The student will be able to recognize clinical presentations of common illnesses such as myocardial infarction, hypothyroidism, infection, and depression. The student will be able to recognize dementia and delirium and distinguish between syndromes that cause cognitive dysfunction in the elderly. The student will be able to evaluate a patient with suspected dementia and manage common problems related to dementia. The student will be able to recognize and manage common geriatric syndromes such as falls, incontinence, and failure to thrive. The student will have a basic understanding of the role of Medicare and Medicaid in financing geriatric care. The student will be able to work with a variety of health care professionals in developing comprehensive management plans in the elderly. The student will be able to function in the nursing home setting.
