Faculty Senate Programs Committee

report on the question of "double-dipping" and certificate programs

During the 01/21/2020 Faculty Senate meeting, the following question was asked:

If the required courses for a certificate program also satisfied the course requirements for a Major or Minor program (irrespective of whether required or elective), then can Major and Minor students also complete the certificate?

The answer is yes.

This question was discussed in FSEC and with Matt Exline, the Director of Program Approval Operations for the State of Ohio. There is also an existing Faculty Senate document on certificates (Guidelines for Developing a New Undergraduate Certificate of Study):

All information gathered was consistent and led to the above conclusion. Major and Minor students can also complete a certificate within their subject area. In fact, certificates are often designed to benefit Major and Minor students. The FS document states that certificate programs may be developed within a four year Major degree program, and in some cases certificates may be stacked to satisfy the requirements of a four year Major degree program, therefore the question of "double-dipping" does not apply. This was also confirmed by Matt Exline.

The purpose of a certificate is to transcript the acquisition of a specific marketable skills set by the completion of a set of courses, which are defined by the certificate program. This skills set may be acquired while completing a Major or Minor degree program or it may be acquired by completing a stand alone certificate. By codifying and transcripting these skills sets, we provide our students with additional credentials to give them an edge when seeking employment opportunities.

Summary: This Minor is being updated for clarity and accessibility. The number of hours needed to complete the minor has been dropped from 21 to 18, still robust but more accomplishable for students.

Rationale: The existing requirements have been too restrictive and the number of courses required have presented a burden for students.

Elective Courses: 12 hrs (removed)

Upon completion of the required foundations courses, students must take 12 hours distributed in any of the following subject areas: 2D Studies (drawing, printmaking, painting), 3D Studies (sculpture, ceramics), New Media Studies (photography, digital arts), with no more than nine hours in one studio area. A minimum of six hours must be in Advanced Art Studies courses at the 3000 level and above.

It is strongly recommended that the following art history survey courses be taken: ARTH 2050 History of Western Art or ARTH 2060 History of Western Art II One course in the history of non-Western art One additional course in the history of Western art

Political Science, Minor

Summary: We are reducing the required hours from 21 to 18.

Rationale: We are aligning the number of credit hours in the political science minor with the number of credit hours in the public administration minor.

Students seeking a minor in political science must complete at least 18 21 hours of course work at the 2000 level or above in the discipline, chosen in consultation with a departmental adviser. It is recommended that minors include in their undergraduate program the introductory course in American Government (PSC 1200) and three of the four gateway subfields. At least 9 of the 18-credit 21 credit hour minimum must be at the 3000-4000 levels.

Public Administration, Minor

Summary: We are reducing the required hours from 21 to 18 and updating the list of courses.

Rationale: We are reactivating the MPA program. We should reactivate related undergraduate programs given that the courses will be offered. Political science majors wishing to minor in public administration are advised to consider the Early Admission program for the MPA.

The minor in public administration is comprised of 18 hours of course work of which at least 15 hours shall be taken at the 3000 or 4000 level. Political science students minoring in public administration may not utilize 3000 or 4000 level public administration identified courses to fulfill their political science major requirements.

Liberal Studies, BA

Summary: The purpose of this program modification is to remove the 3000-4000 level requirement for the nine credit hours of Concentration courses.

Rationale: Upon review, the Curriculum Committee discovered that the total requirement for hours at the 3000-4000 level has grown to 52, which is significantly above the number required for most programs at the University. This has created a barrier, particularly for transfer students interested in the Liberal Studies program. No other aspect of the curriculum is being altered.
