# **Biographical Sketch**

Felix C. Harman was born in Versailles, Ohio (Darke County) in 1880. He took a job as a school teacher in Ottoville, Ohio (Putnam County) when he finished high school and approximately one year later he entered the Starling Medical School in Columbus, Ohio.

He married his wife, Mary, in Toledo on February 2, 1919. The wedding took place at the Cathedral Chapel Church on Collingwood Ave. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. A. J. Dean, pastor of what later became the Cathedral Parish.

Dr. Harman served as Ottoville's physician for about eight or nine years before his death in September, 1925 of tuberculosis. He apparently contracted the disease earlier while employed as a physician at a TB sanatorium in Arizona where he located after graduation from medical school.

## **Scope and Content**

This collection consists of four photos of Dr. Harman, his Teacher's Common School Certificate and certification of appointment to the Rank of First Lieutenant in the Officers' Reserve Corps. of the U.S. Army. In addition, there are ten medical school notebooks which cover areas of study such as Genito-Urinary Diseases, Neurology, Bacteriology, Chemistry, Pathology, and Dermatology.
