<u>Elective Description/ Requirements:</u>	<p>The goal of the inpatient experience is to allow the fourth year student to accept responsibility for the planning and execution of ongoing care of hospitalized patients. Evaluate patients in the emergency room to determine if hospitalization is necessary and to perform the duties of a Family Medicine Resident. Students will be expected to work five days per week and some weekends.</p> <p>Each acting intern must complete two on-line modules to prepare the acting intern for their role as teachers of junior medical students.</p>
