

Course Description

The first course in the Psychiatric-Mental Health Nurse Practitioner track focuses on preparing the student in the advanced practice role of assessment, diagnosis, and treatment planning of select acute and chronic psychiatric disorders and mental health care needs of individuals across the lifespan. Students will be introduced to clinical approaches and methods for assessing and evaluating adults. The course will stress the importance of the diagnostic reasoning process, use of diagnostic criteria, standardized measurement tools, and evidence-based treatment guidelines. Health promotion, management, and disease prevention are emphasized through the integration of nursing and related theories and scientific knowledge including the application of risk assessments, health behavior guidelines, growth and development across the lifespan, the use of screening instruments, and knowledge of primary, secondary, and tertiary prevention activities.

The course provides an overview of individual therapy utilized by the advanced nurse practitioner. The theory, research, and practice of the following will be emphasized: psychoanalytic/ psychodynamic, existential, humanistic, cognitive-behavioral, dialectical behavioral, feminist, postmodern, and brief. Major nursing theories will be explored as they apply to the psychiatric advanced nursing practice specialty. Applications across the life span and among culturally diverse populations are explored and discussed.

In the clinical setting, the student is provided with opportunities to apply concepts learned from the theory portion of the course. The focus is to develop cognitive and clinical skill competencies needed to provide comprehensive assessments of adults, children, and families and to apply diagnostic reasoning in order to provide optimum treatment and clinical management. During clinical experiences, comprehensive psychiatric assessments, diagnosis of common psychiatric illnesses and interventions will be accomplished. Students will be afforded the opportunity to provide care in multiple treatment modalities including individual psychotherapy, psychoeducation, crisis management, and beginning psychopharmacology.

Clinical experiences and sites will offer multicultural opportunities and emerging trends in the delivery of advanced practice psychiatric care.

Student Theoretical Learning Outcomes

1. Examine the history, issues, and trends of advanced psychiatric-mental health nursing practice within the boundaries provided by state licensing acts.
2. Analyze psychotherapeutic theories, nursing theories, and evidence-based nursing and other related research to determine interventions appropriate in meeting individual requirements for self-care across the lifespan.
3. Apply theoretical concepts of health promotion, clinical prevention, and population health with patients and families during developmental transitions and life-style adjustments in psychiatric practice across the lifespan.
4. Integrate traditional and complementary pharmacological interventions into the treatment and management of common illnesses.
5. Integrate social, cultural, explanatory models and spiritual components in patient-centered plans of care.
6. Demonstrate core professional values and ethical/legal standards in the implementation of the nurse practitioner role.
7. Identify and integrate evidence-based findings to the diagnosis and management of common illnesses in psychiatric practice across the lifespan.
8. Examine, evaluate, and demonstrate professional development in the role of the PMHNP in the diagnosis and management of health and wellness as well as common acute and chronic illnesses in psychiatric practice across the lifespan.
9. Analyze patient safety, quality indicators, and outcome improvement in the delivery of quality primary care to patients.

Student Clinical Learning Outcomes

1. Provide mental healthcare through health promotion, clinical prevention, and population health to patients and families during developmental transitions and life-style adjustments from birth through old age with special emphasis on the adult patient in this course.
2. Demonstrate integrated learning of clinical experience and course concepts by applying knowledge of common acute and chronic illnesses to diagnose and manage adult patients and their families in psychiatric practice across the lifespan and as health status varies.
3. Integrate knowledge of common acute and chronic psychiatric illnesses to diagnose and manage patients and families from birth through old age as health status varies with special emphasis on the adult patient in this course.
4. Integrate and apply individual therapy skills in those situations where appropriate for optimum treatment of the adult patient.
5. Integrate anticipatory guidance into the comprehensive treatment plans with respect to both primary and secondary prevention for patients and families from birth through old age with special emphasis on the adult patient in this course.
6. Integrate history and physical examination data with the knowledge of pathophysiology and psychopathology of common acute and chronic psychiatric disorders from birth through old age to develop appropriate differential diagnoses, and initiate appropriate customized interventions.
7. Integrate social, cultural, explanatory models and spiritual components in patient-centered plans of care.
