COURSE DESCRIPTION

The practice of Internal Medicine (IM) is an in-depth study of the health matters affecting adult patients. This clerkship, which is required for all third-year medical students, places emphasis on the acquisition of highly honed skills in medical history taking and physical examination. Students also create lists and develop plans to direct the investigation of patients' medical disorders. The goal of this course is to provide all medical students with a broad-based educational experience in inpatient and outpatient medicine so that they will:

- Develop skills in the evaluation and basic management of patients
- Acquire the knowledge necessary for the competent practice of medicine in a supervised setting as

measured by acquiring a minimum score on the NBME IM Subject Exam

• Acquire excellent interpersonal and professional communication skills

PRE-REQUISITES

Students must first successfully complete the first two years of medical school. Students cannot have more than one fail, incomplete or defer on their record from other required clerkships.

ROTATION OVERVIEW

The required Medicine rotation is 8 weeks in length. Students will spend a total of 6 weeks at UTMC, ProMedica Toledo Hospital (PTH), Riverside (Columbus, OH), St. Joe's (Ypsilanti, MI) or Akron General (Akron, OH) and 2 weeks either at UTMC, a local ambulatory site or an Area Health Education Center (AHEC).

EDUCATIONAL RESOURCES, TEXTBOOKS and OTHER MATERIALS

The recommended text for Internal Medicine will be <u>Cecil Essentials of Medicine</u> (10th Edition). This is an excellent, easily readable text, which covers the major topics in Internal Medicine. You will need to be acquainted with the

material in this text in order to pass the Subject Exam at the end of this rotation and the Internal Medicine portion of the National Boards. You will not see enough disease variety in your patient population during this rotation to adequately cover all of the important topics in Internal Medicine. You must keep up with your reading during the rotation or you will not pass the Subject Exam.

REQUIRED ACTIVITIES

Throughout the IM Clerkship, students will be expected to:

- Follow UT polices, including but not limited to professional behavior, work hours, absences, etc.
- Show up on time, be prepared, well-groomed in professional attire with a clean, pressed white coat.
- Work with faculty, residents, fellows and staff
- Log patient cases and work hours accurately and timely
- Write notes and case reports
- Present patients and cases
- Participate in patient rounds
- Provide patient care as directed by the leader of the team that they are assigned to, including:
 - o Admission / discharge
 - o Some procedures
 - Ordering tests
 - o Updating patient medical records
 - o Assist in forming treatment plans
 - o Obtain a complete patients' history and perform a physical exam
- Attend and participate in scheduled sessions, lectures, didactics, ethics, SIM Lab, Lab Medicine, Harvey, etc.
- Read about patient cases, diseases, diagnoses, etc.
- Complete online cases (Aquifer)
- Obtain Observation of Clinical Skills (OCS) forms from faculty
- Complete the IM Observed Structured Clinical Exam (OSCE)
- Study and sit for the NBME IM Subject Exam
- Complete evaluations of preceptors

CLINICAL EXPERIENCES

Patients are seen in both inpatient and outpatient settings. All students complete 6 weeks of Medicine **Inpatient** service. Students are required to evaluate at least 16 inpatients over the 6-week experience. The level of involvement for each patient must include:

- 1. Independently gathered history information
- 2. Independently performed physical exam
- 3. Presented patient case
- 4. Wrote patient note
- 5. Opportunity to discuss laboratory or test results
- 6. Opportunity to offer and discuss differential diagnosis
- 7. Opportunity to offer and discuss management options

In addition to participating in the Medicine inpatient service, students spend 2 weeks in a variety of **Outpatient** sites. Students are required to assess at least 8 outpatients during this experience. The level of involvement for each patient must include:

- 1. Observed (or performed) patient interview
- 2. Observed (or performed) physical exam
- 3. Opportunity to discuss laboratory or test results
- 4. Opportunity to offer and discuss differential diagnosis
- 5. Opportunity to offer and discuss management options

Students are required to log **all** patient encounters and hours throughout the **entire** IM clerkship, and are required to meet the following minimum number of cases per diagnostic category. When logging, students will use the 'Levels of Involvement' checklist in Med Ed to determine if a patient encounter meets the minimum requirements to count towards these totals. If students are having difficulty meeting these minimum experiences, they must contact the Clerkship Director or Coordinator in advance of the end of the rotation.

MID-CLERKSHIP FORMATIVE FEEDBACK

Students will receive a written Mid-Clerkship Formative Feedback report half-way through the entire clerkship. This report will not be used to determine a final grade for the clerkship. It is designed to give the student feedback and to point out areas that they are doing well in, as well as areas of concern, with enough time to make adjustments prior to the end of the clerkship.

d. **High Pass with Clinical Excellence** – Students who receive a CCE grade of HONORS but do <u>not</u> meet requirements for an overall clerkship grade of honors, <u>a special designation will be noted in the final</u> <u>MSPE narrative that will highlight the student's clinical performance</u>:

"Student X's overall grade for the XX clerkship is High Pass. Of note, this student performed at the honors level in his/her clinical performance."

e. Fail in one competency for assessment of clinical performance will result in the following

- If a student fails Professionalism, Practice Based Learning and Improvement, or Interpersonal and Communication Skills, a grade of DEFER will be assigned and REMEDIATION will be required. Once the remediation is successfully completed, the student's transcript grade will be changed to a PASS.
- ii. If a student fails Patient Care, a grade of FAIL will be assigned, and the clerkship must be REPEATED in its entirety.
- iii. The lowest grade possible for the systems-based practice competency is a pass.

2. NBME subject exam

- a. Honors: > 55 %tile
- b. HP/P: 5-54 %tile
- c. Fail < 5%tile*

* Students must achieve the 5th percentile on the NBME subject examination to successfully complete the clerkship. Failure to achieve the 5th percentile will require the student to retake the subject examination and a grade of DEFER will be assigned. A second attempt on the NBME subject examination must be completed within one year from the first attempt. If the student achieves the 5th percentile or higher on the second attempt a grade of PASS will be assigned. PASS is the highest grade that can be achieved after a DEFER grade. If a student fails the NBME exam on a second attempt, then the final grade is FAIL and the clerkship must be repeated.

3. Departmental educational program (20 points total)

- a. Honors: ≥ 17
- b. HP/P:11-16
- c. Fail < 11 points

Point distribution – 15 of the 20 points will be for OSCE performance.

1. There will **2 OSCE cases**

- a. Each case will be worth 7.5 points with points distributed as follows:
 - i. Communication skills = 20%
 - ii. History/Physical exam = 40%
 - iii. Write up = 40%
- b. A student must score at least 70% on the OSCE (combined points at least 10.5) to pass the OSCE and the departmental education program category. If the student does not meet this threshold, the clerkship grade will be entered as a DEFER until the OSCE is successfully remediated. After successful remediation, the highest grade that a student can receive for the departmental points is a PASS.
- 2. 5 points discipline specific activities
- 3. A minimum of 11 total points must be achieved in the Departmental Education Program. If a student does not meet the minimum threshold a grade of DEFER will be assigned until remediation is completed. PASS is the highest grade that can be achieved after a DEFER grade.

***Direct** Observation/Supervision: the observing/supervising physician is physically present with the student and patient.

****Indirect** Observation/Supervision: Once student assessed to be appropriate for indirect supervision, direct observation/supervision remains immediately available--the supervising physician is either physically within the hospital or other site of patient care or is immediately available by a reliable and rapid method of communication to provide direct observation.

• Assigned Educational Hours

To ensure that there is an appropriate balance of assigned educational activities and self-directed learning, students' scheduled activities should:

• Blood Borne Pathogen Exposure Protocols

In the event of blood or body fluid exposure at The University of Toledo Health Science Campus:

1. Flush area thoroughly for 15 minutes; wash with soap if applicable.

- 2. Notify supervising faculty member or preceptor.
- 3. Always report to UTMC Emergency Department for initial assessment of injury and exposure.
- 4. Immediately obtain and submit all lab results from both you and the primary source of contact to Ruppert Health Center, Family Medicine.
- 5. Complete a UTMC employee injury report at utoledo.edu/depts/safety/Forms.html and send to Safety and Health.
- 6. After hours/weekends, call UT Emergency Department at 419.383.3888 to address questions or concerns.
- 7. Notify clerkship director of incident.

Whenever exposure occurs at a non-UTMC site:

Contact the supervisor or preceptor at site to find out individual protocol. Follow up treatment after initial treatment may be obtained at occupational health which is located in the Emergency Department of University of Toledo.
