PSE's goals and objectives for the students of the Sell-A-Thon aligns with Vector's goal in teaching students the essence of sales, which gives our partnership purpose. We want students to understand sales beyond the stigma and grow in both verbal and nonverbal soft skills. We also believe it is an excellent opportunity for students to make connections with their peers and perform in a competitive environment.



People

Yes, Vector is in the business of selling knives, but we are truly in the business of people; it's where our heart is. Any decisions we make are based on our people. We work with young individuals, typically college students, who are looking for either part time or summer work and aim to develop them into the best version of themselves by equipping them with life skills that can be honed in all areas, be it school, sales, relationships, or future careers.

We provide students with opportunities to grow and expand by promoting from within, starting as Sales Representatives and moving up into Assistant Managers, Branch Managers, District Managers, and so on. As our Vector East President, Albert DiLeonardo, puts it, "Why do people stay in an era where young people are leaving a position after two years? It's always challenging you. It's always exciting. People feel like they're being recognized and appreciated and they feel like they're growing. In order to grow sales in our business, we have to grow our people."

Cutco® was established in 1949 and is the largest manufacturer of kitchen cutlery in the United States and Canada. The knives are American-made with Cutco's® headquarters in Olean, New York, where thousands of high quality knives are built, assembled, sharpened, and distributed.

The knives are carefully constructed at the factory in Olean, first punched out of the highest quality, stain-resistant sheet metal. From there, they are tempered, keeping the blades strong throughout many years of usage. Then they are polished into a mirror-like shine and are sharpened and leveled before their final assembly and distribution.

And not only are they the world's finest cutlery, they are quaranteed forever.

The Forever Guarantee ensures the Cutco® owners their knives will be as good tomorrow as the first time they used them. No matter how long you've had your knives for, Cutco® will inspect, sharpen, and shine any of your Cutco® knives at any point in time. And should you pass your knives along, the guarantee remains the same.

Programs

Vector has many programs that help students grow and learn the business. Someone doesn't have to have experience to work at Vector; we have programs in place for training. The initial training for new sales representatives takes an individual with no sales experience and shapes them into a representative with the skills to meet with and present to our customers. Management training is done in conjunction with the school year to optimize students' schedules, allowing them to focus on their education, which prepares our representatives to be Branch Managers as early as one year after they start.

We even have programs that teach someone how to recruit, train, and manage a sales force.

Skills for Life

In a world that is technologically advanced, it is growing more difficult for students to find sources to learn soft skills that enhance communication and public speaking or builds confidence in individuals. Our mission is to not only equip students with these soft skills, but to simultaneously unearth qualities previously unrevealed in themselves. "In first place, it is an absolute honor to award the Lewis F. Gordon Top Gold Chapter to..." Outgoing National President Jon Salvani's voice echoes through the banquet room in St. Louis. Next, the only audible noise is the intake of breath from the 500 anxiously awaiting Pi Sigma Epsilon members and guests. The next words out of Jon's mouth would validate years' worth of work for Delta Tau from UNCW, Gamma Nu from The Ohio State University or the reigning Top Gold Chapter for the last three years: Gamma Gamma from Miami University.

The road to competing for the Top Gold Chapter When Kyle Lamalie was elected as the next President I is a long and tedious one. Rewind to one year prior when a similar group assembled in Milwaukee, University's members had just been recognized in 2016 Gamma Nu Chapter President, Will Cicerchi, wanted more. The next year was going to be filled with insecurities about a risky financial initiative, struggling to generate projects and the pressure to meet the high expectations and standards that comes with becoming the best chapter in the nation. "The only measure of success this year was achieving the Top Gold Chapter award and we echoed that message throughout all of the activities we completed," Cicerchi says. "There was no need for micromanagement when each member understood how valuable and important they were in the pursuit of this award."

for Gamma Nu, the message and goals of the chapter stayed the same. "People wanted the chapter to WI for the 6oth National Convention. The Ohio State succeed so they put in extra effort on the projects and committees on their own." Lamalie says. The first third place for the title, an incredible honor, but months of Kyle's term was devoted to maintaining the chapter's motivation and completing all the necessary steps to be able to compete. Gamma Nu's written entry placed them in the top five, granting them the ability to give an onsite presentation and plead their case as to why they believe they are the best in the nation. Entire college careers of work all come down to the 30 minute presentation. The winning chapter is announced three days later at the conclusion of the week-long convention.

The room erupts as Will Cicerchi, Kyle Lamalie and the rest of Gamma Nu jump up and celebrate their dream coming true. "That moment validated the last three and a half years of my life and I'm sure there were other members in St. Louis that night who felt the same way" Cicerchi says and adds "There are over 100 people that deserve credit for this award. We won this award because everyone in Gamma Nu believed we were the best and worked unbelievably hard throughout the year." Kyle Lamalie recounts the moment, "When our name was finally announced, it was though a weight had been lifted off our shoulders. All those countless hours and all of that work finally came to fruition. The moment in itself could only be described as magical."



So what is next for Gamma Nu? The chapter is determined to repeat their success. They are using this win as motivation to be even better than the year before and want to continually examine their operations in systematic approach. Will Cicerchi is graduating with confidence that the best is yet to come for The Ohio State University and says, "We want the future generations of this chapter to reap even more benefits than we had during our time in Pi Sigma Epsilon. There is no doubt in my mind that Gamma Nu will continue to grow and set new standards of success moving forward in to the future."

IN LOVING MEMORY: ARNO KLEIMENHAGEN

4/21/1933 - 3/9/2017

Arno Kleimenhagen served Pi Sigma Epsilon in various capacities beginning in 1965. One such capacity was as co-faculty advisor of the Beta Gamma chapter at the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater. During his time as faulty advisor, Beta Gamma swept the national awards in 1972 and went on to win the Top Chapter Award for an unprecedented, and still unrepeated, seven consecutive years from 1972-1978. He would go on to Chair the Marketing Department at UW-Whitewater for 20 years.

Dr. Kleimenhagen also served the fraternity at the national level. He was first elected to the Board of Directors in 1977-78 as the Educator Director, which eventually became the Educator Vice President position on the National Council, from 1978 until 1981. He was then elected as the Administrative Vice President on the National Council for the 1981-1982 PSE year. Following his term as Administrative VP, he was elected as Pi Sigma Epsilon National President. He would serve in this capacity until 1983. In 1986, he became the Central Divisional Director for PSE.



Dr. Kleimenhagen will be lovingly remembered as a great teacher, mentor, leader and friend. He had the unique ability to bring out the best in others and challenged his students to reach their full potential. PSE is a far superior organization because of his many contributions. He will be dearly missed.



PAWELCZYK 2017 WHAN CHALLENGER

The Whan Challenger Award is presented to the collegiate member who upholds all the principles of Pi Sigma Epsilon in his/her interaction with their chapter, other chapters, and in pursuit of academic goals. He/She exhibits outstanding qualities in leadership, motivation, guidance, initiative, and humility.

The 2017 Whan Challenger Award was presented to Jacob Pawelczyk from Epsilon Delta, University of Toledo. Jacob was named a Future Leader in 2015 and went on to become Epsilon Delta's Chapter President for two years. We spoke with Jacob about his PSE experiences and what is to come for him.
