OHIO BAR EXAM - CHARACTER AND FITNESS

APPLICATION

Tiffany Kline from the Ohio Supreme Court is unable to present on-campus this year, but she answers many questions regarding the Character and Fitness Questionnaire in this <u>video</u> of last year's presentation. You will need to log-in to Mediasite with your UTAD credentials to watch.

IMPORTANT: Every applicant who intends to take the Ohio bar examination shall file with the Office of Bar Admissions of the Supreme Court an Application to Register as a Candidate for Admission to the Practice of Law by November 15 of the applicant's second year of law school. (This means in your second year of law school, whether you are on the Full-Time or Part-Time track, no matter when you plan to graduate!)

CLASS MEETINGS

You are required to watch your class meeting as part of the Professional Development Program. Instructions on how to report that you've watched are contained in the videos.

1Ls - RESUME, COVER LETTER, AND OTHER APPLICATION MATERIALS VIDEOS

Before you create your new legal resume and cover letter, watch <u>this</u> video. <u>This</u> video will explain other common application materials that employers request. Both videos are required to be watched as part of the Professional Development program by Friday, September 11th.

2Ls and 3L/4Ls - UPDATE YOUR RESUME

Make sure you have updated your resume to include your summer experience. Also make sure to update your class rank, and include law review or moot court, if applicable.

Did you earn an honors designation last semester? Make sure to include it in your resume! OPD recommends including it under your GPA, like this:

Professional Development Program

Purpose of the Professional Development Program

The College of Law designed the Professional Development Program to help you build your professional identity and network throughout your legal education career. Each year you will be required to complete certain mandatory activities. Additionally, throughout law school you will be required to attend networking and skills events, complete pro bono awareness tasks, and participate in career exploration activities. Inside your designated reporting cycle folder will include the activity categories and numbers of activities required for each reporting cycle. The Professional Development Program is a floor, not a ceiling; OPD encourages you participate in as many of the activities as your schedule allows.

How it works

Reporting cycles are based on the number of credits you have earned at the end of the semester. For example, you must have completed all activities listed in the "0-30 Credits Reporting Cycle" between the time you start law school and the semester in which you earned your 30th credit. For the "31-60 Credit Reporting Cycle" complete all activities listed between the semester you earned your 31st credit and your 60th credit. And for the "61+ Credits Reporting Cycle" between the semester you earned your 61st credit and the semester that you graduate. For some students,

cycles may overlap. You may begin working on the next reporting cycle once you've completed the last one if your semester bridges the reporting cycle. I.e. you start a semester with 27 credits and end it with 42 credits, you can finish the 0-30 reporting cycle, then start working on the 31-60 reporting cycle activities.

Mandatory Activities: Mandatory activities include class level specific programming required by the Office of Professional Development. These meetings will be announced in the OPD newsletter, emails sent by OPD staff, and/or on TLCN. Activities may be web-based or in-person if safety standards allow. Additionally, many of these activities require pre- or post-work such as updating application documents or certify completion of an on-demand video.

<u>Networking and Skills Events:</u> These events are often sponsored or co-sponsored by the Office of Professional Development, Alumni Affairs, or a Bar Association. They are designed to help you build your networking skills. Events can take place virtually or in person (when allowed).

<u>Professional Exploration</u>: Professional exploration tasks will aid in determining your professional identity and long-term career path. Exploring the profession can be done on a large scale, by attending an in-person or virtual legal conference, for example. Or on a smaller scale, such as a one-on-one informational interview. It is your responsibility to find outside events related to your areas of interest, set up informational interviews, or arrange observation of a legal proceeding. OPD is happy to help in your search.

<u>Pro Bono Awareness Tasks</u>: Ohio, along with many other states, encourages pro bono work as part of a lawyer's professional duties to the public and justice system. Therefore, these tasks are not only a resume builder, but they will help kick-start a commitment to your professional duty as lawyers. The Ohio Supreme court states in the Preamble to the Ohio Rules of Professional Conduct: "...[A]II lawyers should devote professional time and resources and use civic influence to ensure equal access to our system of justice for those who because of economic or social barrier cannot afford or secure legal counsel." It is your responsibility to find pro bono clinics and volunteer to help, or find an attorney to work with or shadow. OPD is happy to help in your search but will not be responsible for placement in these opportunities. OPD may advertise pro bono projects and other opportunities via the newsletter or emails. Students in the 0-30 credit reporting cycle are not required to complete a Pro Bono Awareness Task. Students in the 31-60, or 61+ reporting cycle may report participation in one of the listed legal clinics. Note: the Public Service and Corporate Counsel Externship Clinics do not count.

Patent Program

The Loyola University Chicago School of Law Patent Law Interview Program has been postponed from its originally scheduled dates of July 23-24, 2020 to January 14-15, 2021 and **will be a fully virtual interview program.** This interview program targets patent law employers and 2L and 3L students from law schools across the country.

In 2019, roughly 150 employers, 190 law schools, and 1,100 law students from across the country participated in the program. The program is entirely preselected, which means that students submit application materials to apply to interviews with the employers they are interested in, and employers then review their materials and select the students they wish to interview at the program. Last year, approximately half of the participating students were selected for interviews.

Please note: If you previously registered for the Patent Law Interview
Program in February or March of this year, YOU ARE STILL REGISTERED
AND DO NOT NEED TO RE-REGISTER.

Students with undergraduate or graduate degrees in engineering or a technical science should consider registering for the program. You do not need to be patent bar eligible to register, although the vast majority of employers participating in the program are seeking patent bar eligible students.

At this stage of registration, you will only need to enter some basic information (you will upload your resume and bid on interviews later in the semester).

There is a non-refundable \$40 registration fee that you must pay by credit card to complete your online registration. Please have your credit card ready when you register.

Once you have registered, the program staff will communicate with you directly via email to the address that you entered when registering for the program. Please direct any questions about the program to OPD.

As you read this, the September 17

deadline is just under a month away...are you ready to submit? To some, a month may feel like plenty of time; however, we always encourage applicants to be proactive so they're not racing against the clock on submission day. Please note: beginning this year, applications are due at **8 p.m. ET** on September 17, a change from previous years.

Here are a few tips for completing the application, from our Fellowship Applicant Guide, as you work to add your finishing touches.

- Create an online profile ASAP, if you haven't already! By reviewing the actual application, you can ensure that you've been gathering all of the required information while you still have time to do so.
- Remember to proofread! Due to its length, the application needs more than just a quick skim to check for typos. We suggest candidates have at least three different people review the submission materials.
- Seek feedback from trusted connections, such as law school professors, public interest career counselors, organizations, and even current Fellows and alumni. Ask them to pose tough questions that will help you strengthen your proposal.
- Check the formatting if you're pasting content in from a different program, such as Microsoft Word. You want to be sure that your application is formatted consistently and readable to those reviewing it.
- Pay attention to time zones! The application is due by 8 p.m. ET—east coast time—on September 17.

Finally, our biggest piece of advice: **submit early.** You've worked hard the past few months in conjunction with your chosen organization, and we want to make sure you don't jeopardize your efforts due to last-minute technical difficulties. Once more, the application is due by **8 p.m. ET on September 17**.

The PMF Program is a highly selective, 2-Year fellowship and leadership development program that recruits recent and soon-to-be graduates with advanced degrees. It is the Federal Government's flagship leadership development program and is an excellent way for students with management potential and public service motivation to start a career in the Federal Government and be developed into tomorrow's leaders.

2020 Law Student Diversity Scholarship Application Submission Deadline: August 31, 2020

Scholarship Requirements

DRI announces its annual Law Student Diversity Scholarship program, open to African American, Hispanic, Asian, Native American, LGBT and multi-racial students who will be in their second or third year o law school on August 31, 2020. All second and third year female law students are also eligible, regardles of race or ethnicity. Any other second and third-year law students who come from backgrounds that wo add to the cause of diversity, regardless of race or gender, are eligible to apply. Students who are memb of the American Association for Justice (AAJ), law school or law student members of AAJ, or students c erwise affiliated with or employed by AAJ are not eligible for DRI Law Student Diversity Scholarships. To qualify for this scholarship, a candidate must be a full-time student. Evening students also qualify for col sideration if they have completed one-third or more of the total credit hours required for a degree by the applicant's law school. The goal of these scholarships is to provide financial assistance to two worthy law students from ABA-accredited law schools to promote, in a tangible way, the DRI Diversity Statement of Principle. See the last page of this application for the DRI Diversity Statement.

Two scholarships in the amount of \$10,000 each will be awarded to applicants who best meet the following criteria:

- Demonstrated academic excellence
- Service to the profession
- Service to the community
- Service to the cause of diversity

Applications must include three recommendations, one each from the following individuals:*

- A) Dean or an associate dean of the student's law school
- B) A current or past law professor
- C) An individual who is personally acquainted with the applicant, but who is not related by bloom line or adoption.

Additionally, each applicant must include a cover letter with his or her application. In that cover letter ea applicant should identify his or her academic, personal, and professional accomplishments and how those accomplishments qualify him or her for a DRI Law Student Diversity Scholarship award.
