

Approval of Minutes

The meeting was called to order and the roll called. The Minutes of the Graduate Council meeting of January 28, 2020 were approved.

Information and Discussion Items

<u>Mental Health Needs of the Faculty – Dr. Linda Lewandowski, Dean of the College of Nursing and Vice-Provost for Health Affairs</u>

Dean Lewandowski thanked Council for the opportunity to speak to them in her role as Vice Provost for Health Affairs and coordinator of the mental health response team, about the mental health needs during the pandemic, information that may be useful to faculty. The coordination brings together our mental health services across campuses to include Psychology, Disability Services, Counseling, Clinical Psychology and Nurse Practitioners meeting weekly to discuss how we can provide services.

Graduate students may be concerned with interruption of research and international students may feel isolated among other concerns of uncertainty, fear, and vulnerability of a nasty disease floating around in our communities. Graduate students are served by the Counseling Center. There is group support so graduate students can talk to other graduate students. Graduate students seeking support should be directed to the Counseling Center.

Another group is our faculty who are dealing with many of those same concerns, teaching online and a new state of affairs of family at home and stress of an uncertain future. Dean Lewandowski is interested in getting feedback from Graduate Council and from Faculty Senate after visiting with them next week. Are there some resources we can provide to faculty in additional to EAP? There is a mental health tab on UT website https://www.utoledo.edu/offices/rocketwellness/campus.html that is available to all faculty and staff including talking to a counselor. We are wondering if interested in university-wide group support for faculty. Faculty in nursing have expressed concern with confidentiality. Want to hear from you and what you think some of the issues are so we can bring resources to support our faculty.

There is a special hotline for UTMC hotline, set up by psych staff. They also working on providing other resources for those in the hospital. It is important and it will get better but it will take a while. How we help support each other is important. Share your ideas. LL – please feel free to email me. We will bring back to health response team which meets every Thursday. Thank you and stay safe and health and take care of yourself.

Executive Reports

Report of the Executive Committee of the Graduate Council

On behalf of Graduate Council, Dr. Song-Tao Liu, Chair reported the following:

- GCEC is continuing its work remotely
 Chair Liu attended the Board of Trustees meeting on April 13th and has a regularly scheduled meeting with the Provost on April 22nd. Concerns may be sent to Chair Liu. At its meeting on April 14th the GCEC primarily discussed two policies:
- Transfer Credit Policy
 Will be open for vote today. GC can review and send votes to Chair Liu by 5:00 pm April 22nd.
- Academic Dishonesty Policy
 Policy is in draft stage. Dr. Mike Dowd attended GCEC meeting to provide a brief description of the history and rationale. GCEC will review further and share with our colleagues of the Academic Standing Committee. Expect voting to be done in fall semester.
- Curriculum Committee
 The Graduate Council Curriculum Committee (GCCC) led by Dr. Ozcan Sezer is currently reviewing a major batch of curriculum, about 70 proposals.
- Membership Committee
 The Membership Committee is actively reviewing applications and will present its regular report and year-end report at the last and final GC meeting of this academic year on May 5th.

New GC/GCEC in place following May 5th GC meeting.
 Some of colleges elections done with new GC reps identified. There will be turnover of GCEC as elections for officers for GC 2020-2021 will take place following adjournment of GC 2019-2020, when Dr. Wendy Cochrane will start her term as Chair.

Report of the Vice Provost for Graduate Affairs and Dean of the College of Graduate Studies

Dr. Amanda Bryant-Friedrich, Vice Provost for Graduate Affairs and Dean of the College of Graduate

Studies deferred her report to the end of the meeting, time permitting, to allow sufficient time for her agenda discussion item with Dr. Frank Calzonetti 'Financial Support of Graduate Education in the new normal'.

She thanked Dean Lewandowski for attending Graduate Council. Different groups have virtual happy hours and some faculty are on Graduate Council and Faculty Senate or committees, but others are not and need a way of seeing/communicating with one another so they do not feel like they are alone.

Dean Lewandowski agreed that group support is worthwhile.

Report of the Graduate Student Association

Ms. Alisa Nammavong, President of the Graduate Student Association (GSA) reported:

- GSA Report to BOT April 13, 2020
 Presented my last report as GSA President.
- O GSA President/Vice President meeting with Provost April 17, 2020
 Discussed students' concerns with transition to online classes and labs/externships/clinical experiences. Students do not feel they are getting the full experience with loss of lab time and how best to do that work. They are seeking the return of park and lab fees. Undergraduate student government shared that they met with President Sharon Gaber, Dr. Flapp Cockrell, Vice President for Student Affairs, and Mr. Matt Schroder, Exec VP Finance and Administration and CFO. It seems unlikely they will get a return on things like parking. GSA has reached out to Gina Roberts, Assistant VP of Enrollment Management, in order to have an actual statement to provide to students with background and reasoning. We discussed with the Provost opportunities for students to seek assistance, like the Rocket to Rocket fund, the implementation of Cares Act 2020 and how it will affect students in the future.

Dean Bryant-Friedrich thanked Ms. Nammavong as well for her hard work and being a strong student advocate. She was proud to work with her adding that as a first responder as a nurse, Ms. Nammavong has done an exceptionally fabulous job.

Report of the Vice President for Research

Dr. Frank Calzonetti gave a brief report to allow time for the agenda discussion item with Dean Bryant-Friedrich 'Financial Support of Graduate Education in the new normal'.

He reported that RSP is working on putting together a plan to ramp up research and field research. Dr. Connie Schall serves as the lead with a committee and sub-committees, which GC has a part of this. Dr. Schall led an initial meeting of the group on April 20th and will meet again on April 27th. Information and Discussion Items

<u>Financial Support of Graduate Education in the new normal – Inclusion of Tuition in Externally Funded</u> <u>Grants and Contracts</u>

Dr. Frank Calzonetti and Dean Bryant-Friedrich presented a discussion of inclusion in tuition in externally funded grants and contracts.

Dean Bryant-Friedrich began by stating that the Provost had alerted her and Dr. Frank Calzonetti to find a means to transition the way we invest in proposals to support graduate students that was going to require a change in policy. Presently, we support tuition for graduate students who receive stipends from funded projects. With current budget and pandemic issues, this is not a sustainable option, particularly when tuition support could be gained from an external agency.

Explanation followed bullet points on slides of presentation:

Discussion

- Most Ph.D. granting universities now charge sponsors for tuition
- In-state tuition must be included in the budget of all proposals with due dates on or after July 1 or submitted after June 30
- Tuition waivers on current grants and those submitted with due dates prior to July 1 will be honored.
- Commitments will be honored for tuition waivers in proposals already submitted and not yet awarded
- In-state tuition will be charged to all external grants with special exceptions by the VP for Research and Graduate Dean (e.g., community projects)
- · Grants will only be charged in-state tuition
- There is no F&A charged on tuition
- գTիe RSP 100 will include a sign off for the Gradua<mark>te Մայո</mark>րՕ



This is what most PhD granting institutions do, UToledo is currently an outlier. Most require grant proposals to include in-state tuition waivers and are bound in policy.

Dr. Calzonetti explained that our plan is that in-state tuition will be charged on external grants for proposals with direct costs of over \$100,000 per year with due dates on or after July 1 or submitted after June 30th. Tuition waivers on current grants and those already submitted, will be honored with those commitments already submitted to external agencies. In addition, tenure-track faculty members will be provided tuition waivers on grants they submit as PI on the first three years of their appointment.

There will be opportunities for special exceptions made by the Office of Research and by the College of Graduate Studies Dean. We will continue to work with the City of Toledo and nonprofits, etc., and to make exceptions in rare cases. Grants will only charge in-state tuition and COGS will pick up out-of-state tuition. We will be modify RSP \$100k to include sign off by COGS Graduate Dean.

Dr. Schall estimated full-time in-state tuition for fall, spring and summer at ~\$14,000.

Dean Bryant-Friedrich added that tuition is a moving target that is currently ~\$14,000, which can go up or down. Out-of-state surcharge is funding coming from COGS. We want to trend to a model where our incentive programs are awarding. There will be parameters/guidelines on special exceptions.

Wayne State, the University of California and Auburn University have institution-wide policies and a model for students on research grants that are not program specific. Some require health insurance and fees be included in the grant. Not sure if reasonable at this time. Sometimes the models for COMLS and others programs are broader at other institutions, but they generally require tuition on grants as well.

Discussion:

Dr. Tomer Avidor-Reiss - Concern about obtaining grants from NIH and NSF as a consequence of not bringing tuition waiver and no F&A.

Frank Calzonetti - You can look at analysis, and students coming in getting SSI, so it is complicated.

Amanda Bryant-Friedrich - Benefits are much larger if not having to use current tuition funds.

Terry Hinds – Every program would be different. Did you look at data from across programs that you can share?

Frank Calzonetti – These are survey responses.

Anne Izzi – We conducted an informal survey with our institution. Several Ohio institutions shared their survey results which we reviewed. The majority of Ohio institutions charge tuition to grants now.

Kandace Williams – The majority of new biomedical sciences students do not have a major advisor until spring or summer of their first year. Others have NIH training grants, which we do not. We don't know how we can bring them in and pay tuitions for first year.

Amanda Bryant-Friedrich – COMLS students in first year, COGS pays first year. Your first year will be treated like a GA and TA with stipends/tuition from the university and transition to projects.

Dan Hammel – It is common that the policy of universities includes tuition in budget for grants. It has to be in budget for all proposals.

Amanda Bryant-Friedrich – Program officers may reduce by that amount. That is why Vice President for Research and the COGS Graduate Dean may have a committee to review these. I have read proposals recently and a vast majority make that statement. It does come up as a discussion point.

Tomer Avidor-Reiss – Tuition waiver policy can be changed by whom? Are faculty involved?

Amanda Bryant-Friedrich – Not sure whether it will come from Research and Sponsored Programs, however, all policies at UToledo are vetted by faculty and it would have to go through Graduate Council and Faculty Senate for their response.

Frank Calzonetti – Section says, 'as approved by COGS Graduate Dean'.

Terry Hinds – Is there an option to reduce the stipend or have the student pay the tuition rather than the mentor?

Frank Calzonetti – We have to be consistent across the university according to federal uniform guidance.

Terry Hinds – Why not have the student responsible so that the burden is reduced for the mentor?

Frank Calzonetti – Some people may think it is cheaper for post doc, however, as a university we are here for graduate education, not just as a research institute.

Terry Hinds – We have to think about productivity. One policy across programs does not feasible. Program specific rules may better serve us.

Connie Schall – No indirect costs are assessed on tuition. It is added to the grant.

Kandace Williams – Some faculty are saying it is cheaper to hire post doc. We have one graduate program that it would severely be affected.

Steve Sucheck – Some projects require senior expertise.

Frank Calzonetti – We understand that, but do not expect to wholesale flip from graduate students to post docs and technicians. Graduate education still very important to us and graduate students receive training.

Saurabh Chattopadhyay – Start up packages are different.

Tomer Avidor-Reiss – New faculty should not have to support at the same full rate, perhaps 50%.

Amanda Bryant-Friedrich – We want to consider but it is unclear if we can offer incentives. Depending on funding, which we do not know yet, we may be able to offer. Our university asking us to make this change at once, which is difficult. We need to bring in external funding to support tuition.

Marcia McInerney – Associations and foundations that only have 10% indirect on budgets and smaller budget overall per year.

Amanda Bryant-Friedrich – Frank Calzonetti and I have to look at overall funding mechanism with limitations.

Frank Calzonetti – We follow the written guidelines of funding agencies. We work with and understand that.

Kandace Williams – What percentage of graduate students who get tuition waived are on TAs?

Amanda Bryant-Friedrich – The number transitions a lot. Engineering for example, has TAs on tuition waiver then transition to being fully funded.

We have to make sure that students are not harmed and that they are not dealing with issues of tuition and stipend, that we should be dealing with behind the scenes. Also, we do not want to hurt enrollment and research. If we do not put their tuition waivers on grants, we won't have students. We have to do it because it will impact the viability of our graduate programs. Please send me comments so that I can share with administration.

Song-Tao Liu – Suggested comments be sent to Dean Bryant-Friedrich.

Report of the Vice Provost for Graduate Education and Dean of the College of Graduate Studies

Dean Bryant-Friedrich provided the following updates:

- Centralized Application Services (CAS)
 Continued discussions on the transition to Centralized Application Services. We continue to work with Liaison to transition all graduate applications to CAS systems. This will include the transition to GradCAS, EngineeringCAS and BusinessCAS. The university is doing it due diligence to make sure that this transition is productive and profitable for all involved.
- In-State Tuition for Ohio Grads In-state tuition + \$1 for students who have a degree from an Ohio university. UToledo is in the process of asking the Board of Trustees and the Ohio Department of Higher Education to approve this tuition benefit for those who have an Ohio degree and enroll in a graduate program at the UToledo. A list of all approved programs will be made available but includes all PhD programs and many Master's programs. Professional programs are largely not included. Would like to have in place by fall 2020.
- Undergraduate has already put the process in place to deliver undergraduate courses to students in their country of residence even if it is outside the US. In an effort to make sure that this is a viable option for graduate programs, we have sent a survey to all graduate faculty, deans, department chairs, associate deans and program directors to assess the ability of our campus to deliver this content remotely during the fall semester, to determine if students can participate and to determine how we will proceed if students do not obtain visas. The link was sent yesterday. We have modified it slightly after an email from Dr. Beltyukova, to make sure that all can participate even if they have limited information on the programs in which they participate. The link is https://webforms.utoledo.edu/form/1100150339. If we do not bring in students from international locations, there will be a projected 10% decline in graduate enrollment (from Finance).

Dr. Daniel Hammel added that if the U.S. President says the country is stopping immigration for 120 days, we may not have a choice.

Memo on Graduate Enrollment from Summer 2020 – Summer 2021 Excerpts
All graduate students who receive tuition support from COGS funds and have reached the
maximum number of credits for degree completion should register for a zero-credit course (to be
established) for Summer 2020 and/or Fall 2020 to compensate for time lost due to COVID-19.
Awarding of continued stipend support and permission to enroll in this course would depend on
demonstrating that the delay is due to COVID-19 and that no other avenues except this is
available. Students who register for this course will be responsible for the payment of fees which
allow for access to university facilities. Registration for this course will be permitted for the
semester of graduation.

Priorities:

- In Fall 2020, priority will be given to the continued funding of the tuition of graduate students (Doctoral and Masters) currently serving as teaching, research or graduate assistants.
- In Fall 2020, the transition of current students with limited or no support to positions which require either increased tuition or stipend support from funds originating from COGS will be heavily scrutinized to ensure that they are necessary to fulfill the research, and instructional missions of the institution.
- For Fall 2020, to limit the short- and long-term impact on research and teaching that would be caused by the lack of doctoral students, priority will next be given to new doctoral students to support the university academic and research missions. In Fall 2020, doctoral students will be given academic year contracts.
- For Fall 2020, priority will next be given to those master's students who support the research
 and teaching enterprise. These students will also be given academic year contracts as outlined
 above.
- Any funding remaining for tuition will be utilized for the support of graduate assistants who support administrative offices and tuition scholarships to support the growth of identified areas. Tuition scholarships will be utilized minimally during this time. Looking to put 0 credit hour course house in COGS or 1 with no billable hours. Want to help get them through their programs.

We have to make a commitment to students we have. There is no funding to cover those not continuing. We will prioritize doctoral students in fall 200, then masters.
