Course/Catalog Description

Emphasizes research and theory from conception through old age and integrates important developmental issues with a lifespan approach. **Prerequisite:** Introduction to Psychology (PSY 1010).

- Assess the biological, cognitive, social, and cultural influences on development throughout the lifespan.
- Evaluate current and past research in the study of the lifespan guided by theories within developmental psychology.
- Apply developmental psychology principles to daily life throughout the lifespan.
- Detect myths and misconceptions regarding human development throughout the lifespan.
- Describe methodological approaches used to study development.
- Assess and critically analyze theories, research methodology and findings (outcomes), and applications developed by
 developmental psychologists and made available through diverse media (e.g., textbooks, newspapers, professional and
 lay periodicals, and the Internet).
- Seize opportunities to engage in clear thinking and clear writing with or without the use of electronic devices.
- Demonstrate ability to complete exams/quizzes/assignments and engage in class discussion.

GRADING POLICY

Course Attendance (110 points)

Attendance will be taken throughout the semester. Attendance will be taken by your participation with the Knowledge Checks at the beginning of class. The first question in each Knowledge Check will ask you to provide your full name as shown in Blackboard (i.e., Kristina Todorovic). You have till the end of class to take the Knowledge Check. Responses provided after class (i.e., past 10:55am) will not count towards attendance. Each class is worth 5 points. There is a total of 24 classes, excluding exam dates, fall break, and Thanksgiving break. Students are allowed to miss up to 2 classes without any penalty (In other words, if students have attended 22 out of 24 classes throughout the semester, students will earn the full 110 points). Points will be deducted when students missed the 3rd class and onwards, unless students' absence have valid/justified documented reasons (e.g., medical issues, religious holidays, UToledo sports teams; DOCUMENTATION IS REQUIRED). Please provide the documentation within a week of your absence. Failure to provide the documentation within the allocated time will be counted as unjustified. Absences due to COVID-19 quarantine or isolation requirements are considered excused absences.

In the Womb - National Geographic (30 points)

For this assignment, students will watch a documentary "In the Womb" to acquire knowledge about parental development. Please copy and paste this link to your web browser and watch the documentary. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=0gAsdEUNUJY After watching the documentary, students will complete a 10-questions quiz (30-points). This quiz is **due on 8/26/2020** at the end of the day (11:59pm). This quiz can be **accessed through Blackboard/Connect** and will be available on the first day of class until the due date (All quizzes are due at the end of the day (i.e., 11:59pm) of the due date).

Quizzes (240 points)

There will be 12 online quizzes (each quiz = 10 questions, 20 points) given throughout the semester. For each online quiz, you have 15 minutes to complete 10 multiple choice questions. You are allowed to use your notes and PowerPoint slides. When completing your online quizzes, you have 2 attempts, the highest of which will count as your score. Multiple attempts are offered to act as a buffer for less-than-satisfactory previous attempts, technical difficulty, and unexpected events. There are no attempts available beyond the ones offered even if the problem was out of your control. **Please refer to the course syllabus (see below) for when each quiz is due.** All quizzes can be **accessed through Blackboard/Connect** and will be available on the first day of class until the due date (All quizzes are due at the end of the day (i.e., 11:59pm) of the due date). **Feedback on the quizzes will be provided 1-hour after the due date for each quiz.**

Exams (480 points)

There will be four non-cumulative exams given in class throughout the semester (each exam = 60 multiple choice questions, 120 points). Exams can be accessed through Blackboard/Connect. **Students will be allowed to take the exam during the regular class time (i.e., 9:35am to 10:55am).** Students are allowed to use their notes and PowerPoint slides. All exams will cover material presented in lecture, activities, films, and the assigned chapter readings.

Make-up quiz and exam policy

No make-up exams/quiz will be administered unless the student contacts Professor Todorovic (Kristina.Todorovic@rockets.utoledo.edu) within 24 hours of the missed exam or quiz, AND also provide a medical certificate or other documentation to excuse the absence. If the student foresees that s/he will be absent for an exam (i.e., religious holidays), please provide a note to the instructor at least 1 week in advance. If the absence is justified, necessary arrangements will be made to retake the exam/quiz. If an exam/quiz is missed, and the students failed to contact the instructor within the allocated time and/or the absence is not justified, the student will be given a 0.

Make-up exams/quiz will be scheduled with the professor and will be administered outside of regular class hours. Make-up exams/quizzes must be completed within one week after the scheduled exam/quiz.

EXTRA CREDIT

Course Attendance: For this course, we have a total of 24 classes excluding exam dates, fall break, and Thanksgiving break. As mentioned above, students who attend 22 out of 24 classes will receive the full course attendance grade (i.e., 110 points). Although students will not be penalized for missing up to 2 classes, students who attended more than 22 classes will be rewarded with an additional 5 points per class (i.e., for students who attended 23 out of 24 classes, students will receive an additional 5 points whereas for students who attended all classes (i.e., 24 classes), those students will receive an additional 10 points).

Other extra credit opportunities may arise over the course of the semester. These will be announced in class at the instructor's discretion. Extra credit points will be awarded at the end of the semester.
