COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course will focus on the representation of women in dominant U.S. cinema with a particular interest in the filmic responses created by independent women filmmakers. We will examine the celluloid constructions of women and gender presented in classic Hollywood Cinema using the tools of feminist analysis and discourse. We will be particularly concerned with the ways in which gender, race, class and sexuality shape the cinematic representations of women. Upon completion of this course students will be able to do the following: 1) analyze the representation of women in contemporary US cinema, 2) use various analytical and theoretical frameworks to write about women and gender in US cinema 3) identify social, cultural and political themes that inform women's representation in US cinema and 4) use feminist analysis as a tool to write an analytical essay on a US cinematic tradition and/or genre.

Course Requirements: Expectations of students in course

Expectations of Students:

Readings: Students will be expected to complete the weekly readings and film screenings by the date the material is listed in the syllabus. Students will write a weekly reflection on each assigned reading. The reflections on the readings are part of the required Journal assignment which will be collected twice a semester.

Films: Students will be expected to view films listed in the syllabus at least 2 times. Once prior to the class discussion and additional viewings in conjunction with written assignments. Students will write a weekly reflection on each assigned film. The reflections on the films are part of the required Journal assignment which will be collected twice a semester. In addition, students will be responsible for screening all films reference in selected readings.

Classroom Discussion. Students will be expected to actively and regularly engage in classroom discussions of the films, readings and supplemental materials. Students are encouraged to articulate any perspective on the materials as long as the classroom discussion is respectful and positions are supported by evidence cited from the readings and/or the films assigned for the class discussion.

Writing. Students will be expected to complete multiple writing assignments and independent research.

- 7. Taking, converting, concealing, defacing, damaging or destroying any property related to the preparation or completion of assignments, research or examination;
- 8. Submitting the same written work to fulfill the requirements for more than one course.

Should cases of academic dishonesty be found among students, the instructor may choose to counsel the student, or the following sanctions may be imposed:

- 1. The student may be assigned an F for the work in question.
- 2. The student may be assigned an F for the course. In this case, the instructor should inform the dean and the student of this action. The dean will make certain that the student receives the F grade and is not permitted to withdraw from the course.
- 3. The student may be placed on probation or suspended for some definite period of time, dismissed or expelled by the dean if either the seriousness of the offense or a record of repeated offenses warrants it.

A notation that such a sanction has been imposed will be made part of the student's permanent record. It is expected that the dean will consult with the instructor and the student in making such a judgment, and that the dean will notify the student of the sanction imposed and of the appeals procedure.
