UT names finalists for provost

The University of Toledo announced Wednesday four finalists for the position of provost and executive vice president for academic affairs.

"We are excited to announce four outstanding finalists who will be visiting The University of Toledo in the coming weeks to interview for the position of provost and executive vice president for academic affairs," wrote Dr. Kaye Patten, senior vice president for student affairs, and Dr. Christopher Ingersoll, dean of the College of Health Sciences and interim dean of the College of Social Justice and Human Service, in a letter sent to the campus community.

In addition to meeting with faculty, administrators and academic leaders, the candidates will each participate in two open forums — one on Main Campus and one on Health Science Campus — to provide an opportunity for the UT community to offer input.

Diversity forums continue as UT gathers campus, community input

A fter a half-dozen open forums and focus groups attended by hundreds of UT students, University employees and community members who participated in conversations about diversity at The University of Toledo, Dr. Willie McKether is beginning to see a picture of the path before him.

Tapped by UT President Sharon L. Gaber in November to serve as special assistant to the president for diversity and to coordinate the development of a Universitywide diversity strategic plan, McKether will conclude his initial, qualitative outreach that will be added to formal surveys sent to the campus community in the weeks ahead.

"We've heard clearly that members of the UT and Toledo communities look to The University of Toledo to play a leadership role in educating its students and graduates to see the world through a lens that recognizes diverse perspectives," McKether said.

"This is a role we embrace," he said. "As we speak to our constituents, it is clear this institution is doing important work to enhance a culture that embraces diversity and inclusion. But it is also clear that we've fallen behind in some areas, and we need to ensure no one feels left behind or excluded because they are unique."

The University's commitment to the process goes all the way to the top of the organization.

"A diversity of views and opinions at the leadership level is essential to this University's ability to navigate the opportunities and challenges facing UT and all of higher education," Gaber said.

"That is why trustees and I see this strategic diversity planning process as so critical. It will inform and strengthen everything from hiring practices to the enrollment of minority students and the recruitment of minority faculty, staff and researchers," Gaber said.

UT Board Chair Sharon Speyer shares Gaber's perspective that the entire institution should be engaged in this endeavor. As a result, Speyer has asked that Trustee Gary Thieman be appointed to McKether's Diversity Plan Advisory Committee, which includes students, faculty, staff and community members, to provide regular two-way communication between the board and the committee. Speyer will serve as an alternate to ensure that there is consistent representation from the board.

"I've also asked Dr. McKether to present an update on the process and his findings in the weeks ahead," Speyer said. "Diversity and inclusion are at the very core of UT's values, and this board recognizes the institutional strength that can be created through that commitment."

Speyer also reiterated the trustees' belief that diverse representation on the board is important as it brings perspective and strength to that governing body. She expressed hope that the governor's office will fill the two vacancies with qualified candidates that expand the representation of the UT campus community.

Internal search launched for graduate studies dean

Nominations are being sought from the University for the dean of the College of Graduate Studies.

Dr. Patricia Komuniecki, who has served as vice provost for graduate affairs and dean of the College of Graduate of Studies since 2009, will retire June 30.

"Patsy's exemplary leadership has served the University and our graduate students well," Interim Provost John Barrett said. "We thank her for working to enhance the quality of services we provide to our graduate students."

Prior to being named dean, Komuniecki was a professor in the Department of Biological Sciences and served as chair for 10 years. She joined the UT faculty in 1985 and was a postdoctoral fellow in pharmacology at the former Medical College of Ohio in 1980.

"I have thoroughly enjoyed all the varied opportunities I have had during my 36 years at UT and hope that my contributions as a faculty administrator since 1990 helped undergraduate and graduate students," she said. "I will miss working with the College of Graduate Studies team; they are a special group of dedicated professionals, and it has been my pleasure to work with them over the past seven years to support our graduate students and faculty."

Nominations of internal candidates are requested by Friday, March 4.

"We are looking for someone to lead our graduate and professional programs to become nationally distinguished and highly ranked," Dr. William Messer, vice president for research and chair of the search committee, said. "The next dean will be charged with continuing and growing UT's emphasis on graduate student research."

The University has 128 master's degree programs and 40 doctoral programs in 12 colleges. In addition to those research degrees, the University offers professional doctorates and master's degrees, as well as a variety of certificates in health care, business and personal enrichment areas.

Internal candidates should have a notable record as a scholar and teacher, and possess a PhD or terminal degree to be eligible to be a full member of the graduate faculty in a field represented in the College of Graduate Studies.

- Leadership skills that will take graduate education and research to the next level at the University;
- Demonstrated commitment to teaching, research and advising;
- Administrative and business acumen to lead the strategic and financial implications of the college;
- Communication skills to engage with a wide range of constituents within and outside the University;
- Commitment to diversity and a desire to implement new strategies to pursue equity; and
- Knowledge of graduate student curriculum and its development.



This will be the 41st year the University and the UT Alumni Association will recognize faculty members for their outstanding dedication to teaching.

The deadline to submit nominations for the Outstanding Teacher Award is Sunday, Feb. 28, at 5 p.m.

Global volunteers: UT Peace Corps applications double in 2015

UT alumna Katie Alber is no longer startled awake by donkeys braying or goats banging on the door of her host family's metal-roofed home in the small West African country of Gambia, where she is serving as a health extension volunteer for two years.

"I have brewed attayah (tea) in the bush, eaten a rat the size of a cat (it tasted like pork), and grown good enough at Mandinka to use sarcasm successfully," Alber posted on Facebook.

Alber has access to the Internet once every few weeks. On her blog, she wrote, "I am loving every second! It is a great and humbling challenge, which I hope will bring meaning and enlightenment."

The 2012 graduate is one of more than 200 UT alumni who have served in the Peace Corps since 1961 when the agency was formed under President John F. Kennedy.

UT is seeing a renewed surge in passion to be a part of the Peace Corps.

Fourteen graduates and soon-to-be graduates of the University submitted applications to the Peace Corps in 2015. That is more than double the previous year.

In 2014, six UT college seniors and alumni applied and four — including Alber — embarked on the journey of immersing themselves in another culture with a combination of international experience and rewarding work in education, health and the environment.

"For four consecutive years, we have seen growth," Sammy Spann, assistant provost in UT's Center for International Studies and Programs, said. "Seniors and graduates are delaying or taking a breather from their careers to join the Peace Corps and define themselves. Momentum is picking up because this generation is seeing more turmoil. They are interested in spreading compassion and empathy, as well as getting more real-world, life-changing experiences."

A Peace Corps representative will be on Main Campus Thursday, Feb. 18, from 3 to 3:30 p.m. in Snyder Memorial Building Room 1100 for students interested in learning more about this global service.

"Just because you've earned your degree doesn't mean you stop pushing the edge of your comfort zone and global understanding through The University of Toledo," Spann said. "We have made a strong effort to encourage students to consider joining the Peace Corps to improve the human condition, as well as help them gain leadership skills to attract the attention of employers, including the State Department."

Far from home, Alber works in West Africa to educate families about nutrition and hygiene, to raise awareness about malaria, and to help improve water systems and sanitation practices. "It may have been a

long day of clinic work and 40k+ of biking, but there's always time to stop and enjoy an African sunset," Alber wrote on Instagram.

Alber is one of 350 new Peace Corps volunteers from across the United States sworn

into service in December after three months of cultural, language and technical training. Peace Corps volunteers receive paid

living expenses, full health and dental coverage, vacation days, and more than \$8,000 upon completion of service.

'The Vagina Monologues' to return to UT, raise money for YWCA Hope Rape Crisis Center

"The Vagina Monologues," an emotion-packed journey through the female experiences of love, sex, rape, menstruation, birth and more, will return to The University of Toledo Friday and Saturday, Feb. 12 and 13, in the Driscoll Alumni Center Auditorium.

The event, which will begin with a resource fair at 6 p.m. on Friday and 11 a.m. on Saturday, is sponsored by the UT Sexual Assault Education and Prevention Program and brought to the community by V-Day UT.

V-Day is a global activist movement determined to end violence against women and girls. The campaign raises awareness and money for anti-violence organizations and works to regularly revitalize efforts.

Several UT students and a handful of community members will perform "The Vagina Monologues." Eve Ensler wrote the play that premiered in 1996 after interviewing more than 200 women about their experiences and views on relationships, sex and violence against women.

Lily Ostrander, a second-year pharmacy major and director of this year's program, said the monologues raise awareness about topics no one wants to discuss, like sexual assault and domestic violence, and show survivors they are not alone.

"To me, 'The Vagina Monologues' are about diminishing the stigma around women's bodies by claiming the word 'vagina' as something we don't have to talk about in hush-hush voices behind closed doors," Ostrander said. "It's about not feeling embarrassed or shamed about our bodies, and empowering women to acknowledge and claim their sexuality."

The resource fair that precedes the event will include a number of local organizations and businesses that are



run by women or empower women and other intersecting identities. Among the organizations scheduled to be at the event are the People Called Women Bookstore, UT Feminist Alliance, Spectrum, Women of Toledo, Khroma Magazine and others.

Tickets for the play are \$5 for students and \$10 for general admission and can be

purchased at the door. Proceeds from this year's event will go to Northwest Ohio's YWCA Hope Rape Crisis Center.

Grammy Award-winning jazz pianist to perform at Tatum Scholarship concert

G and arranger Bill Cunliffe will be the guest artist for the 2016 Art Tatum Memorial Jazz Scholarship Concert Monday, Feb. 15, at 7 p.m. in the UT Center for Performing Arts Recital Hall.

Cunliffe, who is known for his innovative and swinging recordings and compositions, began his career as pianist and arranger with the Buddy Rich Big Band. He has worked with Frank Sinatra, Joe Henderson, Freddie Hubbard, Benny Golson and James Moody, to name a few. He has since established himself as a solo artist and bandleader, with more than a dozen albums under his name.

He currently plays with his trio; his big band; his Latin band, Imaginación; and his classical-jazz ensemble, Trimotif. He performs in the United States and around the world as a leader and sideman, as well as a soloist with symphony orchestras.

Recent recordings include the Bill Cunliffe Trio 2013 album titled *River Edge, New Jersey,* with bassist Martin Wind and drummer Tim Horner, and a 2015 solo disc titled *Playground Swing,* which features "Wheels on the Bus," "The Flintstones," "Over the Rainbow" and "Happy."

Cunliffe is a professor of music at California State University at Fullerton, where he was recognized as a distinguished faculty member in 2010. He also has written several books, including *Uniquely Christmas* (2012) and *Jazz Piano Inventions* (2005), for Alfred Publications.

The concert is presented by The University of Toledo Department of Music Jazz Studies Program. Proceeds from ticket sales support the Art Tatum Memorial Jazz Scholarship, which benefits minority students who want to study jazz at UT.

UT College of Law offers LSAT Prep Course Scholarships

The University of Toledo College of Law will award 20 Law School Admission Test (LSAT) Prep Course Scholarships this spring in partnership with Kaplan Test Prep.

Scholarship applications may be submitted on the College of Law website at http://utole.do/lsatscholarship through Friday, March 11.

The Kaplan LSAT Advantage Course will be offered at the College of Law Monday and Wednesday evenings from 6 to 10 p.m. starting April 13 through May 23. The retail cost of the course is \$1,399.

The College of Law scholarship will subsidize the Kaplan course for applicants who would not otherwise be able to afford the course. If selected, LSAT Prep Course Scholarship recipients will pay \$300 for the course.

"We want to help all students interested in a legal career get the practice needed to succeed on the LSAT," said Jessica Mehl, assistant dean for admissions at the College of Law.

Scholarship applications will be evaluated based on the applicant's need for financial assistance and a statement relating how the applicant will add a diverse perspective to the legal profession. Scholarship recipients will be notified by Friday, March 18.

Toledo will hold its eighth annual "Rockets for the Cure" Saturday, Feb. 13, as the Midnight Blue and Gold host reigning Mid-American Conference champion Ohio at 2 p.m. in Savage Arena.



Season tickets for The University of Toledo's 2016 football season are now on sale.

Season tickets can be purchased for as low as \$80 and include a reserved seat for all six Rocket home games.

Toledo will play Maine Saturday, Sept. 10, and Fresno State Saturday, Sept. 17, in the Glass Bowl. Other home games this season will be Ball State, Central Michigan, Bowling Green and Ohio. Those dates will be announced later.

Rocket fans who purchase or renew their season tickets by Monday, April 11, will receive a free Jason Candle bobblehead.

For the best seats in the house, fans can purchase Sideline A Season Tickets for \$185. Other season ticket options include the Rocket Flex Plan for \$185, which allows you to create your own ticket plan, or the Touch Down Zone, available at a discounted rate in a seating location that is perfect for families. Discounted season ticket options also are available for UT employees, UT retirees, Toledo recent alumni, and UT band/cheer/dance/mascot parents.

Then there is the Ultimate Fan Plan, with seating located on the upper east side of the stadium for \$80. Fans receive a season ticket, free parking, \$24 in concession vouchers, and a \$20 gift card to Rocky's Locker.

New this year for season ticket members is the Season Ticket Membership Benefits Card. Toledo season ticket members may present their card at Rocky's Locker for a 20 percent discount throughout the season, as well as other special offers. The Season Ticket Membership Benefits Card is not available for the Ultimate Fan Plan.

UT Head Football Coach Jason Candle announced that the Rockets added 21 signees to their 2016 recruiting class during a special event Wednesday in Savage Arena. Candle and his staff cast a wide net to snag their recruits. Ten signees are from relatively local areas: five from Ohio, three from Michigan and two from Pennsylvania. But an impressive seven recruits come from the talent-rich state of Florida, and one each from Alabama, Texas, Maryland and Connecticut. "We recruit character first, and I feel like all of our signees are great kids," Candle said. "A lot of guys are coming from winning programs, have played in state championship games or won state championships. They understand the culture of winning football."
