In-state Tuition Requirements

Residents of Ohio or Monroe County, Mich., for the 12 months immediately preceding enrollment are eligible to pay in-state tuition. The following situations would also qualify a student for in-state tuition; however, special documentation is required and should be sent with the application. All references to Ohio are interchangeable with Monroe County, Mich.

- Spouse of someone, or the dependent of a parent or legal guardian, who has resided in Ohio for the past 12 months. Documentation required:**
 - Original signed letter on company letterhead from the employer stating that the parent or spouse is currently employed, the employment effective date, and that Ohio taxes are being withheld.
 - Copy of a lease agreement or the first page of an official document showing the spouse or parent owns a home in Ohio.
 - Copy of spouse's or parent's federal and Ohio tax returns.
 - Copy of spouse's or parent's Ohio driver's license or state of Ohio I.D.
- Spouse of someone, or the dependent of a parent or legal guardian, who accepted full-time employment in Ohio and established domicile in Ohio as of the first day of the semester. Documentation required:**
 - Original signed letter on company letterhead from the employer stating that the parent or spouse is currently employed **full time** in Ohio, the employment effective date, the base salary amount, and that Ohio taxes are being withheld.

- Copy of a lease agreement or the first page of an official document showing the spouse or parent owns a home in Ohio.
 - For dependent students, copy of parent's federal and Ohio tax returns to confirm student's dependent status.
- A person who is full- or part-time employed in Ohio and is self-supporting on Ohio taxable funds from employment (not including additional aid or source of income that may be received) and will be attending on a part-time basis through the 12-month period. Documentation required:**
 - Original signed letter on company letterhead from the employer stating employment effective date; that he/she is currently employed; number of hours worked per week; base salary amount (annual or weekly); and that Ohio taxes are being withheld.
 - Copy of a lease agreement or the first page of an official document showing that he/she owns a home in Ohio.
 - Most recent pay stub showing Ohio taxable earnings year-to-date.
 - A person who enters and remains on active duty status in the U.S. military service while a resident of Ohio for all other legal purposes and his/her dependents shall be considered Ohio residents, as long as Ohio remains the state of such person's domicile. Documentation required:**
 - A copy of his/her current military orders, if on active duty, or discharge papers indicating that Ohio is the state of record or a copy of a current LES (Leave and Earnings Statement) showing that Ohio taxes are being withheld.

5. A person who is on active duty status in the U.S. military service and is stationed and resides in Ohio and his or her dependents shall be considered residents of Ohio.

Documentation required:

- A copy of his or her current military orders showing that the person is stationed in Ohio or that Ohio is the state of record; or a copy of a current LES (Leave & Earnings Statement) showing that Ohio taxes are being withheld.

HOUSING POLICY

University policy requires all first-year students who are not living with parents or legal guardians to live in a University residence hall and participate in the meal plan program. Detailed housing information will be sent with your admission letter and can be found at residencelife.utoledo.edu.

HONORS PROGRAM

University Honors Program – January 9, 2009 Priority Deadline

Potential Honors students typically have a minimum high school GPA of 3.75 and a minimum ACT composite of 28 (1260 Reading and Mathematics SAT score). Students with a 3.5 GPA and 25 ACT (1150 SAT) are also encouraged to apply. All admissions to Honors are made based on high school GPA, standardized test scores, a writing sample, and an extracurricular resume.

ADMISSION SCHOLARSHIPS AND FINANCIAL AID

Your admission application also serves as application for most admission scholarships. Please visit financialaid.utoledo.edu/scholarships.html for specific scholarship requirements and deadlines. To maximize your aid package, it is strongly recommended you file a FAFSA at fafsa.ed.gov, by the April 1, 2009 priority deadline. UT's financial code is 003131.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS FOR FIRST-TIME FRESHMEN

First-time Freshmen: Students who have never attended college post graduation. Students who have taken post-secondary (college) courses while enrolled in high school are considered first-time freshmen.

Ohio residents, who have been out of high school for more than six months, and, have never earned college credits, or who have received their GED, may be exempt from specific college admission requirements. Contact the Office of Undergraduate Admissions for further details.

Academic Core Requirements

UT requires completion of specific college preparatory curriculum course work. The minimum academic core requirements are:

- 4 years/units of English
- 3 years/units of natural science
- 3 years/units of social science
- 3 years/units of math (including algebra I and II and geometry or equivalent)

ACT/SAT and Placement Test Scores

All students must submit either an ACT or SAT score including one writing section score. An Ohio resident who does not submit an ACT or SAT score or whose scores fall below minimum criteria will be required to take placement exams. Results of these exams may require that a student take prerequisite courses prior to taking specific college-level course

High School/College Transcripts

Upon graduation, an official high school transcript, complete with a stamped graduation date, must be submitted to the Office of Undergraduate Admission. This is in addition to the official partial transcript sent with the application. Official transcripts from all colleges and universities attended, including post-secondary work other than at UT, must be submitted.

PROGRAM ADMISSION STANDARDS

UT colleges and programs have specific admission criteria that must be met. Ohio residents who do not meet the specific college requirements will be admitted but will be offered enrollment options to other programs. Students, who do not meet the university admission requirements, will be admitted to the UT Learning Collaborative which will establish their eligibility for registration.

GPA requirements are based on a cumulative GPA, not semester GPA; the ACT score refers to a composite score; and the SAT score is a combined reading and math score.

- 2.25 GPA or 20 ACT/950 SAT

- 3.0 GPA or 25 ACT/1150 SAT
- Recommended 3.8 GPA and 29 ACT/1300 SAT for Bac/M.D. option. Contact the premed adviser for details.

Music program

College of Business Administration

Bachelor of Business Administration programs

- 2.4 GPA and 18 ACT/ 870 SAT

Students not meeting these requirements will be reviewed for the Applied Organizational Technology Associate Degree programs.

Applied Organizational Technology Associate Degree programs

- 2.0 GPA

Information Technology program

- 2.25 GPA and 21 ACT/990 SAT

Students who meet the ACT/SAT requirement with a 2.0 GPA will be reviewed for the Applied Organizational Technology Associate Degree programs. Students with a 2.0 GPA and less than a 21 ACT/990 SAT will be admitted to the UT Learning Collaborative.

Judith Herb College of Education

- 2.0 GPA or 19 ACT/910 SAT

Students not meeting these requirements will be admitted to the UT Learning Collaborative.

College of Engineering

Engineering Science programs

- 3.0 GPA and 22 ACT/1030 SAT
- 4 years of high school math (fourth-year emphasis on trigonometry or precalculus) and high school chemistry; high school physics is strongly recommended

Students not meeting these requirements will be reviewed for the Engineering Technology programs.

Bioengineering B.S./M.D. program

- Recommended 3.8 GPA and 29 ACT/1300 SAT. Contact the bioengineering adviser for details.

Engineering Technology programs

- 2.0 GPA and 21 ACT/990 SAT

Students who meet the GPA requirement with a 19-20 ACT (910-950 SAT) will be admitted to the UT Learning Collaborative. Students with less than a 2.0 GPA and less than a 19 ACT/910 SAT will be admitted to the UT Learning Collaborative.

Information Technology program

- 2.25 GPA and 21 ACT/990 SAT

Students who meet the ACT/SAT requirement with a 2.0 GPA will be reviewed for the Engineering Technology programs. Students with a 2.0 GPA and less than a 21 ACT/990 SAT will be admitted to the UT Learning Collaborative.

College of Health Science and Human Service

- Students must have an ACT/SAT score for admission directly into the college
- 2.0 GPA or 24 ACT/1110 SAT

Students not meeting these requirements will be admitted to UT Learning Collaborative. Students can transfer into the college from UT Learning Collaborative with 12 hours of college credit work and a 2.0 college GPA.

Cardiovascular Technology and Respiratory Care programs

- 2.5 GPA
- Successful completion of three years of high school math, biology and chemistry with a "C" or better
- Once admitted, students must file a separate application with the college's admissions committee to participate in the competitive admission process

College of Nursing

All students admitted into the prenursing curriculum with:

- 2.5 GPA
- Successful completion of high school chemistry with a "C" or better
- Upon completion of the prenursing curriculum there is a competitive admission process for the professional sequence

Students not meeting these requirements will be admitted to UT Learning Collaborative.

College of Pharmacy

All students admitted into the preprofessional program with:

- 2.0 GPA or 19 ACT/910 SAT
- Although not required, a 3.0 GPA, 22 ACT/1030 SAT, and high school chemistry and precalculus are strongly recommended

Students not meeting these requirements will be admitted to the UT Learning Collaborative.

Contingent admission to the Professional Division is available on a competitive basis. To be considered, the following must be completed in the year preceding fall admission:

- Achieve and report by Dec. 1, 2008, a 29 ACT/1300 SAT
- 3.75 GPA in a college preparatory high school curriculum
- Application postmarked by Dec. 1, 2008

Additional materials may be requested. Final notification of contingent admission status will occur in mid-March.
