Course Description

The objective of this course is to provide an in-depth analysis of selected theories, empirical findings, and methodologies in field of social cognition. Social cognition is an approach to studying how people make sense of other people, themselves, and social situations by focusing on the cognitive processes and structures that underlie judgments, decisions, perceptions, beliefs, and behaviors. The topics include (but are not limited to) attribution, counterfactual thinking, judgment heuristics, schemas, person perception, attitudes, and stereotypes/prejudice. By the end of this class, you should be able to:

- 1. understand how and why cognitive processes and structures are relevant to social situations.
- 2. recognize the complexities underlying social thought and behavior,
- 3. critically evaluate research findings in scientific journal articles, and
- 4. apply basic science findings in social cognition to everyday judgments, decisions, and behaviors involving the self and other people.

Course Readings and Text

The readings are from various textbooks, edited books, and journal articles. All of these required readings and can be accessed through Blackboard (see "Lecture Content and Readings" link). On occasion, I may post additional, testable material (e.g., a short reading, a graph, supplementary lecture information) on Blackboard. In the event that I do post such material, I will announce this in class or via email.

Class "Meetings" in Blackboard

The course will be run synchronously online. This means that we will have a "live" meeting during normal class time in Blackboard using Collaborate Ultra. To join the course meeting, you log into Blackboard and click the link on the left-hand side of our Blackboard site labelled "BB Collaborate Ultra for Live Class Meetings". Once inside that link, you should click on the icon labelled "Blackboard Collaborate Ultra" (with the video camera icon). Next, you should click on the link called "2021:4 Fall, PSY3720:001 Social Cognition - Course Room". This should allow you to join the meeting. You should be able to "join" the live

meeting/course room 15 minutes before the start of class. Please make sure to login on time. If you have questions during the meeting, please use the chat function to either ask your question or use the "raise hand" function to indicate that you would like to ask a question. Course Requirements

Exams

There will be 4 exams over the course of the semester worth 100 points each (400 total). Each exam will draw from the readings, lectures, and other content presented and/or assigned since the previous exam (i.e., none of the exams, including the final, are comprehensive). You can expect some questions about definitions, research designs, theories, and results, but many of the questions will ask you to apply the materials of this course to some real-world situation. Exams are taken online through the Blackboard system. On the day of the exam (see schedule below), log into Blackboard and click on the "Exams" link on the left side. The relevant exam will be open from 8am-midnight on the day of the exam, and you can take it at any point during that time frame. You should not use your notes, book, journal articles, electronic devices, etc. during the exam. Thus, you should prepare for these online exams in the same way you prepare for any other in-class exam. Given that these are being taken online, you have a limited amount of time to complete each exam. Specifically, you will have 50 minutes to complete each exam, which will give you about 1.5 minutes per question. Once you begin the exam, you will need to complete it in one sitting (not in multiple tries). Under extreme circumstances, I will allow a given exam window to be extended if the student has a legitimate, university-appropriate reason for missing the window the first time. Please contact me (Dr. Rose) via email ASAP if you find yourself in this situation.

Respondus Lock Down Browser: Exams in this course are taken on-line through "Respondus Lock Down Browser" in Blackboard. This program is already on computers at the Field House and main campus library, but you may need to take several minutes to download on your computer prior to the examination. Portfolio Reaction Papers

One important aspect of learning this material is developing your ability to relate it to the real world. To this end, at <u>4 different points</u> throughout the course, you will be asked to identify and document examples of social-cognitive phenomena out in the real world. These can be based on your own personal experience (e.g., conversations with others, your observations of other people, of yourself, etc.), or taken from the media (news programs, pundits, magazines, etc.) or from popular culture (e.g., films, paintings, music, etc.). For each example, you would identify and describe the example, provide any references (e.g., news article, movie, etc.), and then explain exactly how it relates to a social cognitive theme, topic or process covered in lectures or readings. The examples do not need to relate to any particular course content; that is, they can relate to anything in

the entire course, whether presented in a lecture, reading, video, etc. Your explanation of each example must be between half a page and 1 full page (typed, double-spaced, 1-inch margins, 12-point font). These will be submitted on Blackboard by the due dates listed below (see schedule). To submit these, go into Blackboard and click on the link for "Portfolio Papers". Next, you will see four assignments corresponding to each of the four portfolio papers you will complete throughout the semester (e.g., Portfolio Paper 1, Portfolio Paper 2). Click on the relevant portfolio paper that you will be submitting to attach your paper. Papers handed in late will receive 5 points off for each class day they are late unless the student has a university-appropriate excuse. Also, failure to follow instructions (e.g., formatting, page limits) will result in point deductions.
