COURSE/CATALOG DESCRIPTION

Design, execution, analysis and reporting of research in psychology. Lecture and laboratory. This course provides a basic understanding of the research methods used most commonly by social scientists. Topics to be covered include descriptive, correlational and experimental research design, validity, reliability and the scientific method. The course will also allow you to understand research reports in social science publications and in the press. It will also help you as you design your own research.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- Develop your understanding of the research process
- Prepare you to conduct research
- Help you to judge the quality of research
- Prepare you to write APA style reports
- Introduce you to the application of statistics in social sciences
- Learn about psychology and critical thinking not only from the readings and from the instructor, but also through interactions with your colleagues.

TECHNOLOGY REQUIREMENTS

This course uses Blackboard for assigned reading materials, quizzes, and any supplementary materials. You will need a fast internet connection and access to a computer. Most of the materials are also compatible with iPads and smartphones. Always have a backup internet access identified in case of emergencies. Loss of internet will not be an acceptable excuse for missed deadlines unless the outage is widespread.

TEACHING STRATEGIES

This is a course that meets twice per week for discussion of various topics related to psychological research and the concepts presented in the online course materials. Read any assigned materials at least once and do any assignments before the class meets to discuss that chapter. As for any 3-hour course that lasts a full 16 weeks, expect to spend about 9-12 hours per week reading the textbook, going through the online materials (paying special attention to those that are specifically assigned), and studying on your own if you want to get the highest grade of which you are capable.

You should be seated and ready to begin listening and discussing when the class begins. If you are late, enter the back of the room quietly and be seated. Activities at the beginning of the class will not be repeated for late comers. Turn off cell phones during class. If you must engage in activities during class that might distract either the instructor or other students, leave the room to do so.

COURSE EXPECTATIONS

This course is designed to help you gain an appreciation of the scientific basis of the entire discipline of Psychology. You will learn about what psychologists study, how they study it, what they know (or don't know), and the difficulties in understanding behavior. **During the academic year, expect to spend about**



9-12 hours per week reading the assigned materials, completing homework assignments, and completing in-class activities and assignments.

Lectures: This class will meet twice a week for lecture, at which time I will cover various topics and material related to psychological research. You may not video or audio record lectures or take pictures of lectures unless you have contacted me prior to class and received permission to do so. You should have read any assigned readings before the class meets in order to have a basic understanding of the content that will be covered in each given class. You should come prepared with any questions you have from the reading and to use what you have read about in the readings as a foundation for what will be covered during class. If you have to miss class, you should borrow notes from a classmate. If you will be unable to attend class for a university-approved reason (e.g. athletic event, religious holiday) email me in advance to let me know and I will provide you with the content you missed in class.

Coursework:

Online (LearnSmart) Quizzes: There will be five quizzes to be taken online through McGraw Hill Connect. Links to each quiz can be found on the course's Blackboard page under "LearnSmart Quiz." You may use your book to assist you on these quizzes. Each quiz must be submitted by 11:59pm on the due date listed on the syllabus. For example, the due date of the Chapter 2 Quiz is Monday, 9/10, so it must be completed by 11:59pm on that day. Quizzes may be completed prior to the due date, but late quizzes will not be accepted. Note that each quiz contains 11 questions but is only worth 10 points. Therefore, you have the opportunity to earn one bonus point on each quiz.

<u>In-Class Quizzes:</u> There are no exams in this course. However, <u>you will have short quizzes throughout the semester</u>. Quizzes will cover material covered in lecture during that week and previous weeks. Quizzes require you to know facts covered in the assigned materials, understand the ideas presented, and be able to apply them to potential situations. These quizzes will be due at the start of class. *If you arrive late to class after a quiz has been administered, you will not be able to take the quiz for credit.* You may not complete quizzes if you are not in class and will not receive credit for quizzes that were given on days you were absent. Quizzes will consist of 5-10 questions on average. Your lowest quiz score will be dropped when your final grade is calculated.

<u>APA Style Research Paper and Oral Presentation:</u> You will conduct a research project during this course and will be expected to write up your research in an APA style report. At the end of the semester, you will submit a full APA-style research report. Throughout the semester, you will submit sections of your research report to keep you on track for your research project/report and to give you feedback on your work before the final paper is due. **These sections and the final paper must be submitted in Blackboard by 11:59pm on their due dates.**

During the last week of classes, you will also do an oral presentation with your group to present your experiment. You will work in groups to complete this project. Be present and participate in your group! <u>At the end of the semester, your group will have the chance to evaluate your contribution to the group research project. If these evaluations reveal that you did not pull your weight, this will negatively impact your grade.</u>

ACADEMIC AND COURSE POLICIES

Class attendance: I do not give credit for simply attending class. Instead, I give points for participating and being engaged in class. Participation points are earned in 2 ways. First, you must participate in any in-



class discussions, and be engaged in and contribute to the group project meetings during class. Second, there will be in-class quizzes that you must be present in class to complete. Regardless of points, it's important that you attend class regularly because I will cover important content in class that may not necessary be in the assigned readings. Participating in the group discussions in class that will be important for helping you understand the course content and gain the knowledge needed to complete assignments in the course.

If you miss a quiz because of tardiness or absence, you will get a zero on it. There will be no make-up quiz, but you may be excused from a quiz with proper documentation. You will also have the opportunity to drop one quiz grade at the end of the semester. If you miss a class, it is your responsibility to find out what you missed before the next class.

Excused absences: excused absences include university sponsored events and illness (your own or immediate family for whom you provide care). Documentation must be provided. You must email me **in advance** to let me know of any excused absences. Contact the instructor for extended absences; if you are ill for long periods (more than three weeks), consider withdrawing from the course or petitioning for a medical withdrawal.

Late assignments: Assignments and papers are due by the end of the day on the due date found in the syllabus. The penalty for all late work is a **20% penalty** for each class session late. Try to turn everything in! It is better to hand something in late (for a reduced grade) than to not hand it in at all (for a zero).

Cheating will not be tolerated. The first instance of cheating will result in a zero (0) for the assignment or quiz. A second instance will result in an F grade for the course and a note in your college file. A low grade that results from cheating will not be deleted if you retake the course for a higher grade. Cheating includes (but is not limited to) use of non-permitted resources for quizzes such as friends, internet, books, etc., or using a cell phone for any reason. Plagiarism (use of another person's words without citing a reference to assign credit to them) is also cheating; always use your own words in all assignments. If you have questions as to what counts as plagiarism, there are resources online that can help clarify or you can ask me. If you're unsure if something if plagiarism, it would be in your best interest to check before turning in an assignment to avoid receiving a 0 for unintentional plagiarism. Some examples of plagiarism include, but are not limited to:

- Plagiarism (use of another person's words without citing a reference to assign credit to them) is cheating; always use your own words in all assignments. Copying and pasting large paragraphs from someone else' work can still be considered plagiarism even if you put quotes around it and cite them.
- Submitting the work of another student (past or present) who has taken this course as your own is also a form of plagiarism and is considered cheating. Using a past or present student's work as the basis for your own work is also considered cheating. I understand that it can be confusing as to what exactly counts as plagiarism when it comes to citing other's work.

Communication: Communication with the instructor is most reliable by email. As your instructor, I am here to help and will respond to email as quickly as I can. <u>I typically answer emails most quickly in the morning (Roughly 9-11am Mon - Fri)</u>. If there are assignments that are due during or upon return of a holiday, please plan accordingly to work on assignments in a manner that will give you enough time to



email me with questions and receive a response within a reasonable time frame before the assignment due date. You should check your university email daily for messages about the course. You should also log in to Blackboard every day to put in a little study time and to check for announcements. If you are having difficulty with the course concepts, please let me know so that I can review those topics in class or post explanations on Blackboard. If you find something confusing, others probably do too, and I can often clear it up.

IN-CLASS POLICIES

Electronics: Please be respectful of those around you and refrain from using any electronic devices for personal reasons during class unless given permission from the professor beforehand. **Personal cell phone use is not permitted** during in-class lectures. If there are special circumstances in which you may need to leave the classroom to answer your phone during class, please contact me about it before class. Laptops and tablets are permitted in class **for academic purposes related to the course only**. You may not use laptops for personal reasons, such as checking social media, visiting websites unrelated to the course, or working on assignments for other classes. Headphones are not permitted in class, as there are no course materials that require sound while I'm lecturing and headphones hence could not possibly be for an academic purpose related to the course.

You may not video or audio record lectures or take pictures of lectures unless you have contacted me prior to class and received permission to do so. As such, you should not be taking photos or videos during class for any reason. This includes selfies and any use of Snapchat.

Class behavior: While in class, you are expected to always be respectful of your classmates. Please do not distract others. I know that you may get bored and would much rather be hanging out with your friends instead of in class, but please refrain from holding private conversations with whoever you are sitting with. Whispering can be much louder than you think. This is distracting to those around you and to the instructor. If you are causing distractions in class, it is up to the instructor's discretion to determine whether you will receive credit for attendance that day.

There will be a lot of group work and discussions in-class. I will often ask for your thoughts and ideas about the topics we're covering on the days I lecture. You are expected to fully contribute to any group work and to put in effort to participate in class discussions. Be respectful of others' ideas. Everyone should be treated respectfully and feel comfortable speaking up in class. If there are issues within your group, please speak to me privately about it and we will work together to resolve any issues.

Food: I understand that you may want to eat during class; hectic schedules can make it difficult to find time to eat and sometimes a coffee or snack can be helpful for staying awake during lectures on the days you're especially tired or I'm especially boring. As such, **I will allow food and/or drinks in class so long as it is not disruptive to the class in anyway and you pick up after yourself.** If it has a wrapper, keep it wrapped. Noise from a bag of chips or candy bar is *very* distracting to everyone... and no matter how stealthy you think you may be, we all hear it. Additionally, if it has the potential to spill, leak, or spoil, please refrain from eating or drinking it during class. Please make sure to keep the area where you're sitting clean, adequately wipe up any crumbs or spills, and throw away your trash after class. If eating or drinking in class is becoming disruptive or I find that students are not picking up after themselves, I will restrict this policy to a simple no-food policy.



GRADING

Quizzes are graded as they are submitted and will be available for you to review shortly after the due date. You should always review these so you will understand the answers to all the questions, especially the ones you miss. Assignments will be graded and returned to you to review in a timely manner. I will provide feedback on your assignments. Always review this feedback and use it to guide your work on subsequent assignments.

Midterm Grading: Midterm grades will be based on your grades on all coursework that was due before spring break. Detailed information about your performance in this course is available to you continuously in the course website on Blackboard but the midterm summary serves as a reminder of your progress and must be reported to the registrar and to the financial aid office. A midterm grade of D or F, especially if associated with non-attendance, may place financial aid in jeopardy.

Final Grading (Averages are rounded to the second decimal, example: 92.494% rounds to 92.49%, 92.495% rounds to 92.50%. To avoid disappointment by being very close to a category border, do your best from the very beginning of the course and accumulate a few extra credit points whenever you can.)
