Course Description

The course will focus upon the many managerial and user facets of Information Technology from the vantage of a practitioner. Included will be current event discussions (e.g. read your WSJ), lectures, case studies, class participation, individual or group presentations, reports, guest speakers, and examinations. Areas we will be concentrating upon include: Information Systems in Business, Strategic Decision Making, eBusiness, Ethics and Security, Data Management, Networks / Telecommunications / Mobile Computing, Functional I/T applications, Globalization, Innovation, and 21st Century Organizational Trends.

Course Objectives

- Understand the role of I/T in an organization and how it impacts various functional areas
- Understand the components of I/T, such as architecture, infrastructure, systems, etc.
- Understand and relate to information requirements and process flows in business
- Understand the value of I/T to an organization both conceptually and practically
- If you major in I/T, to gain an elevated energy; if not, a higher appreciation of I/T
- Be able to actively participate in future I/T planning and project implementations
