## 1963

A postage stamp was five cents.

Plans for a medical college at the University of Toledo are unveiled – to be built on Secor Road.

As a special interest course, the first UT Creative Writing workshop is offered.

8,463 students enrolled for Fall Quarter.

An expansion to the Student Union is proposed.

Ohioans asked to vote for Issue 1: a bond issue that would in part bring a minimum of \$6 million to the university to “alleviate the increasing enrollment problem.” Ohioans approve the issue on election day.

John F. Kennedy is assassinated, and Lyndon B. Johnson becomes president.

## 1968

A postage stamp was six cents.

UT celebrates one year as a state institution. “Bancroft High” is pronounced dead.

Parking garages and a shuttle bus system under consideration.

Because of space constraints, University Library transfers books to the old BG library for storage.

Stevie Wonder, an 18-year-old senior at Michigan State School for the Blind, performs at the Field House.

Andy Warhol, pop artist turned filmmaker, talks in Doermann Theater about his films.

Richard Nixon wins presidency.

Simon and Garfunkel perform at the Field House.

Novelist Arthur C. Clark, who collaborated with filmmaker Stanley Kubrick on *2001: A Space Odyssey*, speaks in Doermann Theater on “The Promise of Space.”

## 1973

A postage stamp was eight cents.

Dr. Wernher von Braun, developer of the manned space flight program to the moon, speaks in Doermann Theater, outlining America's future of space exploration. Audience informed of something in development called the "space shuttle."

Lucy Komisar, author of *The New Feminism*, speaks at UT concerning the Equal Rights Amendment that is before the Ohio Legislature for consideration.

Carlson Library opens: "All moving has been completed, enabling the new William S. Carlson Library to now be opened to students. As the second largest structure on the main campus, the new building is expected to be adequate to serve the University's need for library space through 1980, after which a wing could be added." --- *Collegian*, 4-4-73

Noel Stock, professor of English at UT, donates to the Rare Books, Archives, and Special Collections of Carlson Library part of his collection of research materials and memorabilia on the poet Ezra Pound. Over time he plans to donate his personal collection of rare books, pamphlets, manuscripts, and photographs of Pound, T.S. Eliot, and others.

The USSR wins the first World Cup of Wrestling in the Field House.

Men's tennis team wins MAC tennis crown.

UT ROTC admits women for the first time as cadets as part of a new policy of the United States Department of the Army.

Fuel oil shortage assured to not severely affect UT because the University, through the State of Ohio, has a contract with Sohio.

## 1978

A postage stamp was fifteen cents.

A national coalminers' strike indirectly affects UT and the University reduces energy consumption by 25%.

Poet Etheridge Knight reads on campus.

Billy Joel performs in Centennial Hall.

Bachelor of Science degree in Computer Science and Engineering created at UT.

John Denver performs in Centennial Hall.

## 1983

A postage stamp was twenty cents

*Return of the Jedi* released in theaters.

UT students protest state budget cuts to higher education. Representative Mary Kaptur visits campus and supports student protests.

MTV launched.

Huey Lewis and the News perform in the Student Union Auditorium.

Jamie Farr donates his MASH scripts to Carlson Library's Canaday Center.

## 1988

A postage stamp was twenty-five cents.

The Writing Center opens with Dr. Joan Mullin as director.

UT debates a new Rec Center. Wins ok from Board of Trustees.

Board of Regents votes to create on-campus Greek housing.

Jesse Jackson has presidential bid rally in Centennial Hall.

UT football great Chuck Ealey joins nine other men in the Mid-American Conference's first ever Hall of Fame class.

Centennial Hall renamed Savage Hall.

President George Bush wins presidential election.

UT President Dr. James McComas announces he is leaving to take Virginia Tech Presidential post. Dr. Frank Horton selected as replacement.

## 1993

A postage stamp was twenty-nine cents.

An Executive Order of Governor Voinovich forbids smoking in state university buildings.

Student Rec Center named one of nation's ten best by *Athletic Business* magazine.

Bill Clinton is sworn in as President of the United States.

Poet Maya Angelou, who read at Clinton's inaugural address, speaks in Savage Hall.

Vice President Al Gore visits campus.

Women's soccer added at UT as a varsity sport.

Current UT bookstore opens as part of the latest Student Union expansion.

UT's Women's Studies Program starts.

## 1998

A postage stamp was thirty-two cents.

President Frank Horton announces resignation.

President Vik Kapoor appointed as 14<sup>th</sup> UT president.

Ralph Nader visits campus for lectures and a book signing.

Bob Taft elected governor.

On Saturday, Dec. 5<sup>th</sup>, Men's Rocket Basketball defeats the Ohio State Buckeyes, 64-63. Justin Hall makes the game winning lay-up with 5.7 seconds left in the game. 9,228 fans attend the game, at the time the fourth largest crowd in Toledo history and the largest since Dec. 23, 1980. The crowd rushed the court.
