OHIO BAR EXAM - CHARACTER AND FITNESS APPLICATION DEADLINE

Tiffany Kline from the Ohio Supreme Court is unable to present on-campus this year, but she answers many questions regarding the Character and Fitness Questionnaire in this <u>video</u> of last year's presentation. You will need to log-in to Mediasite with your UTAD credentials to watch.

IMPORTANT: Every applicant who intends to take the Ohio bar examination shall file with the Office of Bar Admissions of the Supreme Court an Application to Register as a Candidate for Admission to the Practice of Law by November 15 (this is a Sunday, so you have until November 16) of the applicant's second year of law

school. (This means in your second year of law school, whether you are on the Full-Time or Part-Time track, no matter when you plan to graduate!)

DECEMBER GRADS - OPD EXIT SURVEY

As part of your graduation processing requirements, you must complete the Office of Professional Development Graduate Exit Survey via Webex between Monday, November 9th and Friday, November 20th. To schedule an appointment, please use TLCN. Schedule with either Laura or Katie, just pick a meeting time that works best for your schedule! Once you schedule your appointment, TLCN will automatically notify the OPD advisor that you scheduled with them. Please note OPD will be closed on November 11th for Veterans Day. The survey should take approximately 15-20 minutes to complete.

Professional Development Program

Purpose of the Professional Development Program

The College of Law designed the Professional Development Program to help you build your professional identity and network throughout your legal education career. Each year you will be required to complete certain mandatory activities. Additionally, throughout law school you will be required to attend networking and skills events, complete pro bono awareness tasks, and participate in career exploration activities. Inside your designated reporting cycle folder will include the activity categories and numbers of activities required for each reporting cycle. The Professional Development Program is a floor, not a ceiling; OPD encourages you participate in as many of the activities as your schedule allows.

How it works

Reporting cycles are based on the number of credits you have earned at the end of the semester. For example, you must have completed all activities listed in the "0 – 30 Credits Reporting Cycle" between the time you start law school and the semester in which you earned your 30th credit. For the "31 – 60 Credit Reporting Cycle" complete all activities listed between the semester you earned your 31st credit and your 60th credit. And for the "61+ Credits Reporting Cycle" between the semester you earned your 61st credit and the semester that you graduate. For some students, cycles may overlap. You may begin working on the next reporting

cycle once you've completed the last one if your semester bridges the reporting cycle. I.e. you start a semester with 27 credits and end it with 42 credits, you can finish the 0-30 reporting cycle, then start working on the 31-60 reporting cycle activities.

Mandatory Activities: Mandatory activities include class level specific programming required by the Office of Professional Development. These meetings will be announced in the OPD newsletter, emails sent by OPD staff, and/or on TLCN. Activities may be web-based or in-person if safety standards allow. Additionally, many of these activities require pre- or post-work such as updating application documents or certify completion of an on-demand video.

<u>Networking and Skills Events:</u> These events are often sponsored or co-sponsored by the Office of Professional Development, Alumni Affairs, or a Bar Association. They are designed to help you build your networking skills. Events can take place virtually or in person (when allowed).

<u>Professional Exploration</u>: Professional exploration tasks will aid in determining your professional identity and long-term career path. Exploring the profession can be done on a large scale, by attending an in-person or virtual legal conference, for example. Or on a smaller scale, such as a one-on-one informational interview. It is your responsibility to find outside events related to your areas of interest, set up informational interviews, or arrange observation of a legal proceeding. OPD is happy to help in your search.

Pro Bono Awareness Tasks: Ohio, along with many other states, encourages pro bono work as part of a lawyer's professional duties to the public and justice system. Therefore, these tasks are not only a resume builder, but they will help kick-start a commitment to your professional duty as lawyers. The Ohio Supreme court states in the Preamble to the Ohio Rules of Professional Conduct: "...[A]II lawyers should devote professional time and resources and use civic influence to ensure equal access to our system of justice for those who because of economic or social barrier cannot afford or secure legal counsel." It is your responsibility to find pro bono clinics and volunteer to help, or find an attorney to work with or shadow. OPD is happy to help in your search but will not be responsible for placement in these opportunities. OPD may advertise pro bono projects and other opportunities via the newsletter or emails. Students in the 0 – 30 credit reporting cycle are not required to complete a Pro Bono Awareness Task. Students in the 31 - 60, or 61+ reporting cycle may report participation in one of the listed legal clinics. Note: the Public Service and Corporate Counsel Externship Clinics do not count.

20th Annual Great Lakes Water Conference

"Water in the Courts" - Friday, November 6th, 9:00-12:30 pm

Water-related cases of international, national, regional and local import will be the focus of the 20th Annual Great Lakes Water Conference. In light of the COVID-19 pandemic, this year's conference will be conducted **virtually online as a live webinar**.

Titled "Water in the Courts," the half-day conference will feature six legal experts addressing litigation about the Enbridge oil pipeline underlying the Straits of Mackinac; an interstate groundwater allocation case pending before the U.S. Supreme Court; the Court's recent *County of Maui* decision affecting permitting under the Clean Water Act; challenges to the new federal "waters of the United States" rule; high water levels and flooding in and around Lake Ontario; and the Lake Erie Bill of Rights.

The conference is sponsored by The University of Toledo College of Law and its affiliated Legal Institute of the Great Lakes.

Launched in 2010, the Frost Brown Todd Diversity Scholarship Fund is one of many unique ways our firm promotes building a pipeline of diverse attorneys in our local legal community. Typically, Frost Brown Todd awards approximately five \$2,000 scholarships each year to deserving students, meant to support them in their education or exploration of the law. Scholarship recipients are invited to a special awards reception hosted by the firm, and their accomplishments are featured in our quarterly D&I Reports.



Submission Criteria & Process

The scholarship is open to all underrepresented students, including but not limited to African American, Hispanic, Asian, Native American, LGBTQ+ and multiracial students. All female students, regardless of race or ethnicity, are also eligible to apply, as are any other students who come from backgrounds that would add to the cause of diversity, regardless of race or gender.

Scholarships will be awarded to applicants who best meet the following criteria:

- · Demonstrated academic excellence
- · Service to the profession
- · Service to the community
- · Commitment to diversity

To qualify for the Frost Brown Todd diversity scholarship, a candidate must be a full-time student. Evening students also qualify for consideration if they have completed one-third or more of the total credit hours required for a degree by the applicant's school. The goal of these scholarships is to provide financial assistance to worthy students and to promote, in a tangible way, the Frost Brown Todd Diversity Vision Statement.

Featured Job:

The American Bar Association Section of Litigation is a place where we work to advance diversity and inclusion in the legal system and where law students become engaged in the profession. One example of our work is the Section's Judicial Intern Opportunity Program (JIOP), a summer internship program open to all diverse first- and second-year law students. JIOP students intern for a minimum of six weeks over the summer with a participating state or federal judge. The program offers a \$2,000 award to each student. Students may also elect law school credit or coordinate their award with their work-study financial aid.

Applications open for all students on **November 4**, **2020** and close on **January 10**, **2021**. Please encourage your students to apply early as last year's program received 730 applications for 150 placements. **Screening interviews are guaranteed for the first 500 applicants and additional students will be screened on an as-needed basis.**
