Course/Catalog Description

Emphasizes research and theory from conception through old age and integrates important developmental issues with a lifespan approach. **Prerequisite:** Introduction to Psychology (PSY 1010)

- Evaluate current and past research in the study of the lifespan guided by theories within developmental psychology.
- Apply developmental psychology principles to daily life throughout the lifespan.
- Detect myths and misconceptions regarding human development throughout the lifespan. [1]
- Describe methodological approaches used to study development. [SEP]
- Assess and critically analyze theories, research methodology and findings (outcomes), and applications developed by developmental psychologists and made available through diverse media (e.g., textbooks, newspapers, professional and lay periodicals, and the Internet).
- Seize opportunities to engage in clear thinking and clear writing with or without the use of electronic devices. [55]
- Demonstrate ability to complete exams/quizzes/assignments and engage in class discussion.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS AND GRADING POLICY (NO LATE SUBMISSION ALLOWED FOR ALL ASSIGNMENTS)

1. Quest: Journey Through the Lifespan (75 points; each quest = 15 points)

There will be 5 online quests given throughout the semester. This learning game provides students with multiple opportunities to apply the course materials to real-life scenarios. Students will complete quest assignments in which they make decisions that apply key concepts and theories for various people across the lifespan ranging from 9-months to 80-years-old. Students have unlimited attempts on all quests. All quests can be accessed through **Blackboard/Connect** and will be available on the first day of class until the due date (All quests are due at the end of the day (i.e., 11:59pm) of the due date).

2. National Geographic. Life Before Birth: In the Womb Quiz (30 points)

For this assignment, students will watch a documentary "In the Womb" to acquire knowledge about prenatal development. Please copy and paste this link to your web browser and watch this documentary. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=0gAsdEUNUJY. After watching this documentary, students will complete a 10-questions quiz (30 points).

3. Reflections (150 points; each reflection is 30 points)

Students will be expected to complete five reflections on various topics (please see Blackboard for the specific topics). For each reflection, students will be graded according to the rubric posted on Blackboard. <u>All</u> reflections are due at the end of the day (i.e., 11:59pm) of the due date.

4. Chapter Quizzes (320 points; each quiz = 20 points; Using Proctorio System)

There will be 16 Chapter Quizzes in this course. For each chapter quiz, there will be 10 multiple choice questions, 20 points). For each chapter quiz, students are provided with 15 minutes to complete it. This quiz will be proctored online (i.e., the system will record video from the test taker's webcam during the assessment). *All quiz questions will cover material presented in powerpoint slides, activities, films, and the assigned chapter readings*. All chapter quizzes can be accessed through **Blackboard/Connect** and will be available on the first day of class until the due date (All chapter quizzes are due at the end of the day (i.e., 11:59pm) of the due date).

5.Exams (560 points; each exam = 140 points; Using Proctorio System)

There will be four non-cumulative online. *All exams will cover material presented in PowerPoint slides, lectures, activities, films, and the assigned chapter readings.* Students must take the exam on one of the days that are designated for the exam. Students will have from 12:00 am on day 1 until 11:59 pm on day 7 to complete the exam (see course calendar for exam due dates). Students can only take the exam once, not on each day. Students have 80 minutes to complete each exam. This exam will be proctored online (i.e., the system will record video from the test taker's webcam during the assessment). *PLEASE REMEMBER TO SUBMIT YOUR EXAM FOR GRADING WHEN YOU ARE FINISHED WITH YOUR EXAM.* THIS ENSURES THAT YOUR GRADE IS ENTERED INTO MY GRADE BOOK. YOU SHOULD BE ABLE TO VIEW YOUR GRADE AFTER THE EXAM PERIOD IS OVER.

When taking the chapter quizzes and exams, please follow these guidelines:
