It's Homecoming and that means The University of Toledo Alumni Association will present its most prestigious honors: the Gold T, Blue T and Edward H. Schmidt Outstanding Young Alum Award.

These three recipients will be recognized – along with distinguished alumni from each UToledo college – at the Homecoming Alumni Gala and Awards Ceremony Friday, Oct. 4, at 6 p.m. in the Thompson Student Union Auditorium.

The Gold T is presented to a University of Toledo graduate in recognition of outstanding achievement in his or her field of endeavor while providing leadership and noteworthy service to the community.

The 2019 recipient is Alan Barry of Commerce Township, Mich. A 1966 graduate of the College of Business and Innovation with a bachelor's degree in accounting, Barry is the retired president and chief operating officer of Masco Corp., a Fortune 200 company with interests around the world. Masco's well-known brands include Delta faucets, Behr paint and KraftMaid cabinetry. Barry spent 36 years with Masco, beginning his career in 1972 with what would become



its BrassCraft Manufacturing Division. Named one of the 50 most influential people in the home-building industry by Builder Magazine, Barry was instrumental in creating Masco Contractor Services, the industry's largest organization for installation of insulation and other products in new home construction. Barry spearheaded the acquisition and internal development of the companies assembled to create this extensive organization.

Named the College of Business and Innovation's Outstanding Graduate in 2005, Barry and his wife, Karen, a 1964 graduate of the former UToledo Community and Technical College, have been major philanthropists to their alma mater. They have created laboratories in accounting and leadership in the College of Business and Innovation, as well as scholarship and fellowship funds in that college.

The Blue T is presented to a University of Toledo Alumni Association member and UToledo graduate who has made outstanding contributions to the progress and development of the Alumni Association and the University.

Tom Schuster of Maumee, Ohio, is the 2019 honoree. Schuster earned an associate's degree in industrial technology from the former Community and Technical College in 1965 and a bachelor's degree in adult liberal studies from University College in 1985. A past member of the Alumni Association's Board of Trustees, he has served on numerous association committees over the past three decades. Schuster is also a past president of the Downtown Coaches Association, a support group that raises thousands of dollars for the UToledo Athletic Department each year. He and his wife, Marilyn, are members of the President's Club and Heritage Oak Society, the latter in recognition of a planned gift that will provide support to generations of future Rockets. Since graduation, Schuster has financially supported many areas across campus; these include University College, Savage Arena, the Larimer Athletic Complex and the Koester Alumni Pavilion.

Retired from Daimler Chrysler since 2001, Schuster was a senior manager in charge of IT computer operations for 27 plants in the United States and five in Canada, while overseeing 175 employees.

The Edward H. Schmidt Outstanding Young Alum Award is presented to a University graduate who is 40 years of age or younger in recognition of outstanding achievement in her or his field of endeavor, while providing leadership and noteworthy service to the Alumni Association, University or community. This award is named in memory of Ed Schmidt, a 1942 alumnus and a longtime supporter of The University of Toledo and its Alumni Association.

The 2019 recipient is Bret Babcock of Nashville, Tenn. Babcock earned a bachelor's degree in finance and organizational development from the College of Business and Innovation, and the Jesup Scott Honors College, in 2010.

Babcock is chief operating officer, chief financial officer and partner at LOGICFORCE, a technology consulting firm that provides eDiscovery, IT optimization and network service consulting, as well as digital forensics to clients in the legal industry. Since joining the company four years ago, Babcock has played a key role in driving success, achieving a compound annual growth rate of more than 40% and helping expand to over 40 employees across 16 states.

Previously an assistant vice president and portfolio management officer at Bank of America, Babcock is involved with several nonprofit causes and organizations, including A Child's Place, the Orchard and LIFE Fellowship. Babcock earned an MBA from the University of Mississippi and in 2017 was awarded the Ole Miss MBA Outstanding Young Alumnus Award.

Kimberly Norwood, Henry H. Oberschelp Professor of Law at the Washington University School of Law in St. Louis, visited campus Sept. 26 to give the Cannon Lecture in the Law Center McQuade Auditorium. Her talk was titled "Ferguson Five Years Later: A Look at the Legal and Social Reverberations in Ferguson and Around the Nation." Norwood is the author of the 2016 book, "Ferguson's Fault Lines: The Race Quake That Rocked a Nation," which used Ferguson as the foundation for a study on how various laws, social conditions, and economic and political policies may negatively impact the lives of black and brown people in America — contributing to racial and socioeconomic conflict. The College of Law's Cannon Lecture Series hosts nationally known individuals who explore both the humanistic dimensions and limitations of the legal system.

In 2010, the Sick Leave Bank was expanded to include professional staff on Health Science Campus. The University agreed to allow this valuable resource to continue in 2017.

IN MEMORIAM

Dr. Virginia Chambers, Toledo, professor emerita of music, died Sept. 13 at age 88. She joined the University as an associate professor in 1975 and was promoted to professor in 1979. Chambers taught classes for music education majors and elementary education majors, as well as first-year music theory for all music majors. Among her published works were the books titled "Reading Tonal Patterns" and "Tometics: Music for the Classroom Teacher," which she co-wrote with Dr. Robert DeYarman, professor emeritus of music. Her service to the University included the President's Commission on Enrollment, the Promotion and Tenure Committee, and the Arts and Sciences Council. Chambers, an ardent UToledo men's and women's basketball fan, was named professor emerita when she retired in 1992.

Dr. Temoleon G. "Tim" Rousos, Columbus, professor emeritus of technical science and mathematics, died Sept. 22 at age 86. He was hired as an instructor in 1965 and one year later was named an assistant professor of community studies and coordinator of data processing and computer programming. Rousos was promoted to associate professor in 1969 and professor of basic, technical and general education in the Community and Technical College in 1979. He co-authored several textbooks on general mathematics, statistics, and consumer and business mathematics. Rousos served as chair of the Faculty Senate and the Senate Student Affairs Committee, and was a faculty representative to the Joint Commission on Student Rights and to the UToledo Board of Trustees. The Army veteran of the Korean War was a UToledo alumnus; he received a bachelor of education degree in 1954, an education specialist degree in 1974, and a doctor of education degree in 1979. Rousos was a lifelong member of the UToledo Alumni Association.

Dr. Dorothy C. Siegel, Toledo, professor emerita of linguistics, died Sept. 22 at age 72. She joined the Department of English in 1977 as an assistant professor and was promoted to associate professor in 1981. Hundreds of students have noted her dynamic presence in the classroom; she assisted many in applying to prestigious graduate programs in linguistics and advised on their careers. Her research focused on lexical morphology; phonological words and phrases; the structure of English words; and linguistics and aphasia. She served on the Linguistic Society of America's Undergraduate Program Advisory Committee and evaluated grant applications for the Linguistics Section of the National Endowment for the Humanities. Her book, "Topics in English Morphology," revolutionized previous notions of the interaction between the morphological component of grammar and its phonological compotent. Among the highlights of her career were an NEH Summer Fellowship at Georgetown University. She served on several University committees, including the Executive Committee of the Faculty Senate and the Arts and Sciences Council. Siegel was named professor emerita when she retired in 2010. A celebration of life will take place Saturday, Nov. 2, at 11 a.m. at the Toledo Club, 235 14th St. Tributes are suggested to the Department of English Language and Literature through The University of Toledo Foundation.

"World language proficiency and intercultural competence are increasingly important for business collaborations, healthcare services, cutting-edge collaborative scientific research, as well as national security," said Dr. Linda M. Rouillard, professor of French and chair of the Department of World Languages and Cultures.

Studying and speaking foreign languages is more important than ever, according to the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, which noted in a 2017 report the economic and scientific need for international language fluency.
