- The West Virginia Certification and Authorization Form or the previous barcoded IdentoGO Enrollment Confirmation Form REQUIRES the subject's <u>original ink signature</u>, date, printed name, date of birth, phone number, and email (or second phone number).
 - Original ink signature is required. Copied signatures, digital/electronic signatures, typed signatures or other variations cannot be accepted for West Virginia State submissions.
 - Submission of the West Virginia Certification and Authorization Form to DCSA with the original fingerprint card and original case papers replaces the previously used barcoded IdentoGO Enrollment Confirmation Form, which DCSA will discontinue sending back to submitting agencies for signature.

PRIVACY ACT STATEMENT

Authority: The FBIs acquisition, preservation, and exchange of fingerprints and associated information is generally authorized under 28 U.S.C. 534. Depending on the nature of your application, supplemental authorities include Federal statutes, State statutes pursuant to Pub. L. 92-544, Presidential Executive Orders, and federal. Providing your fingerprints and associated information is voluntary; however, failure to do so may affect completion or approval of your application.
