AAN Medical Student Summer Research Scholarship

Sponsored by the AAN's Undergraduate Education Subcommittee and an Educational Grant by Teva Neuroscience, the Medical Student Summer Research Scholarship program offers members of the AAN's Student Interest Group in Neurology (SIGN) program a summer stipend of \$3,000 to conduct a project in either an institutional, clinical or laboratory setting where there are ongoing programs of research, service or training, or a private practice. Only applicants from schools with established SIGN chapters are eligible to apply. The AAN will award up to 20 scholarships to first- or second-year medical students who have a supporting preceptor and a project with clearly defined goals. The project is to be conducted through a U.S. or Canadian institution of the student's choice and jointly designed by the student and sponsoring institution. More than one student from an institution may apply, but only one student will be selected from an institution. The scholarship program was established to stimulate individuals to pursue careers in neurology in either research or practice settings.

Program Dates: 6 to 8 weeks

Compensation: up to twenty \$3,000 scholarships

Eligibility: 1st and 2nd year medical students

Application Requirements:

- Completed application form
- 1-2 page project proposal
- 1-2 page Curriculum Vitae
- 2 letters of recommendation: one from the project preceptor and one from the SIGN faculty advisor.
- Completed tax form (W-9 for U.S. and Statement of Citizenship for Canadian residents).

Akron General Medical Center- Clinical Rotations and Future Training (CRAFT)

Akron General Medical Center is offering a first year summer opportunity to allow M1's to spend time in the hospital during the summer. The student will shadow physicians and residents in different clinical settings. The student will be introduced to Akron General Medical Center and its academic (GME) programs. The successful candidate will spend up to 8 weeks rotation through various clinical departments to gain an exposure to clinical medicine and an academic medical center. Minority Medical Student Mentor Program

The American Academy of Dermatology invites first through fourth-year medical students who are African American, Native American, Hispanic American or Asian American to learn more about dermatology as a medical specialty by participating in this Summer Program. The program is to provide students with personal and hands-on exposure to dermatology by working with a mentor and is also geared toward stimulating interest in dermatology as a pursuable and obtainable career choice for minority students. Students will spend one month this summer working and studying with a dermatology mentor of their choice. The Academy will secure mentors from a variety of practice settings - private practice, academic and research. All participants are required to complete a one-page summary describing the experience to receive your certificate of participation.

Program Dates: One month during the summer. 40 hours/week

Compensation: \$1,500 grant.

Medical Student Summer Internships in Cardiothoracic Surgery

The Summer Intern Scholarship Program was established in 2007 to introduce the field of cardiothoracic surgery to first and second year medical students from North American medical schools. In the two years since its inception, the Summer Intern Scholarship has offered 125 medical students the opportunity to broaden their educational experience by providing scholarships to spend eight weeks during the summer working in an AATS member's cardiothoracic surgery department.

Program Dates: eight weeks during the summer (June thru end of August)

Compensation:

- A grant of \$2,500 will be provided to successful applicants to underwrite their living expenses during the eight weeks of training at the selected host institution.
- Additionally all awardees will receive complimentary registration to the association's 2012 Annual Meeting taking place April 28 - May 2 in San Francisco, CA.

Eligibility:

- Candidates must be a first or second year medical student as of January 15, 2012
- Applicants must have the approval of the prospective sponsoring institution and host sponsor who must be a member of the AATS.

Application Requirements:

- Online application
- One-page outline of what they hope to accomplish during their eight week internship, specifically state the proposed exposure to cardiothoracic surgery to be undertaken by the student, which should include some aspect of laboratory and/or clinical reporting/investigation (do not exceed one page).
- A letter of support from the host sponsor addressed to the AATS Secretary and submitted online by each candidate via the online application submission system
- Agree to submit a summary report and evaluation of their experience to the association within sixty days after the completion of their internship.

AFAR – Medical Student Training in Aging Research (MSTAR)

The 2012 MSTAR Program provides medical students with an enriching experience in aging-related research and geriatrics, under the mentorship of top experts in the field. This program introduces students to research and academic experiences early in their training that they might not otherwise have during medical school. Positive experiences in the MSTAR program have led many physicians-in-training to pursue academic careers in aging, ranging from basic science to clinical research to health services research. They have joined the growing cadre of physicians and scientists whose specialized knowledge and skills are in great demand as our population ages.

Program Dates: 8-12 weeks

Compensation: Approx. \$1,748 per month. Actual amounts will vary based on the specific appointment period of individual students.

Eligibility:

- Allopathic or osteopathic medical student in good standing, who will have successfully completed one year of medical school at a U.S. institution by June 2011.
- Applicants must be citizens or permanent residences of the U.S.

Application Information:

- Interested students should go to the website for the complete guidelines and on-line application.
- The application must also include the Faculty Sponsor plan and NIH-style biographical sketch. The recommendation letter, medical school enrollment certification letter, and faculty sponsor plan and bio are all submitted on-line.
- The Office of Geriatric Medicine is available to discuss specific application information, particularly choosing a research topic and mentor. In 2010, 25 Ohio students received summer scholarships. 2012 Medical Student Research Program

The student research program encourages promising students, including women and members of minority groups underrepresented in the sciences, from all disciplines to consider research careers while supporting the highest quality scientific investigation broadly related to cardiovascular disease and stroke. The research opportunity will allow students to work for 8, 10 or 12 weeks with a faculty/staff member on any project broadly related to cardiovascular disease/function or stroke. The goal is to encourage students to consider a future academic career in this area.

Program Dates: Eight, Ten, or Twelve-week award periods

Compensation: \$600/week stipend

Eligibility:

- Full-time medical students enrolled in an accredited medical school.
- Applicants must propose a preceptor/project at any non-profit research institution **within** the Western States Affiliate (Alaska, Arizona, California, Hawaii, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, Utah or Washington). Applicants must have a sponsor who is a doctorally prepared faculty member at the institution where the research is to be conducted and who has demonstrated success in the field of cardiovascular sciences. Sponsorship limit: This was originally only one application per year per lab. However, two applications may now be submitted IF, and ONLY if, the projects can be shown to be markedly different. Any applications over and above two will not be accepted.

- Recommendations
- A complete application consists of the application form, including the Sponsor's Section, (the whole document submitted via email), the signed signature page (to arrive via postal mail, carrier or by hand – this may be POSTMARKED December 3) and a letter of reference which may arrive via email (signed) or as hard copy direct from the referee – also by the deadline date.

American Society of Hematology (ASH)

Minority Medical Student Award Program (MMSAP)

The Minority Medical Student Award Program (MMSAP) is an 8- to 12-week research experience for students from the United States and Canada in their early years of medical school. As part of this experience, students collaborate with an ASH member who serves as their research mentor. Program participants are also paired with an ASH member who serves as a career-development mentor throughout the participants' medical schooling and residency.

At the end of the research experience, students present their findings at the Promoting Minorities in Hematology Presentations at the ASH annual meeting. After the research year, the students remain involved with ASH throughout medical school and residency to keep them engaged in the study of hematology and to help them gain valuable knowledge in the field. In addition, students who participate in this program may apply to the program for a second summer research experience.

Program Dates: Eight to twelve weeks in the summer.

Compensation: A Compensation of \$5,000 (\$2,500 at the start of the research experience, \$1,250 during the middle, and \$1,250 at the completion of the research experience), a \$2,000 allowance for travel to the ASH annual meeting (\$1,000 for attending the meeting and \$1,000 for a short presentation about the research experience at a special reception).

- In addition to financial support, participants receive complimentary subscriptions to *Blood*, the journal of the American Society of Hematology, as well as *The Hematologist*, the Society's newsletter, during their medical school and residency years.

Application Requirements:

- Must be citizen or permanent resident of U.S. or Canada; minority as defined by ASH. (Defined as those groups that the grantor organization has determined to be underrepresented in the field of hematology, not limited to racial/ethnic minorities and persons from disadvantaged socioeconomic groups)
- Minority Medical Student Award Program Application (downloaded from website).

- Letter from the Dean of your Medical School
- Letter from an advisor or medical school instructor.
- Letter of endorsement from the research mentor (must be a member of ASH).

The Appalachian Preceptorship in Family Medicine

East Tennessee State University, James H. Quillen College of Medicine

Sponsored by the Department of Family Medicine at the James H. Quillen College of Medicine, East Tennessee State University, this unique program places students from medical schools across the country into rural locations with community physicians. Providing an unparalleled rural practice experience, it is the only educational experience of its kind in the country. The program combines one week of concentrated lectures on the ETSU campus and area field trips with three weeks of working with a family physician in a rural community. Students will spend three weeks with a rural physician practicing in a rural Appalachian community. The didactic week of the preceptorship will be offered once during the summer for the medical students. This portion will usually begin the first Friday after the 4th of July and conclude the following Friday. Students should be able to arrange their schedules so that this week falls within their available four-week period. Some students will begin with the didactic portion, and others will begin with their physician preceptor. Lodging in the rural community is arranged by the preceptor and is intended to increase student-community involvement. Lodging during the didactic week will be provided on the ETSU campus.

Program Dates: Four weeks total; Didactic week July 6 – 14, 2012

Compensation: TBA

Eligibility: Must be in good standing at the time of application and entry into the preceptorship. Transportation is required.

- It includes an essay of 500 words or less describing interest in the rotation, any unique personal needs (financial, religious, housing, etc.), hobbies, and other interests.

Student Summer Research Fellowships

The Student Summer Research Fellowship grants are modeled on NIH short-term training grants, but are awarded for research into community health and cultural competency issues, rather than laboratory work. The Foundation's goal is to provide an opportunity for students to work directly with patients and to become more compassionate, relationship-centered physicians.

Program Dates: 10 weeks

Compensation: \$3000, projects not meeting the 10-week requirement will be prorated accordingly. The student is expected to work full time with a mentor on a project that has the potential to be on-going. A final report is due at the conclusion of the ten weeks. The first half of the grant funds are sent upon Foundation acceptance of the proposal and receipt of a signed grant agreement from the school. The balance is sent upon receipt of the final report.

Eligibility: Student at United States schools of medicine and osteopathy

Application Requirements:

Students must submit a 2-3 page proposal outlining the research project, including:

- Abstract, hypothesis, objectives and significance, background and literature review with appropriate citations (citations can be provided in appendix after the 2-3 page proposal)
- research design and methodology (**if IRB approval/exemption is necessary, please provide application status**)
- expected level of direct patient interaction during course of the fellowship and possibility for research to continue after student fellowship
- discussion of how this fellowship might contribute to the applicant's understanding of the practice of humanistic medicine as well as the patient experience with illness, their health and the healthcare system.
- A Cover Sheet, Mentor Form, and supporting letter from the Student Affairs or Medical Education Dean must accompany all applications. Electronic submissions are preferred.

Betty Ford Center Summer Institute for Medical Students

The Summer Institute for Medical Students is a unique learning experience for medical students to gain understanding and insight into addictive disease and the recovery process. Successful applicants to this program have the opportunity to spend five days experiencing what it is like to be a patient or a family member at the Betty Ford Center. Placements are available in the following programs: Inpatient Treatment, Residential Day Treatment, and Family Treatment. Participants in all programs attend lectures addressing the medical needs of addicted patients and the theory and philosophy of treatment at the Betty Ford Center. They also attend a Treatment Planning Update (TPU) meeting to observe the multidisciplinary care process at the Center. Finally, as a means for integrating the knowledge gained from this experience, students are required to develop a PowerPoint presentation.

Program Dates: All programs begin at 7:00 a.m. on Monday, and end at 4:30 p.m. on Friday. Students must make a commitment to the full length of the program. Sixteen students will be chosen for each 5 day session. **Dates TBA**

Compensation: Scholarship covers travel (up to \$500) and lodging costs, tuition, material fees, and on-campus meals. If selected, extensive and detailed information regarding travel arrangements and lodging will be forwarded.

Eligibility: Open to all medical students in good academic standing.

Application Requirements:

- Completed application form (online) and Curriculum Vitae.
- Two letters of recommendation (at least one from the Dean's office, or a professor at the medical school). Letters of recommendation must accompany the application.
- A typed one page essay specifically describing what motivates you to want to attend the Summer Institute. Also, describe how you would anticipate incorporating this experience into your medical education and future practice.

In addition, students will be exposed to aspects of family medicine in rural areas that extend beyond the office experience. Medical Education Preceptorship

The overall goal of this experience is to aid the Gross Anatomy faculty in the preparation of prosected (i.e., pre-dissected) material to be used to enhance learning of human anatomy. For some areas of anatomy the combination of limited time and intrinsic complexity of the anatomy may reduce the effectiveness of dissection for the majority of the students.
