Biographical/Historical Sketch

Mr. Gilbert Mohr was born on September 25th, 1913 in Philadelphia. He attended Pennsylvania University and studied ceramic sciences until he graduated in 1937. Throughout his life, Mohr had a passion and talent for music. He studied violin and piano but mainly played brass instruments, especially the trombone. Often, he would sit in on sessions with Toledo's Cake Walkin' Jazz Band. His career mainly focused on fiberglass.

Mohr worked as a researcher at Corning Glass works in Corning, New York, beginning his career in fiberglass technology. Eventually, he transferred to Libbey-Owens-Ford Glass Co. in Toledo in 1947. In 1948, Gilbert married Jean Strout. Together, they composed the music for "Fair Toledo". This song was one of eight of the entries in a competition sponsored by the Student Senate and Alumni Association of the University of Toledo. The couple won \$100 for the song, and it debuted as UT's Alma Mater in 1959 at the halftime of the Marshall-Toledo basketball game.

As a senior research engineer for Johns Manville fiberglass division, a position he held until his retirement in 1978, he never lost his musical passion. In 1975, he designed and built a 12 foot fiber glass alpenhorn. He often played the instrument at nightclubs in the area. After his retirement, he still researched fiber glass and by 1984 held 10 patents for fiberglass products.

Also in 1984, Jean Strout Mohr unexpectedly died. In his grief, he decided to live life to the fullest. He and some friends decided to build a nine-hole golf course on some vacant land. This is now a part of the Side Cut Metropark in the Toledo area. In 1992, he moved to the Swan Creek Retirement Village. While there, he composed a song for the community. Gilbert Mohr died on May 3rd, 2012 at the age of 98.

Scope and Content Note

The collection contains 1 scrapbook of newspaper clippings, photographs, and sheet music documenting the writing of "Fair Toledo", the University of Toledo's alma mater. Mr. Mohr and his wife, Jean Strout Mohr wrote the music for this song.
