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The section of the river bend of the total area of 525 sq km. are on the left bank of the Danube, 87.3 km. on the right bank. The city stretches about 25 km. from north to south and covers all four parts of the town. The lowest point is the surface level of the Danube, which is on average 360 m. above the level of the Adriatic Sea. The highest point in the city is János-hegy (Janos Hill), 528 m. above sea level.

The left (or west) bank of the Danube is flat, but the right (Hungarian) bank is very hilly. The area of land between the two banks is not exactly flat, but the slope is so slight that the area consists of low, even hills. It is not locally flat, but the slope is so slight that the area consists of low, even hills. The difference between the two banks can best be observed from the Danube swings or from one of the points on the bank side offering a panoramic view. It is just the view of the two parts of the town, with the gently flowing river in the foreground, which makes the pleasure of the Hungarian capital an unforgettable memory.

THE WATER

The Danube dominates the picture of the town. The source of the great river, which flows south in the Black Forest in the Federal Republic of Germany, that flows through Budapest, which has an area of 14,000 km², i.e. 28 km. long, its average width is 400 metres, is 400 metres = 40 m. above and below Budapest. Its width is constant for only 200 metres = 40 m. above and below Budapest. The Danube divides several islands, the most known of which is the 23-kilometre-long Óbuda (Obuda) island in the heart of the city. The beautiful park with its huge plane trees, pines and white medieval springs, swimming pools and hotels is famous throughout the world. Another island of international fame, North of the former, is the larger Gellérthegy island. South of Budapest is island Csepel Island, whose northern end forms the 21-kilometre-long Csepel.

The Danube is the only important river in Budapest. The falls strain on the left bank and the floodgates on the right bank, whose flooding has caused serious problems in past centuries, now flow with the Danube, partly between narrow banks and partly through a wide river bed.

Budapest has only one natural lake, the so-called Malom-tó (Mill-pool), a tiny pool
