SDWA

Water treatment and disinfection one of greatest achievements of 20th century

92% consistently meet all health based standards

15 connection, 25 people

Nebraska v. EPA., 331 F.3d 995, 999 (D.C. Cir. 2003)

- Commerce Clause provides constitutional authority for the SDWA and that the Act does not conflict with the Tenth Amendment
- •SDWA neither compels states to pass legislation nor enforces the federal standards for drinking water

Boler v. Earley, 865 F.3d 391, 404 (6th Cir. 2017)

- •Instead, SDWA regulates states only as public water system owners
- holding that Michigan Department of Environmental Quality (MDEQ) officials were not entitled to absolute immunity).

WELL WATER POPULATION

Over 43 million Americans-15% of the population

Not covered by SDWA -> responsible for maintaining own water

Largely rural (sparsely populated, distance)

25-30% of private drinking water well users are in urban areas

PERI-URBAN

Within commuting distance of public water system

Should be easy fix connect PWS

Municipal Underbounding

- Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 did not include a private right of action to allow private lawsuits based on evidence of disparate impact. Alexander v. Sandoval, 532 U.S. 275 (2001)

CONTAMINATION

USGA 1/5 of the wells had contaminants that exceeded SDWA standards.

1/4 agricultural areas were in exceedance of these standards

34% testing positive for nitrates

99% of emergency department visits for acute gastrointestinal illnesses

Lead levels similar to Flint, Michigan in Wake County, North Carolina

Children 25% increased likelihood of having elevated blood lead levels

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Increase the proportion of people whose water supply meets Safe Drinking Water Act regulations — EH-03
