COURSE PERSPECTIVES AND OBJECTIVES

The BAJ course is an orientation course for students who are beginning their college experience. It is designed to assist in the development of the college skills required to become a successful independent learner in an undergraduate program at a metropolitan research university. A major effort will be directed toward helping new students identify specific academic, career and personal goals, learn about themselves, become aware of the student support services available at UT, and become an active member of the university community.

The BAJ core curriculum is designed to provide all new students with a common experience and foundation that includes (1) developing a familiarity with the benefits of higher education and a general orientation to the functions and resources of UT, (2) strengthening skills for critical thinking, decision making, problem solving, and written and oral communication, (3) reduction of anxiety about course requirements by strengthening and refining academic skills, (4) developing a sense of community on campus with other students, faculty and administrators, (5) promoting computer literacy, (6) encouraging career exploration, academic planning and goal setting, and (7) promoting respect for cultural diversity.

Grading:

In order to successfully complete this course, you must fulfill attendance the requirement (I) and complete all course projects (II) as described below.

I. ATTENDANCE:

Attendance at all formal class meetings is mandatory and participation in class discussion is expected. (If a personal or family emergency makes it impossible for you to be present at a scheduled class event, please notify either your instructor or a peer mentor in advance or as soon as possible; email is best). Participants with more than one (1) unexcused absence will receive a grade deduction. Multiple deductions may result in failure of the course.

II. COURSE PROJECTS:

- Group Project: You must complete the group project at a level deemed satisfactory by the
 instructors. You will be assigned to groups (randomly) and will, as a group, select a topic
 related to biology and/or medicine. Your group will then research that topic and give an
 oral presentation to the others in the class during the last few weeks of the course.
- Groups will give a short (10 minute) presentation near the end of the term discussing their topic, and will also INDIVIDUALLY prepare and hand in a short summary of the information gathered (1-2 pages). Papers are due at the time of the oral presentation. The report must be typewritten and presented at a level deemed satisfactory by the instructor (ie freshman college level). More details about the project will be provided during the second week of class.
- There will also be at least two (and perhaps 3-4) computer-based assignments called "modules". These will be accessed through the blackboard website and will be completed out of class. Further instructions will be made as the assignment dates approach.

- define "diversity" and provide examples that illustrate an understanding of how diversity may positively or negatively impact the university and/or global communities.
- recognize, analyze and evaluate academic integrity as a core principle that underpins how we live and learn in a community of inquiry
- identify academic standards, conventions of documentation, course requirements, and UT institutional policies
