-Ching* or *Yi-Jing* in Chinese) since I was a graduate student in New York in 1986. While talking about this book in detail is beyond the scope and purpose of this writing, *The Book of Changes* deals with the ideas of the dynamic balance of opposites, the evolution of events as a process, and acceptance of the inevitability of change. Changes occur constantly everywhere and all the time.



As individuals, we cannot escape three things in life: taxes, death, and change. We must pay tax as citizens. We will eventually die; we cannot live forever. What about change? The inevitability of change is philosophically and cosmologically a major point of *The Book of Changes*. We are born; we grow up and get older, and eventually say goodbye to the world; our life is one of constant change. So does our environment change, as does our culture and economy. The world itself changes every day.

What changes should we make to reduce tuition in higher education and improve quality (i.e., educational affordability, accessibility, and accountability)? What can we do to be globally competitive? 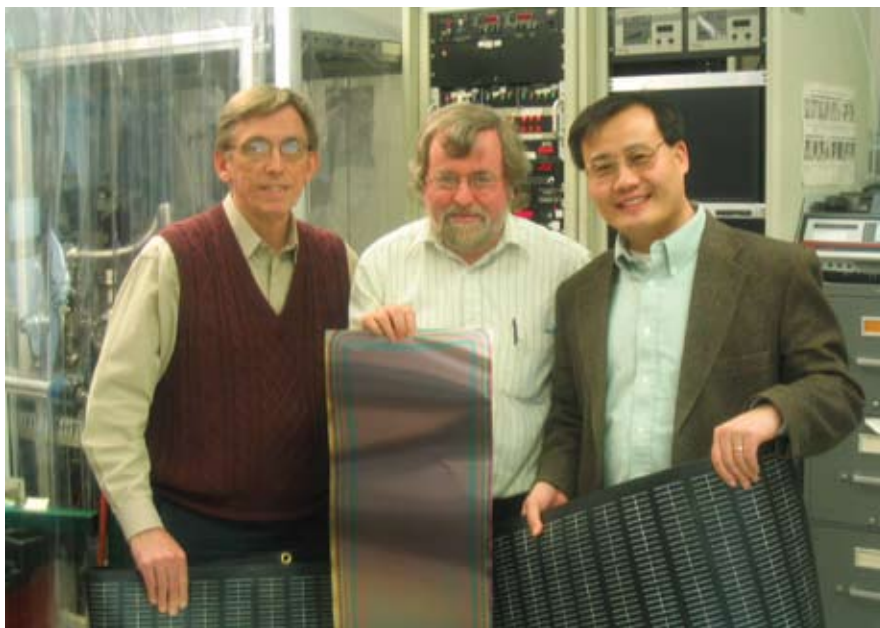
## Physics Entrepreneurship in Photovoltaics Attracting National Attention

Research and education in solar electricity or photovoltaics (PV) started in the College of Arts and Sciences' Physics and Astronomy Department in 1988, beginning in collaboration with two companies, Glasstech Solar and Solar Cells Inc. Contributing to the research are more than 40 researchers, including six faculty members, 13 postdocs, and more than 20 graduate students. In addition, two faculty and several students from the Department of Chemistry are involved. The PV effort now also includes a few faculty and students in the College of Engineering.

UT's PV research excellence is attracting increasing national attention. The October 8, 2007, issue of *Newsweek* focused on PV at the University of Toledo, recognizing that UT "has been doing hard-core solar-cell research for two decades." The article featured a photo of three Physics and Astronomy graduate students (Victor Plotnikov, Jason Stoke, and Jian Li). More recently, the *Wall Street Journal* focused on the business development surrounding the PV research at UT and reported that, "The University boosted its emphasis on thin-film research in 2001, and this year it shared in an \$18.6 million state grant. . . . The school is now using the money to beef up solar research in its McMaster Hall." The story can be found at <http://online.wsj.com/article/SB119795042868436131.html>.

The original Toledo PV company, Solar Cells Inc., founded by McMaster and other local investors, was renamed First Solar in 1999 and is now the largest manufacturer of PV panels in

the United States. UT faculty and students have contributed to their success. Arts and Sciences PV faculty also have been involved, either as cofounders in starting other PV-related companies, or by providing research, technology, and grant writing support, including Innovative Thin Films (Dean Giolando, Prof. of Chemistry), MWOE and Xunlight (Xunming Deng, Prof. of Physics and Rob Collins, NEG Chair and Prof. of Physics), and Solar Fields and Calyxo (Alvin Compaan, Prof. of Physics).

## Biological Sciences

The grant, *The Grass Regulome Initiative: Integrating Control of Gene Expression and Agronomic Traits Across the Grasses*, aims at using genomic tools to investigate the genes that act like keys to regulate corn growth and development. The award totaling \$2.6 million (of which \$704,000 will fund Dr. Gray's research) is a collaborative project with Dr. Erich Grotewold and Dr. Ramana V. Davuluri at the Ohio State University.



**Deborah J. Vestal** was an invited speaker at the Guanylate-Binding Protein meeting at the Ruhr-Universität Bochum, Germany and gave a talk to the Department of Physical Chemistry in Fall 2007.

## Chemistry
