Collection Summary: A collection of correspondence, photographs, scrapbooks, sheet music, production material, and ephemera related to Vogt.

Subjects: Music, Art, Drama, and Theatre, Women

Related Collections: The Marie Bollinger Vogt Rare Book Collection. This collection, donated by Mrs. Vogt in 1992, is comprised of various books and periodicals on dance from her personal library. It also includes books written and illustrated by Mrs. Vogt.

Processing Note: The photographs, which came from albums, were removed from their binders and placed in folders in the order in which they were arranged. The contents of some of the scrapbooks were removed and placed in folders in the order in which they were arranged. Box 3, folder 23 holds the contents of a magnetic scrapbook from 1972. The materials were damaged by the glues in the original book and have been preserved as well as possible. **Box 15 contains materials that are contaminated with mildew. These materials must not be mixed with other materials.** All other material is arranged either chronologically or alphabetically when applicable according to series and subseries.

Biographical Sketch

Born in Toledo, Ohio, Marie Bollinger Vogt's career in the arts began early in her childhood. The older of two daughters of Dr. Herman Bollinger and Fannie Millbaubt Bollinger, Mrs. Vogt credits her mother with instilling in her a love of literature, theater, music, and dance. Her primary and secondary education at Whittier Elementary and DeVilbiss High School was complemented by lessons in riding, art, composition, reading, writing, and piano, and her greatest love, dance. "Nobody dreamed I would be so serious about dance," Mrs. Vogt recalled in a 1991 interview in the *Toledo Magazine*. "I think my mother wanted me to be a concert pianist, but dance was what was contagious to me."

Her first serious dance instructor was Vaslav Nowicki (a resident of Detroit) from the Russian Imperial Ballet School of St. Petersburg. During the summers, she studied at George Balanchine's School of American Ballet. Through her studies of classical Greek dance with Nicholas Tsoukalas, classical Spanish dance with Jose Fernandez and Eduardo Cansino and Paco Cansino, and Flamenco with Lola Bravo, Mrs. Vogt gained an appreciation for ethnic dance in general and Spanish dance in particular. By the time Mrs. Vogt was a freshman in high school, she began teaching dance herself. "I always had a passion for teaching, imparting whatever knowledge I had for exploring dance," she said.

As a freshman in high school, she taught at the Bach Conservatory and in 1939, produced, choreographed, and starred in the first performance of *The Nutcracker* in Toledo. After graduating from high school she entered the University of Toledo where she was a member of Pi Beta Phi. She continued to direct, choreograph, and star in various theatrical events. After graduating in 1945, she was presented by the Toledo Museum of Art in a concert where over 1000 people had to be turned away for lack of seats. That year Mrs. Vogt began a five year tour in her solo performance of "Dance and Music of Old Spain." In 1949, while choreographing the annual Toledo Junior Bar Association's Gridiron Show, she met attorney Theodore Vogt. In November of that year they married, and Mrs. Vogt continued teaching dance at the Bach Conservatory in downtown Toledo and also conducted children's classes in ballroom dancing at many public schools.

In 1958, the Toledo Ballet Association was founded by a group of citizens interested in supporting Mrs. Vogt's mission of presenting quality dance. In 1963 The Toledo Ballet Association was incorporated as a non-profit organization. Also that year Mrs. Vogt founded the Toledo Ballet School at Cricket West on Central Avenue. In 1982, Mrs. Vogt moved the school and its activities to its present location at the Franklin Park Mall at the invitation of James Rouse, developer of the mall.

Mrs. Vogt was the artistic director of the Toledo Ballet for fifty-five years. She introduced Toledo audiences to ballets such as *Coppelia*, *A Midsummer's Night Dream*, *Swan Lake*, *Romeo and Juliet*, and *Cinderella*. She brought internationally known dancers like Edward Villella, Violette Verdy, Ann Koesun, Ted Shawn, Melissa Haydn, Simon Dow, and John Kriza to dance in featured performances with the Toledo Ballet. Further, she was responsible for other ballet companies giving performances in Toledo. Among these were the American Ballet Theatre, Agnes DeMille's Heritage Dance Theatre, and the Vaganov Academy of the Kirov Ballet. And, of course, there is the *Nutcracker*, which continues to delight Toledo audiences every Christmas season.

Of equal importance was her running of and teaching at the Toledo Ballet School. Over the years, she taught literally thousands of students, instilling in them a love of the dance and an appreciation for the hard work and discipline required to succeed in both dance and life.

As a result of her tireless work, Mrs. Vogt has received numerous awards, among them the Arts Commission Award, Zonta International Woman of Achievement Award, the University of Toledo's Gold T Award, and the Women in Communications Achievement Award.

In 1995, after her final production of *The Nutcracker*, Marie Vogt stepped down from her position as artistic director of the Toledo Ballet. She remains founder and artistic director emerita of both the school and the Toledo Ballet Association. She also serves on the board of directors of the association, and is a trustee of numerous other Toledo cultural arts organizations. Although she is no longer in charge of the myriad productions of the company she founded, her influence can still be felt through the students she instructs at the Toledo Ballet School.

Besides being a talented dancer, choreographer and teacher, Mrs. Vogt is also a talented writer, having published three books on dance and her memoir. She continues to write for the *Sylvania Advantage*, and illustrates many of her articles that appear in the paper.

Scope and Content Note

The materials in this collection have been divided into seven series. S1. Correspondence, S2. Printed Material, S3. Production Material, S4. Ephemera, S5. Sheet Music, S6. Photographs, and S7. Scrapbooks.

The **Correspondence Series** is arranged alphabetically, according to the last name of the author. There is also a miscellaneous folder that contains correspondence that could not be identified.

Printed Material is divided into five subseries: newspaper clippings, periodicals, programs and tickets, publications, publications written by Marie Vogt, promotional materials, and miscellaneous. The newspaper clippings are arranged by year from 1942 through 2001. Unidentified newspaper clippings have been placed in a separate folder labeled "miscellaneous". Additional newspaper clippings can be found in the **Scrapbook Series**, and prints of some *Toledo Blade* photographs used in the newspaper articles can be found in the **Photograph Series**.

Production Material consists of papers concerning the production of the ballets by the Toledo Ballet Association, including set and costume design, choreography and cast lists from the 1983-1989 *Nutcracker*. The **Ephemera Series** contains art work, awards, and miscellaneous.

The **Sheet Music** series contains sheet music used in various productions, including latin dances performed by Mrs. Vogt early in her career. It also includes music composed by Julia Smith and a song composed by Mrs. Vogt.

The **Photographs** series is one of the largest series in the collection containing candid shots, amateur and professional photographs, head shots, and photographs appearing in the *Toledo Blade*. Wherever possible, photographs of identifiable individuals have been given their own folders. However, because of a lack of information, most of the photographs are arranged generally into company group and productions subseries. Photographs placed in albums have been removed from the binders and kept in the original order in which they appeared in the album. Negatives and proofs used for various publications have been included at the end of this series.

The seventh and final series, **Scrapbooks**, is divided into normal and oversized scrapbooks and arranged chronologically. Due to the fragility of some of the scrapbooks, the contents of the pages which had become detached during the years have been removed and placed in folders in the order in which they originally appeared. Some of the contents have been removed because the material the scrapbook was made of had damaged the materials. The 1972 scrapbook was a magnetic scrapbook and the glue holding the materials on the page had eaten into the materials. These materials unfortunately show considerable damage. When viewing the scrapbook series, the researcher should look at both the scrapbook and the removed pages because some of the pages have captions handwritten by Mrs. Vogt.
