Course Description

This is a General Education Social Science Core course. This course will provide an overview of psychology, psychological research basics, biological bases of behavior, perception, learning, cognition, emotion, motivation, development, psychological disorders, and an introduction to social psychology. The Learning Objectives are based on the UT Core and American Psychological Association Undergraduate Learning Goals and Outcomes.

Course Goals

Course goals and learning objectives will be assessed via weekly quizzes, discussion board posts and responses, and exams. By the end of the semester, you should:

- Possess a <u>knowledge base in psychology</u>, including key concepts, principles, and themes across psychological domains (e.g., biological bases, cognition, individual differences, and development)
- Understand **scientific inquiry and critical thinking**, including scientific thinking and the strengths and limitations of research designs, methods, and results
- Reflect on <u>ethical and social responsibility in a diverse world</u>, including the importance of individual differences and diversity, interpersonal relationships, and ethical principles of behavior
- Reflect on <u>communication</u>, including conveying information and interacting with others
- Be aware of <u>personal and professional development</u>, including how this course may inform the understanding of yourself, others, and future personal and professional goals


Office Hours

Grading & Assignments

All Assignments in this course are due on Fridays at 5:00PM.

A variety of assignments will be used in an effort to provide a comprehensive estimate of whether the course goals and learning outcomes have been achieved. Please note that course goals, learning objectives, grading, and assignments are all logically interconnected. Your knowledge of the material covered in the book, supplemental materials, and lectures will be assessed with weekly quizzes, discussion board posts/responses, and exams.

Attendance:

Virtual class attendance is required and will count toward your final grade. Attendance is automatically recorded in Blackboard Collaborate Ultra. "Attending" class means being there for the entire time. If you miss a significant portion of a lecture, you may be given partial or no attendance credit for that class period. You are allowed two unexcused absences from the class that can be used for any reason (no need to contact me but you will still be responsible for learning the material). If you will be absent from class beyond the two unexcused absences you must contact the instructor and/or TA via email before the class you will miss, except under extenuating circumstances. Absences will be deemed excused in consultation with me. Excused absences may include university sponsored events and illness (your own or immediate family for whom you provide care). Any work missed must be made up within one week. Contact me about extended absences; if you are ill for long periods (more than four weeks), consider petitioning for a medical withdrawal.

Each day you attend class is worth 5 points. You will begin the course with full attendance points (125 points). Each *unexcused* absence beyond the two "freebies" will result in a deduction of 5 points. Your final attendance grade will be pulled from Blackboard Collaborate Ultra at the end of the semester. <u>Attendance points cannot be made up by completing other assignments.</u>

Weekly Quizzes:

Weekly quizzes will be used to help you to judge your understanding of the psychological principles and information you learn from video presentations and read about in the textbook. These quizzes are found on the Blackboard course site. You will have one hour to complete each quiz. Chapter quizzes will be worth a maximum of 20 points each. There will be sixteen quizzes throughout the semester. You may take each of the quizzes up to five times. Your highest score of the five attempts will count toward your final grade. You may use your book or notes to help you complete the quiz, but you should not work with other students. **Quizzes will always be due on Fridays at 5:00PM.** Late quizzes will NOT be accepted. Ouiz points cannot be made up by completing other assignments.

Discussion Board Posts and Responses:

To stimulate engagement of the course material, I will post topics to be discussed within your Discussion Group, to which you will be randomly assigned. You are responsible for engaging in the discussion through the Group Discussions in Blackboard.

For discussion boards, you will need to create an initial post (worth 40 points) and respond to two posts created by other students (20 points each). Initial discussion board posts for the week's topic must be posted by Friday at 5:00PM of the week listed and your two discussion responses must be submitted by the following Friday 5:00PM. There will be a total of 3 discussion board topics for the course (for a maximum of 240 points). Responses to the discussion board topics will be graded and it is expected that your initial post should consist of at least five sentences (roughly one short paragraph) and your responses to other students' posts should be at least three sentences. Any posts and/or responses shorter than this requirement may not receive full points. The discussion board schedule is listed directly below and also in the syllabus schedule at the end of the document. Late discussion board posts and responses will NOT be accepted. Discussion board points cannot be made up by completing other assignments.

There will also be a common questions and concerns discussion board thread that will remain in the Group Discussions area for the duration of the semester. General questions about the course, grading, assignments, topics, and so on should be posted here. This is a good place to post questions that other students probably have. I will check and respond to these general questions weekly.

Exams:

There will be four exams throughout the semester. The exams will be composed of 50 multiple-choice questions and each question will be worth 2.5 points (you can earn up to 125 points). You will have two hours to complete each exam. Exams will be distributed online via Blackboard and should be taken from home. You will be allowed to use your notes, PowerPoints, book, and internet. However, you are not allowed to work with other students. Exams will cover the material from class lectures and the course textbook. **Keep in mind that some questions will require you to apply learned information to real world situations, consistent with the learning outcomes of the course.**

You will always have one week (Monday at 8:00AM – Friday at 5:00PM) to complete the exams. Late exams will NOT be accepted.

You will be allowed to retake one exam at the end of the semester during finals week. Some things to consider:

- You can choose whichever exam you would like to retake.
- You may only retake one exam.
- Your highest grade will be kept. If you do worse on the retake it will not hurt your grade.
- Exam 4 will still be held during finals week, thus you will likely be extra busy so plan accordingly.

Please note that the biggest mistake students make with open-book exams is not studying! If you do not study, you will not do well. It is impossible to look up the answers to all 50 questions in 2 hours. You should continue to study as if this were a closed-book test. This will allow you to answer most questions without using outside resources.

Participation in Psychology Department Research:

You are required to participate in <u>research in the psychology department</u> as part of this course. **You must earn up to at least 5 RESEARCH CREDIT HOURS to receive a grade for this course**. Research participation credit will NOT be factored into your final grade for the course, however you will receive an INCOMPLETE (I) in the course if you do not earn the 5 credits by the end of the semester. To fulfill this course requirement, you may either

write 5 research papers, or participate in 5 credit hours of research studies, or do some combination of the two options. Two of these credit hours may be completed via online research experiments. If you cannot participate due to scheduling issues or would prefer not to participate, you can fulfill this requirement by writing reports on scientific articles. If you are under the age of 18 years, you will need to have a parent or guardian complete a permission slip that will allow you to participate in departmental research studies. You can find this permission slip on the Blackboard course site. You MUST fulfill this requirement, or you will receive an INCOMPLETE grade for the class. I repeat: if you do not participate in research or complete the reports you will NOT receive a grade for the course. You must have fulfilled the research requirement by 5pm on the last day of classes: Friday, April 30, 2021. Please see the link on Blackboard for additional information.

<u>Writing Research Reports</u>: Each report (worth 1 unit of research credit) will be based on a scientific article in a psychology journal.

You are to summarize and critically evaluate the article by:

- ✓ Identifying the purpose of the study (why did the authors conduct this study)
- ✓ Stating the hypotheses in the study (what did the authors predict would happen?)
- ✓ What type of sample was used? (who were the participants?)
- ✓ Summarizing in sufficient detail the method used (what procedures and materials were used?)
- ✓ Reporting the results from the study and the general conclusions (what did the authors find?)
- ✓ What is your reaction to this research?

This link will be used to submit ALL reports. That is, if you are submitting multiple reports, you will use this same link to review/summarize different articles.
