Course Description:

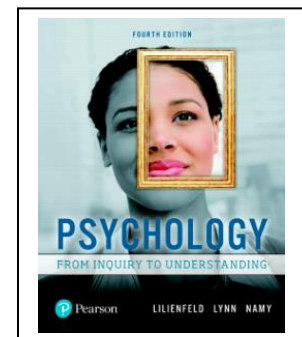
This is a General Education Social Science Core course. This course will provide an overview of psychology, psychological research basics, biological bases of behavior, perception, learning, cognition, emotion, motivation, development, psychological disorders, and an introduction to social psychology. The Learning Objectives are based on the UT Core and American Psychological Association Undergraduate Learning Goals and Outcomes.

Required Textbook:

The required textbook for this course is: *Lilienfeld et al. (2017).*

Psychology: From Inquiry to Understanding, 4th edition, Pearson.

Earlier editions are acceptable

- Possess a **knowledge base in psychology**, including key concepts, principles, and themes across psychological domains (e.g., biological bases, cognition, individual differences, and development)
- Understand **scientific inquiry and critical thinking**, including scientific thinking and the strengths and limitations of research designs, methods, and results
- Reflect on **ethical and social responsibility in a diverse world**, including the importance of individual differences and diversity, interpersonal relationships, and ethical principles of behavior
- Reflect on **communication**, including conveying information and interacting with others
- Be aware of **personal and professional development**, including how this course may inform the understanding of yourself, others, and future personal and professional goals

- Apply ethical standards to evaluate psychological science and practice
- Adopt values that build interpersonal relationships and community at local, national, and global levels
- Interact effectively with others
- Apply psychological content and skills to personal goals
- Apply psychological content and skills to career goals

Exams:

Exams will be distributed online via Blackboard and should be taken from home. Because it is impossible to make online exams closed-book, you will be allowed to use your notes, PowerPoints, book, and internet. That said, you are not allowed to work with other students. This would not be effective anyways, as the questions for exams are drawn and randomized from a larger test bank (they will be in a different order for each student).

There will be four exams throughout the semester, and they can be found on the Blackboard course site. The unit exams will be composed of 50 multiple-choice questions and each question will be worth 2 points (you can earn up to 100 points). You will have two hours to complete each exam. Exams will cover the material from class lectures and the course textbook. **Keep in mind that some questions will require you to apply learned information to real world situations, consistent with the learning outcomes of the course.**

You will always have one week (Monday at 8:00AM – Thursday at 11:59PM) to complete the exams. Late exams will NOT be accepted.

Quizzes:

Chapter quizzes will be used to help you to judge your understanding of the psychological principles and information you learn from lectures and read about in the textbook. These quizzes are found on the Blackboard course site. You will have one hour to complete each quiz. Chapter quizzes will be worth a maximum of 20 points each. There will be fifteen quizzes throughout the semester. You may take each of the quizzes up to five times. Your highest score of the five attempts will count toward your final grade. You may use your book or notes to help you complete the quiz, but you may not work with each other.

Quizzes will always be due at 11:59pm on the due date indicated on the course schedule. Late quizzes will NOT be accepted.

Discussion Board:

In this class you will be expected to participate in discussion boards that are organized around a particular topic that relates to the course material. In these discussion boards you will be expected to make your own original post about the topic being discussed and then you will be expected to respond to at least one other students post. **A total of six discussion topics will be available in the course and you are expected to complete five. If you complete all six, the sixth will count as extra credit.**

You can access the discussion boards in blackboard under the heading "Discussion Board". **For each discussion topic your original post will count for 20 points and your response post will also count for 20 points.** For full points your original discussion posts must address the prompt of the discussion board in full in a well written and thought out matter. For your response posts you must make a substantive comment or addition to the other students' post to receive full points.

These posts are time sensitive and each topic will have its own due dates outlined in the course schedule (located later in this syllabus and the Due Dates Calendar provided on Blackboard). In general, original posts are due on Mondays by 11:59 pm, and response posts are due Thursdays by 11:59 pm. Late posts will not receive points.

Attendance and Participation:

While you are expected to attend class regularly and to participate in the discussion boards (for points) you will not receive points for simply attending. Instead, the discussion boards are intended to serve as this feature, where you can receive points for participating and *attending* discussions.

Despite the fact that you are not going to receive points for attending lectures we nonetheless strongly encourage and expect you to attend class. Indeed, there are many different ways to succeed in a university course but these usually start with attending class regularly.

Class meetings will be held via Blackboard Collaborate during our regularly-scheduled class time. To log in to our class meetings, go to the "Blackboard Collaborate ultra" tab in our course site (see image below). **Class meetings will only be held one time per topic/chapter, so we will not be meeting every Monday and Wednesday.** Days we meet are indicated on the course schedule at the end of the syllabus (meeting days are in **red**) and will serve as an opportunity for you to ask questions about the material. Before class, you are expected to have listened to the lecture for the topic that is being covered that day so that you are already familiar with the material.

Participation in Psychology Department Research:

Participation in psychology department research **is a requirement**, but now all research credits can be earned by participating in online studies.

You are required to participate in [research in the psychology department](#). **You must earn up to at least 5 RESEARCH CREDIT HOURS to receive a grade for this course.** Research participation credit will NOT be factored into your final grade for the course, however you will receive an INCOMPLETE (I) in the course if you do not earn the 5 credits by the end of the semester. To fulfill this course requirement, you may either write 5 research papers, or participate in 5 credit hours of research studies, or do some combination of the two options. All five of these credit hours may be completed via online research experiments. If you cannot participate due to scheduling issues or would prefer not to participate, you can fulfill this requirement by writing reports on scientific articles. If you are under the age of 18 years, you will need to have a parent or guardian complete a permission slip that will allow you to participate in departmental research studies. You can find this permission slip on the Blackboard course site. **You MUST fulfill this requirement, or you will receive an INCOMPLETE grade for the class.** I repeat: if you do not participate in research or complete the reports you will NOT receive a grade for the course. You must have fulfilled the research requirement by 5pm on the last day of classes: Tuesday, November 24, 2020. Please see the link on Blackboard for additional information.

Writing Research Reports: Each report (worth 1 unit of research credit) will be based on a scientific article in a psychology journal.

You are to summarize and critically evaluate the article by:

- ✓ Identifying the purpose of the study (why did the authors conduct this study)
- ✓ Stating the hypotheses in the study
- ✓ What type of sample was used?

- ✓ Summarizing in sufficient detail the method used (procedure, materials, and participants)
- ✓ Reporting the results from the study and the general conclusions
- ✓ What is your reaction to this research?

There are specific articles that all students must use when writing reports. To view the article options and to submit your reports, go to the following URL web link:

This link will be used to submit ALL reports. That is, if you are submitting multiple reports, you will use this same link to review/summarize different articles.
