COURSE/CATALOG DESCRIPTION

Introduction to issues currently affecting environmental quality. Fundamental scientific concepts relating to those issues and ethical, economic, legal and political considerations that affect the resolution of environmental problems.

COURSE OVERVIEW

The goal of this course is to give students a broad introduction to Environmental Studies including both the natural sciences and the social, political, and economic forces that contribute to topics of environmental management. The course is organized into three sections. The first section provides a basic understanding of the history and issues that have culminated in the Environmental Movement. The second section covers environmental science topics that address environmental problems. And finally, the third section will feature guest lectures by professionals from across Lucas County, and potentially considers legal, economic, political, ethical and social factors that contribute to, or work against, solutions to environmental problems. Our speakers will hopefully relate directly to careers you are considering.

GRADING

Your grade will be based on three 200-point exams (600 points), eighteen 20-point writing assignments (360 points) that will help with your reading and class discussion, and four 10-point Q&A sheets (40 points) to help guide discussion with our guest lecturers (1000 points total).

The exams will include various formats including multiple choice, short answer, and essay questions. Your overall grade will be calculated on a straight scale (A, 100 - 93%; A-, 92 - 90%; B+, 89 - 87%; B, 86 - 83%; B-, 82 - 80%; etc.) based on your earned points total.

Dr. Crail will not take attendance during lectures. However, the <u>in-class material is only worth</u> <u>half as much after it has been collected, PERIOD, regardless of reason</u>. It is your responsibility to prepare, attend and participate in class... After all, you are the one who paid to be there, whether you chose to or not.

If you know that you will have a conflict with an exam, Dr. Crail must be notified in writing at least one week in advance of the original test date so that arrangements can be made for making up the test. In general, the only acceptable reasons for missing an exam are illness and family emergencies. If you miss an exam and fail to contact Dr. Crail prior to missing an exam, you will not be given a make-up exam.

Although the policy of not accepting late in-class material for full credit may seem extreme, this is offset by a generous Extra Credit offering. There will be a minimum of *seventeen* Service Learning opportunities to do volunteer work that is worth 10 points (1% of your grade) per hour worked. This primarily occurs on each Friday (11-3) at the University Church and the 1^{st} and 3^{rd} Sunday afternoon (1p-5p) at Irwin Prairie SNP, both when weather permits. Transportation is provided to Irwin Prairie from Campus (12:30p – 5:30p), but you will need to arrange your own transportation to University Church.
