COURSE/CATALOG DESCRIPTION

Special Topics: An advanced course covering some aspect of the environmental sciences not covered in the formal upper- division undergraduate curriculum. Students may repeat the course for different topics.

COURSE OVERVIEW

Learn to write papers that get cited and proposals that get funded. This course is for anyone who wants to improve their scientific writing, is writing theses or proposals, or who may have to write on the job.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon completion of the course students will be able to:

- Outline the overall structure of a paper or proposal to individual sections, paragraphs, sentences, and words.
- Create the core arguments of a paper or proposal
- Describe why some stories are engaging and memorable while others are quickly forgotten.
- Describe the elements of story structure, showing how the structures scientists and researchers use in papers and proposals fit into classical models.
